National Fervor Showcased in Mattapoisett

Mattapoisett No Kings Protest

On October 18, Mattapoisett became one of the many communities across the commonwealth and the country to host a "No Kings Day" rally to demonstrate against what a large number of people call Donald Trump's authoritarian king-like rule as President.

The Mattapoisett rally began at the corner of Route 6 and North Street and marched to Shipyard Park. There, under bright, sunny skies, attendees representing a wide age-range filled the park to rest their protest signs and listen to speeches blaring from speakers inside the central gazebo as cars passing by on Water Street occasionally honked their support.

The first to speak were Bryan Winters, an Iraqi War veteran, former Rochester School Committee member Michelle Custolito of Authors *Against Banned Books*, and Andy Pollock, Executive Director of the New Bedford LBGBTQ Network. Michael Kovachevh of Mattapoisett then told the crowd his family are survivors of World

Photo by Sam Bishop War II's dictatorial tyranny; his father spent tortuous years in a prison camp, and his mother lost relatives in the holocaust. Such tyranny must never happen again, he said.

"My mother and father right now are rolling in their graves at the sight of the slide the country is currently taking," Kovachevh said. "Let us not look away at the signs of fascism. When we speak out, we erase the normalization of hate. Let us not be passive inheritors of the past; let us be active guardians of the future. Let us

remember not just what has happened, but what never happens again."

Nicki Demakis, Chair of the Mattapoisett
Democratic Town Committee that helped to organize the
event, then introduced Frances-Feliz Kearns, the group's
Vice-Chair and the Mattapoisett representative on the
ORR Regional School Committee. She identified herself

challenges. "All very important right now," she said.

Demakis explained as the rally was winding down that organizing it was a joint effort between the Democratic Town Committees of Rochester, Mattapoisett, Marion, Fairhaven, and Acushnet and the 50501 Committee that helps groups organize anti-Trump demonstrations nationwide.

To elaborate on the mission of these rallies, she added, "We are in throws of an authoritarian takeover of every faction of our government. This brings people together against that. If this attracts five new people that would have never shown up before, we've given them the courage to show up again, and then again. We have to keep showing up and speaking truth to power."

For those who love grand finales, fall in New England is among the best. It is one of nature's outstanding gestures and spectacular to behold.

Autumn's show can differ from year to year, but you can usually depend on that last hurrah. I'll take the muted colors of the current season - admittedly not as fabulous as past seasons, but lovely all the same. The stress from drought is to blame for the crispy edges of leaves, mellower colors, and early leaf drop. Processes shut down prematurely and so the vibrant purples, reds and oranges that we are accustomed to have been less impressive.

Meanwhile, we in the states (and abroad) are having a mast year, meaning one with an unusually large crop of acorns from trees like oaks. "Mast" is a collective term for the fruits and nuts... a bumper crop in other words. This phenomenon occurs every few years and is an evolutionary strategy for trees to produce so many seeds that wildlife cannot eat them all, increasing the survival rate for their offspring. This abundance is also leading to consequences like more clogged gutters and a boom in wildlife populations that feed on the seeds.

Such a surplus has evolutionary advantages whereby some seeds are left to germinate and grow into



new trees. It can likely result in a population explosion of seed-eating animals which in turn can benefit their predators, such as hawks and foxes, not to mention ticks.

I ruminate on this as I pick hundreds of privet seedlings by hand, to the point that my hand is numb. Does it mean next year there will be more? I spent nearly the entire weekend working on fall cleanup, not just raking leaves, but cleaning the entire understory of my woodland garden that runs a goodly length of the property. The upper story is made up of Eastern white pines and a Norway spruce which make for good windbreaks but also tend to shed needles and cones. Mid canopy is occupied by rhododendrons and mountain laurel and a Japanese snowbell tree, a trio of oak leaf hydrangea and one standard 'pink-winky' hydrangea. Below these are some native ground covers, patches of ferns and a swath of wildflowers that bloom in the spring.

