

Marbella, Spain to compete in this year's annual Ironman Pro Series 70.3 World Championship. Gallagher qualified for this strenuous, multi-faceted race last year and has been training since.

She and her two daughters, Addie and Ansley, left our neck of the woods and headed to Spain on Monday night. The race itself is on Saturday, November 8, so here's hoping there's time for sightseeing as well as some last-minute preparations. For Marbella, the average temperature is around 64 degrees at the mouth of the Mediterranean. The family deservedly gets a warm reprieve from our cold, wet week.

The race starts at 7:50 am CET, so 2:50 am our time! It starts with a 1.2-mile/1.9-kilometer swim around the town's beach, Puerto Banús. Next, Gallagher will embark on the 56-mile/90.1-kilometer bike section heading north out of town towards the Andalusian highlands, or the Cordilleras Béticas. Elevation here is from sea level to about 1,750 feet. Circling back down to Marbella, for the last leg, the racers make two laps around town in a 13.1-mile/21.1-kilometer circuit, finally passing

the finish line back at the beach after traveling 70.3 miles/113.1 kilometers through their own bodies' strength and determination.

"I'm definitely excited," Julie told The Wanderer. We caught her a few hours before she and her daughters departed! In being asked if she was nervous, she brushed it off and replied "It's going to be fun! I can't wait."

Gallagher's swim coach, Bodil Perkins, remarked that "her swimming and her dedication just amazes me!" Perkins coached Gallagher three times a week for the swimming section in the lead up to the race in Spain. She concluded, "She is an incredible inspiration and an amazing athlete."

On top of this race, Gallagher also recently







this is where my children and I set up shop, carving our jack-o-lanterns every year, often having to blow on our hands to keep them warm. In fact, the smooth flesh of the pumpkin makes an interesting counterpoint to the delicate resiny needles... in a weird way, they were meant to be together.

On the banks of ponds, the milkweed pods are bursting open to reveal their fluffy, silky, seedy floss that we used to scatter, then would watch it in fascination, floating through the air, unwittingly planting more in the process.

The tactile forces of nature abound: The velvety cattails out in the marshes, the showy seed heads of various ornamental grasses and the ubiquitous goldenrod

- now rather scrappy looking - which seems to have a reverse pointillism - the flowers become more defined as you get up close. Just think, these plants are the very



descendants of our childhood landscape! We might not have known what they were called, but we took the time to notice them, to hold or pick them, as they were part of our dominion.

The muted colors of once vibrant asters and ferns indicate their expiration date, while the tangled shoots of untended roses resemble fiendish tentacles from a children's fairy tale. Fall doesn't fade meekly away. Nor do I want it to.

The Basics of Medicare

What Does The Doctor Say?

Since we are in the Medicare "open enrollment" period, Oct 15-Dec 7, now is a good time for a quick review.

Medicare was enacted in 1965. It established parts A and B. Part A is free to all Americans 65 and older and

to younger people with chronic kidney disease or who are chronically disabled. It pays 80% of hospital bills after a deductible. Part B, for which you pay, covers doctor fees and most outpatient services. Part B also has a deductible and covers 80% of the charges.

While Medicare B is voluntary, it would be playing Russian roulette to not take it, as you would have no coverage for doctor bills. Most people pay \$185/month for Medicare Part B, though this goes up for those with higher incomes. It also goes up if you delay enrolling.

Medicare Part D became available in 2006. It is optional and helps pay for prescriptions. You must sign up and choose a plan annually. Typical premiums run about \$50/month.

Because A and B only cover 80% of your medical bills, and these bills can mount up dramatically if you have a serious illness, most people pay for a supplemental policy to cover the 20%. These so-called "medigap" plans are offered by private insurers, not the government.

Part C, establishing what is now called Medicare Advantage, began in 1997. It gives private insurance companies a fixed amount per person per year to cover their medical expenses. The theory was that private health insurers would provide equal or better care and save the government money, a theory that has been proven wrong.

Medicare Advantage plans advertise heavily, and promise lower costs and extra benefits. At this time of year, you will be inundated with direct mail, phone calls and media blitzes trying to entice you to join an Advantage plan.

If you join such a plan, you must still pay your Part B premium, but typically will not have to pay for a medigap plan or Part D. Your monthly insurance premiums will usually thus be lower. There is, however, no free lunch. Under traditional Medicare A and B, you can be treated by almost every doctor and hospital in the country. This is not true for Advantage plans.

In return for the lower insurance cost, you will be restricted in the doctors and hospitals you can use and you will find that your doctors' recommendations are subject to the whims of the insurance companies. Most hospital care and any expensive test or medication will only be covered



if the insurance company approves it. I do not have space here to cover all the issues, and strongly recommend you Google "John Oliver Medicare Advantage" (the 31 minute one) for a biting and humorous look at the problem.

People who sign up for Medicare Advantage when they are healthy can be fine if they stay healthy. If they develop a serious illness they may regret their choice, as they find that the doctors and hospitals they would like to use for their care are not available.