Cleanup is a mixture of deadheading (we're talking thousands of spent rhody blossoms) the aforementioned elimination of many privet seedlings and light pruning. Along with the physical detailing, I'm checking for overall health as well as needed modifications. One established rhody is on its last trunks, so to speak... as I cut off one massive branch, I discovered borers; something that will have to be dealt with. The line of rhodies was planted astride a privet hedge the result is a long corridor between the two which forms a sort of



secret garden. I haven't really been attentive to this area in a few years, but I made it a goal this year and it is taking me quite a bit of time to get it completed.

The floor of this woodland garden benefits from itself in that I spread it with pine needles, replacing them every few years. When you have a surplus of pine needles it makes sense to use it-- what better place than where the occupants thrive in acid soil. (You can actually use pine needles in most gardens as their acidity neutralizes as they decompose). The fresh needles are a lovely mix of gold and pale green, and they are light enough to serve as a weed barrier and also light enough that plants can

make their way through in the emerge in the spring - epimedium, bluebells and lily of the valley as well as a variety of ferns and randomly placed hostas. The soft underfooting is another pleasure.

My husband is the commander of the hedge, but I control most of the woodland garden and it has come to my notice that I will need to show him the beauty of leucothoe when it's not trimmed back (something he's been doing of late). It is very pretty when it's left to drape in its natural way. I came to this realization while clearing the inner sanctum of a section of garden - feeling like a plant explorer in a new land. Well, not new, but

A Razing in the North

This Week In Revolutionary History...

This week in Revolutionary War History, let's discuss what was going on 250 years ago in and around the colonial Province of Massachusetts Bay. Last week, army composition was standardized with there being a little over 20,000 soldiers around Cambridge. Black men were officially barred from entry into the army, however. Thomas Gage departed Boston to head back to Britain, having been relieved of his position in charge of British troops in North America. He was replaced by William Howe. Finally, the Continental Navy was legally established, merging the navies and few ships of the states.

Winter still approached, and cooler temperatures slowly creep upon the men. In his General Orders for October 15, 1775, Washington instructs men stationed in the region "to parade tomorrow morning at sun-rise upon Cambridge Common, to cut Fire-wood for the army." Firewood is being depleted, and it's all-hands-on-deck to replenish supplies.

The next day, Washington writes to Captains of the newly created Continental Navy, Nicholson

beliefs in the meeting's minutes.

Also on October 18, the British under Lieutenant Henry Mowat raze the city of Falmouth in Maine, today Portland. The inhabitants of the town were given little notice as the area was stuck with incendiary rounds and bombards. The assault lasted for nearly nine hours, leaving 400 buildings destroyed and 1,000~ out of 2,500~ homeless. Reactions to this attack would spread through the colonies and Britain, tarnishing Mowat's reputation.

Washington would write to the Falmouth Committee of Safety the next week, saying "The desolation, and misery, which ministerial vengeance had planned, and, in contempt of every principle of humanity, has been so lately brought on the Town of Falmouth, I know not, how sufficiently to detest."

Town Administrator Cameron Durant began the discussion with Principal Aaron Polansky, school Business Manager Sarah Griffith, and technical consultant Walter Hartley, Jr. by summarizing the two questions being asked by the community. What is the rationale behind repair versus new building? And what will new operational costs be for a new building?

The state School Building Authority's reimbursement for the new school's price tag is projected to be \$129M. But the share of the remaining costs among district members (Acushnet, Carver, Lakeville, Mattapoisett, and Rochester) is approximately \$159M. As



a result, in Rochester, two warrants will be up for a vote at the November 18 Special Town Election that will also be district-wide. One warrant will ask all district voters to approve the new building plan. The other will be the town's question seeking approval of a debt exclusion override to fund its share of the new construction.

Hartley responded to Durant by pointing out any renovations costing 30-percent or more of a municipal building's assessed value will require the entire facility be reconstructed to meet expensive full accessibility standards, and this will lead to the requirement that it meet all other modern building and safety codes. Old Colony's assessed property value of \$17,029,600 would trigger that. These upgrades would still be complicated and expensive.

Select Board Chair Adam Murphy then asked what he considered his most important concern. What if the district-wide question to build a new school doesn't pass? Is there an alternative plan to address serious building deficiencies? Will the current building have to lock its doors?

Hartley said the school will not have to close its doors, but the building doesn't have another 20-year life span. He said on November 19, a new planner for a new design will have to be found. Polansky agreed that district officials will have to figure out renovation and upgrade costs on November 19 if the building plan is voted down. There is no alternative plan, he said. He added that his first priority would be replacing the school's deteriorating water tank. Both men said this type of planning would be long, complicated, and just as expensive. Griffith described such planning as a matter of a lot of what-ifs and unknowns. Polansky said that while operational costs will certainly go up with a new facility, the school will be very 'collaborative' with district members over how these new plans will be made.

Murphy then emphasized that Rochester voters need more information to make an informed decision on November 18. He strongly recommended that in time for the district-wide election official prepare a visual presentation of the timeline for a new building and/or necessary renovations, and the costs to the town and the taxpayer. Polansky said he could do that. He noted Old Colony will host a presentation of the plan at the school on October 27 and has visited area senior centers with that presentation.

In other action, the board approved the contract to repair the Highway Barn to Lepage and Sons Roofing for \$128,750. Durant noted this is good news because the annual town meeting appropriation for this use was \$200,000.

Durant announced the SEMASS PILOT payment for September 2025 is \$423,634.

Durant's noted his FY27 Budget Letter to department heads will ask a deadline to receive all budget proposals of December 5.

The next meeting of the Rochester Select Board is scheduled for Monday, November 3 at 6:00 pm at Town Hall, 1 Constitution Way.

Zero-Dollar Energy Bill?

Marion Energy Management Committee

Town officials know of a nationally-known Massachusetts resident with no electric bills and zero carbon emissions coming from his home.

The Marion Energy Management Committee (MEMC) met on Monday at the Maritime Center and are gearing up for author David Green to speak at the Marion Music Hall, 164 Front Street, on October 29 at 6:30 pm.

Committee member Alanna Nelson confirmed that there are still seats available for the presentation,





which will also include a question-and-answer segment. The event will last one hour and is free. Doors open at 6:10 pm. Nelson noted that given the size of the Music Hall, there should be seating available for attendees and parking is also free.

David Green is the author of *Zero Carbon Home*, which touches upon how heat pumps, triple-paned windows, and solar panels can help save money for homeowners.

At an August MEMC meeting, committee members talked about booking a talk from Green.

His presentation, according to the MEMC, will be





called "A Recipe for Getting Rid of Energy Bills."

Green, who works and lives in Dover, has found ways to cut his home's carbon emissions and energy bills to zero, according to web reports. His work has been featured on national news broadcasts and on the websites of the U.S. Department of Energy, Zero Energy Project, Cool Effects, and the Green Home Institute, according to Green's website.

Also at Monday's MEMC meeting, committee members talked about meeting with the select board about the recent state Green Communities report. The MEMC has been brainstorming ways to use solar and other renewable energy sources for the town.

On that note, Marion was selected to be part of the Massachusetts Clean Energy Center's (MassCEC) On-Street Charging Solutions Program, according to Nelson.

"The program's goal is to expand access to Electric Vehicle Charging Equipment. On-street chargers, such as pole-mounted, streetlight or curbside charging stations, have become increasingly appealing to municipalities looking to ensure all residents have sufficient charging options," Nelson said in an email after Monday's meeting.

"Under the program, Marion will complete a

planning support and feasibility study *at* no cost using MassCEC's consultants."