Switching back to traditional Medicare would seem like an option, but there is a catch. When you first go on Medicare, you have free choice of medigap plans. They cannot refuse you because you are in poor health. If you try to sign up for one of these plans later, they can refuse to cover you at all or refuse to pay for pre-existing conditions. Just when you would need that 20% covered, it will not be, so you are locked into your Advantage plan.

My strong advice is that if you can afford the extra cost, start and stay with traditional Medicare and a good medigap plan. Otherwise, if you choose an Advantage plan, stay healthy!

I probably should see a podiatrist... my feet hurt, and maybe an allergist because I am allergic to shellfish. Naw, I have enough doctors. If you are like me, the stress of just thinking about going to a doctor raises your blood pressure sky high.

I'm thinking about taking some time off from

Finally, Some Good News

This Week in Revolutionary History

This week in Revolutionary War history, let's check up on what was going on 250 years ago in and around the colonial Province of Massachusetts Bay. Never uneventful, last week, delegates from the Continental Congress met George Washington at his headquarters in Cambridge with discussions mostly centered on the General's plans to make it through the winter. Washington also received information from his troops regarding their desire to continue service into the next year in order to make further conscription preparations. Cambridge also received updates from Benedict Arnold and Philip Schuyler on their offensive campaign into Quebec, which is showing its first signs of disaster.

On October 29, 1775, Washington receives a note from his cousin and the manager of his estate/plantation, Mount Vernon, Lund Washington. Lund is about five years younger than George and has served as steward of the tract of land on the Potomac since the war's onset. He initially writes of some unfurling behavior by the General's wife, Martha Washington. Lund says she often departs with him being unsure of her exact whereabouts. He adds, "she has often declared she would go to the camp (Cambridge) if you would admit her."

He gets into the real message he wants to convey. He seeks counsel. Lund is unsure how to ensure the safety of the property in the case of a British assault, looting, or capture. The property was about 8,000 acres just off the Potomac River in northern Virginia. He recommends fortifications, and a series of walls and batteries to stop the British from disembarking. It is difficult terrain to build on, but Lund is evidently fearful of the highly vulnerable position of the property. Washington's reply was lost to time, but such fortifications were never erected.

On October 30, John Hancock writes with urgency and stress. "I confess I have great anxieties upon the subject," referring to the eminent possible retiring of up to half of Washington's officers at the end of the year. He hopes increased pay, better contract terms, and "a regard to their country" will retain some servicemen. Though the threat of a severely diminished army is a serious one.

That same day, Governor Jonathan Trumbull of Connecticut writes from Lebanon (the city), ironically also fearing the fragile defensive position near the sea, similar to Lund's fears the day prior. Trumbull also suggests batteries, this time floating ones in the Long Island Sound. He fears New London is a prime target of the British. He is seeking recommendations from "skilled engineers."

Josiah Quincy of Braintree writes Washington on October 31 (they don't celebrate Halloween quite yet –



sorry) with a potential strategic opportunity to get a leg up in Boston. When the delegates from the Continental Congress have come north last week, Quincy met with some of his friends, including Benjamin Franklin, and discussed the cruel "vengeance of a tyrannical government." He and his friends have devised a "scheme." In great detail, he outlines a plan to block the sea routes and starve British-held Boston of its maritime connections, thus isolating the garrison and making it an easy recapture. In speaking with Franklin, John Adams, and others, Quincy explains many possible methods for blocking the city. Including the construction of forts near the two channels into the city, the sinking of ships in said channels or even the creation of "machines" to lay chains

or barriers. "I doubt not, your Excellency will readily agree with me, that these are become objects of much greater importance, since the destruction of Falmouth (Portland, ME) demonstrates, the malicious resolution of our barbarously civilized enemies, to destroy all the rest of our maritime towns, if they can." He then invites Washington to have a view of the harbor with him, to better formulate plans.

Washington sends a response a few days later. The army has no supplies, and such a plan isn't near possible at the moment.

On November 1, Washington's General Orders again instruct officers to manage their finances. They are not to order coats if they do not have the essential shirts and shoes first. That same day, Washington received a letter from the recently displaced Bostonian merchant Gillam Tailer: "I beg leave to represent to you that I am a young person from Boston, where I have left my all. I have been brought up in the mercantile way but by reason of the unhappy situation of affairs am now out of employ, should esteem it a great favor if your Excellency would bestow some employ on me, that I may be of some little service to my Country, for which shall ever retain a grateful sense & am your Excellency's most obedient humble servant." Many share a similar set of circumstances, and Tailer would become an ensign in the 2nd Continental Infantry about a month later.

Finally in a lucky victory against the supply

shortage, on November 3, merchant John Brown of Providence informs Washington "a small quantity of powder" has just arrived from Suriname. Though little, it highlights a spark of hope and assistance from unlikely allies across the Commonwealth. On November 5, Washington also gets some more good news. This time, from Canada. Major General Philip Schuyler states Fort Chambly has been captured. The fort lies only a few miles east of Montreal. A great victory that Schuyler and Major General Richard Montgomery seek to capitalize on, pushing for Montreal and then Quebec City.