The MEMC will meet again next month, though the exact date has not been scheduled.

Long-Delayed Solar Array Approved

Rochester Conservation Commission

After a hearing split between meetings over several months, Rochester's Conservation Commission Tuesday endorsed the Notice of Intent for work within wetlands to construct a floating and ground-mounted solar array at 53 Dexter Lane.

The project, whose hearing attracted the attendance of multiple concerned abutters over that time, was approved quietly Tuesday with no public resistance after project consultant Sarah Stern of Beals and Thomas Engineering updated the commission on her firm's responses to comments from the town peer review engineer and the Planning Board. She said both are satisfied with changes made in response to that input. The height of the panels is being reduced by two feet and monitoring protocols are being increased.

She acknowledged there had been concern from a Planning Board member about the solar panels' "lake effect," i.e. the problem that birds will mistake the dark panels for water and kill or injure themselves diving into them. Member Matthew Bache noted that since these panels cover less than 50-percent of the water surface, the Dexter Lane array will not cause that problem, and the other commission members agreed. Another Beals and Thomas representative noted the "Lake Effect" occurs with desert arrays where dark panels are surrounded by white sand. That effect won't happen on Dexter Lane, he said.

The meeting began with a continuance. The commission continued to its November meeting its hearing on the request for a negative Determination of Applicability for a proposal at 756 Snipatuit Road to relocate a drainpipe that currently runs under the house and level a backyard within the 100-foot buffer zone of a vegetated wetland.


From there it moved quickly to approvals. The commission issued a Certificate of Compliance with the Order of Conditions for the roadway work to complete the second and final phase of the Connet Woods housing development. It then granted a Certificate of Compliance with the Order of Conditions for the work to complete the solar array project at 109 Neck Road. Conservation



Agent Merilee Kelly endorsed both motions after her own inspections of the sites. "Everything looks done," she said of the Connet Woods project.

The commission then granted a Certificate of Compliance with the Order of Conditions for the construction of a garage within 100 feet of wetlands at 148 Braley Hill Road, and it approved an abbreviated Notice of Resource Delineation at 0 Walnut Plain Road.

Before the latter approval, Walnut Plain Road abutter Pam Souza raised concern about what construction there will do to her water table. Acting Chair Mike Gifford explained no specific construction project

has been proposed yet. This approval was simply to agree with where the wetland lines are located.

Lastly, the commission continued to November its Notice of Intent hearing on the construction of a single-family home within the 200-foot riparian zone to a perennial stream at 0 Robinson Road.

The next Conservation Commission meeting will be November 4 at 7:00 pm at Town Hall, 1 Constitution Way.

One-Hundred-Sixty Trees To Be Felled

Mattapoisett Planning Board

Mattapoisett's Tree Warden Chris Nadeau came before the Mattapoisett Planning Board on Tuesday, October 20 in a public hearing for the removal of 160 trees in the town's easement. The trees are located in various locations from deep in the heart of the village to along forested areas including those designated as scenic byways. All the trees that were noted in his removal application were deemed storm damaged, diseased, or victims of boring insects. Nadeau cautioned all 160 trees were in danger of crashing to the ground causing havoc, property damage, and possible injuries to passersby.

Chair Tom Tucker was a bit miffed that no one representing Eversource, a partner in the application, was present to speak on behalf of the utility. Nadeau stated he had inspected all 160 trees and agreed removal was needed. Since all parties were in agreement Eversource did not need to be present. It was further noted by Nadeau that of many trees marked for removal were threatening power lines in many locations.

During the public hearing, several residents spoke to the need for the trees to be removed including outspoken tree advocate Sandra Hering. Also speaking to the danger the trees in question were Margaret DeMello, Mike Daigle, Anne Fenton, Chrysal Walsh, and Nancy Souza, Chair of the Mattapoisett Tree Committee.

Nadeau was asked by board member Karen Field if replanting was part of the plan. Nadeau responded that a number of the trees were in forested easements and would hardly be noticed come spring.

There was no debate as all parties in attendance including the board members agreed to have the trees removed.

In other business the board once again delved into the writing of a new bylaw for "cottage" style developments which they plan on presenting to voters during the Spring Town Meeting.

The draft bylaw describes the structures as "...a cottage style housing development, an alternate form of detached housing. It further states "...it is a crucial component of the town's comprehensive housing strategy."

The draft goes on to say, "To provide housing styles and types that are responsive to changing household demographics, sizes, ages, and interests. To encourage the creation of more usable open space and promote the efficient layout of dwelling units to reduce the development footprint and infrastructure costs. Also

to ensure that the overall size bulk and mass of cottage styles of cottage structures and developments remain smaller causing less visual impact than standard single style family dwellings."

Particulars such as the square footage of these dwelling units were also discussed. Gross floorplans could be 975 square feet, with a main floor measuring 900 square feet. Minimum distance between units may be proposed to be 25 feet in the front, 10 feet on the sides, and 15 feet in the rear. Minimum distance separating structures will be 10 feet minimum, and private open space 200 square feet per unit.

Tucker said that two yet-to-be-scheduled public hearings will be held to vet the new proposed bylaw with the public. In the meantime, the public may get a draft copy from the Planning Board office.

Earlier in the evening Tucker announced that the hearing for a site plan review for 92 County Road, property owned by Krishi Krishan Corp for the expansion of the existing motel, that would include two rows of 12 units each, was continued to November 17 at the petitioner's request. Tucker pointed out that the Zoning Board of Appeals hearing for a Special Permit on October 16 had been continued, thus the Planning Board could not



Miller at the October 14 meeting at the Police Station conference room said that some alleged burglars have learned to conceal activity on ring cameras. She said maybe the AHT could finance improved security and stop some break-ins.

The AHT made no decision on that idea but indicated it might be a conversation for a future meeting.

Prior to Miller's proposal, AHT Chair Terri Santos said the 78 Wareham Road condominium development has decided not to develop affordable housing there but will pay the town in lieu of affordable units. The project is still in the permitting phase and is proposing 40 detached units.

Santos, citing her conversation with Town Administrator Geoffrey Gorman, said that estimates reveal the town could receive as much as \$150,000 from the developer.

Trust members asked what the Affordable Housing Trust should do with the money.

"That's what we have to figure out," Santos said. She said the earmarked money is not as restrictive as Community Preservation Committee money.

Santos said money can be funneled toward mortgage assistance programs and funding toward first-time homebuyer programs. The AHT will investigate MIller's idea of whether it can help homeowners with better security measures.

In other business, the AHT mentioned a makeover to the web site and is mulling over whether it should hire a professional or look for a college intern.

Santos at first resisted the Chair position, saying she will be out of town for some meetings, but AHT members agreed to help run meetings when needed. Toby Ast volunteered and was voted in as the Vice-Chair, and he will also continue to serve as the Community



Preservation Act representative for the AHT.

Associate Member Roberta Dunn Tracy was elevated to full member status so now the board is seeking an additional associate member. Members said that applications have come in so they should fill that role soon.

The next meeting of the Marion Affordable Housing Trust is scheduled for Tuesday, November 11 at 6:00 pm in the Marion Police Station.

Equipment and Budget Concerns

Marion Marine Resources Commission

The Marion Marine Resources Commission often has to borrow equipment from other departments and private entities. Meanwhile, sales of old equipment often go back to the General Fund and can't be used by the MRC for its own capital improvement needs, according to MRC members at the October 15 meeting at the Marine Maritime Center.

The MRC spent the majority of the meeting discussing this financial conundrum for the marine division.

Harbormaster Adam Murphy prefaced the issue by mentioning that the Capital Improvement Committee last year did not approve requests from the MRC for some needed capital improvement items, such as floating concrete docks.

Murphy noted an accounting issue, which stretches beyond Marion and MRC issues. When outdated MRC equipment is sold by the town, it returns to the general treasury and can be allocated to other sources – per state law.

MRC members questioned the fairness of such a move. For instance, the MRC has a new patrol boat and is auctioning off the old boat, revenue from which might not

return to the MRC budget.

"The new patrol boat was an eye opener for the public," Murphy said. "If we want something we need to raise fees, and it can't be on the back of taxpayers. The old patrol boat will go to the general fund. It doesn't directly come back if we sell."

Murphy referenced two outdated trucks that the MRC is using. He said the MRC for this year has asked for a new patrol truck but erring on the side of caution, will maintain one older pickup truck.

Murphy said the latter truck does not respond to emergencies and will have some use for the town for at

least the next fiscal year.

Murphy said one vehicle could be sold and money could be used by the MRC but would only return to the general treasury and can be allocated in any manner.

However, the MRC often has to borrow equipment from the town's Department of Public Works and from local commercial boating centers at times.

MRC chairman Vin Malkoski mentioned the potential liability of such borrowing.

We rely on local boat yards for help, but this can be problematic," Malkoski said. "If something happens,

that becomes problematic."

"We are relying on other people's equipment to operate our business," Murphy also said.

MRC members said they hope that at a meeting later this month, they can review the fee schedule, which could help bolster revenue.

MRC members also discussed the ongoing issue of boaters not being allowed to park in grassy open space areas, adjacent to the Island Wharf, when other entities have done just that.

Members also said that this issue is fairly new, as boaters parked there in the past, but the popularity of the local summer concerts has raised concerns from the public.

The Marion Marine Resource Commission's next meeting is October 27, where they will review numbers. Later this fall, they will review MRC membership, as there are potential alternates looking to join the group.

Commissioners also brainstormed how sales of old MRC equipment could be returned to MRC funding accounts to help pay for capital and other items.







From the Land to the Shore: The Wampanoag of Mattapoisett

On Thursday, **November 6** at 6:00 pm, the Mattapoisett Museum is proud to unveil its new, permanent exhibit entitled "From the Land to the Shore: The Wampanoag of Mattapoisett." Curator and Administrator Connor Gaudet acted as coordinator, curator, and facilitator of the exhibit. Aquinnah Wampanoag historian Linda Coombs was the consultant, curator, and primary author of the text, who writes in her voice from her perspective - that of a Wampanoag person. Steven Peters of SmokeSygnals Indigenous Creative Productions in Mashpee, MA, designed the exhibit panels.

This exhibit explores the history and culture of the Wampanoag People who have continuously inhabited this part of New England for at least 12,000 years. It follows the story of the Early Contact Period and Colonization through King Philip's War, and its outcomes on the Wampanoag culture and community as they exist today. The exhibit weaves in local, Tri-Town-Area-related examples of broader historical narratives whenever possible.

The topics that will be covered in the exhibit include: the early history and traditional life of the Wampanoag, the Great Dying, the contact period and early European settlement and colonization, causes and impacts of King Philip's War, historical erasure, and the Wampanoag today. Featured will be an authentic diorama depicting a Wampanoag summer village. It was created in the 1990s by the Old Rochester Regional High School art teacher and students and has recently been completely restored.

Mattapoisett-specific Wampanoag history has been difficult to find because of the impacts of colonization and indigenous displacement after King Philip's War. What has been found, and some of what will be explored in the exhibit, are examples of erasure of the Wampanoag presence from the Town's physical landscape as well as the historical record.

Coombs began her museum career in an



internship at the Boston Children's Museum and later worked there in the Native American Program. Coombs also worked for 30 years in the Wampanoag Indigenous Program (WIP) of Plimoth Plantation, now called Plimoth Patuxet, including 15 years as WIP's Associate Director, and 9 years at the Aquinnah Cultural Center. Presently, she does independent museum consulting and cultural presentations.

In her latest book, *Colonization and the Wampanoag Story*, Coombs aims to educate students about the Wampanoag perspective of the European colonization of New England. It was published in September of 2023,

Movie Review

Queens of the Dead. Starring Katy O'Brien and Jaquel Spivey. Directed by Tina Romero. Running time: 100 minutes. No MPAA rating. Opening in select theaters October 25.

Few horror fans are as done with zombie movies as I am, but I'm always open to exceptions. Jim Jarmusch's The Dead Don't Die, for instance, or Tina Romero's Queens of the Dead. Romero is the daughter of the late George A. Romero, who pretty much invented the zombie genre as we know it (Dawn of the Dead, several others). Tina Romero has made a fun, flashy tribute to her father's work, and it packs the usual scares and flesh-eating while incorporating a bit of autobiography. The plot takes off from Romero's experience working as a DJ on New York City's queer nightlife circuit. Dre (Katy O'Brian) DJs at a club having a big party. She deals with no-shows, diva attitude among the drag queens, and her bigoted brother-inlaw. Soon she also has to deal with an onslaught of the undead.

Familiar to some from the queer noir *Love Lies Bleeding*, O'Brian has a mix of soft and sharp features atop a strong body; she's perfect as the tough but vulnerable action lead. For a while, *Queens of the Dead* plays on an almost sitcom level as Romero's camera follows the articulately bitchy queens around and various comedians (Riki Lindhome as Dre's nurse wife, Margaret Cho as a butch would-be savior) turn up. That's not a bad thing, just a little lighter than some horror buffs may want. Give it some time, because — as in *Shaun of the Dead*, another evergreen exception to the "zombies are played" rule — as the undead menace moves forward from the background, the characters, introduced as borderline nelly/snarky caricatures, develop into actual pained humans.

That's the area where Tina does her dad proud. He, too, knew how to bring on simple-seeming antiheroes and then give them shadings, so that we valued the lives they were defending. I wasn't crazy about George being given a shout-out in dialogue, suggesting that the movie is set in a world where Romero's zombie movies exist, and not set in those movies' reality. (Tina makes up for it by getting Tom Savini, George's zombie-effects magician all those years, to deliver that dialogue.



From him, it comes across as a warm joke about his old friend, who left us in 2017. Pay attention near the beginning and you'll also spot *Dawn of the Dead*'s Gaylen Ross as a doctor in the hospital where Lindhome's character works.)

A lot of *Queens of the Dead* focuses on queer identity, its tangled nature in a world where queerness is othered and demonized, until one finds one's people, usually in the city. There's an intriguing emotional connection between Dre and Sam (Jaquel Spivey), who used to perform at Dre's club as "Samoncé" before he panicked one night at a major event at the club and flaked. There's zero romantic feeling between them; they're friends walled off from each other by her disappointment and his shame. Romero and co-writer Erin Judge construct the movie as a build-up to the moment when Sam lets Samoncé out again. By that point, we know that moment is coming, but it means more than the standard decimating-the-zombies climax, which Romero also gives us.

It has its sobering bits and its spooky bits, but the movie really runs more on comedy than on horror. Romero leans away from the usual zombie aesthetic of ugly, mottled, gnarly flesh; once zombified, the queens and queers here just look like themselves only lightly made-up for a Halloween party, which the movie pretty much is. A cross between grim and glam, then. Romero fills the screen and even, apparently, the crew with queer folk of every stripe: gay, lesbian, bi, asexual, nonbinary, trans women, trans men. In times of less terror pointed at the community, Queens of the Dead might present as less of a defiant call to defense and insistence on the right to exist than it does now. Kings no, queens yes. An accident of timing brings this monster mash to an audience that may embrace it gratefully. But the timing might also make it seem heavier than it was designed to be. Here's to a near future where the movie doesn't feel so much like a lifeline.