Disagreement Delays Appointment

Mattapoisett Select Board Mattapoisett Board of Health

Weeks of delays in achieving quorums necessary to hold a joint meeting of the Mattapoisett Select Board and Mattapoisett Board of Health ended when, on October 30, the boards came together. They met to ostensively make a final decision on who would temporarily fill the vacant seat on the Board of Health. A seat became vacant when Alexandra Nicolosi was compelled to resign due to her relocation to another town.

As has been the custom, when an elected seat of this board is vacated, the Select Board makes a temporary appointment after conferring with the remaining members of the Board of Health and accepting letters of interest from the public.

When the boards attempted to meet, the Board of Health failed to produce a quorum. There was some discussion about Douglas Schneider and Kathleen Eckland, the two residents who had expressed written interest in temporarily filling the seat.

Long-time Board of Health member and Chairman Carmello Nicolosi declined voting on a replacement and instead said, "take it to the ballot." He said he wanted to have the slot voted on rather than a temporary appointment being made.

Board of Health member Michelle Bernier wanted to discuss the choices, but Select Board Chairman Tyler McAllister said that was not the point of the meeting;

that discussion had previously taken place, and they were moving on to pick between Eckland and Schneider. Bernier said that discussion had not taken place. But with Nicolosi declining to vote, opting instead to put it on a ballot, an impasse ensued.

In a follow-up with Town Administrator Mike Lorenco, he said that the Select Board could call for a special election, but that no decision had been made.

\$1,000,000 Shaved off Fire Station

Rochester Select Board

The former Country Fair Grounds on Pine Street became the focus of two important issues at the Rochester Select Board meeting on Monday.

Town Administrator Cameron Durant gave the Finance Committee an update on the plans for the new fire station proposed for 65 Pine Street that included news of an approximate \$1,000,000 projected cost reduction. He said a cost estimate of \$20,500,000 in the initial design rendering stage has been shaved down to \$19,500,000 by eliminating parts of the design.

An elevator has been deleted from the plan on the assumption fire fighters physically fit to rescue fire victims will not need ADA compatibility per state exemption. The cost to purchase the equipment the current station already has, such as washers suitable for cleaning and detoxifying turnout gear, has also been eliminated. More savings will

be realized by downgrading from curbing to Cape Cod berm.

Durant added, however, that additional engineering costs will come in the next step of the plan, the formal design phase. The next step will be the Public Safety Building Committee holding public hearings on the design, he said. The public's input will be pulled into the final proposal that will go to a spring or fall Town Meeting. There, residents will be asked to approve funds for a formal design contractor.

Finance Committee members' questions focused on where more savings could be found. One FinCom member asked if solar panels could be part of the design. Select Board Chair Adam Murphy said the town



does not have all the design and engineering details. That is for the next step, Murphy said. Another FinCom member asked if the costs for equipment and furniture are part the estimate. Murphy said all soft costs are built in.

Also that evening, Durant announced New England Rodeo wants a license to continue its use of the former 18.6-acre Country Fair grounds at 65 Pine Street in 2026. He said the rodeos that the Pine Street property hosted from June to October of this year were very successful. The town earned a revenue of \$41,000 from the events this year. New England Rodeo wants to hold more rodeos than last year, Durant said. In 2025, the company held an average of two events per month. He said he is negotiating a new licensing agreement with the organization and will bring the results of that to a public hearing before there is formal approval.

The board's next big agenda item was hearing an update from Old Colony Regional Vocational-Technical High School officials on the \$288,900,000 plan to construct a new state-of-the-art facility on the North Avenue campus that could require a debt exclusion override to fund. Murphy asked for more data on how a new school will add to Old Colony's operational costs and the town's part of the Old Colony budget. Old Colony representatives answered it will cost the five-member district (Acushnet, Carver, Lakeville, Mattapoisett, and Rochester) \$5,000,000 more between now and 2033. School Business Manager Sarah Griffith was quick to add that a

lot of assumptions are being made with these calculations projected into a long-range future.

The Massachusetts School Building Authority's reimbursement for the new school's price tag is projected to be \$129,000,000. But the share of the remaining costs among district members is approximately \$160,000,000, to be assessed according to each town's annual student enrollment. As a result, in Rochester, two warrants will be up for a vote at the November 18 Special Town Election that will also be held on a district-wide basis. One warrant will ask all district voters to approve the new building plan. The other will be the town's question seeking approval of a debt-exclusion override to fund its share of the new construction.

In other action, the board appointed Daniel Girard as a new full-time Rochester Police Department patrol officer, as recommended by Police Chief Michael Assad, Jr. "I had the distinct honor of directly supervising then-Detective Girard during my previous tenure as detective sergeant with the Mashpee Police Department, and I can personally attest to his professionalism, integrity and unwavering commitment to excellence," Assad said when introducing Girard to the board.

The board approved a new Verizon New England utility pole on the west side of Vaughn Hill Road.

The board designated grant writer Marcia Kessler as a special employee for the town; she is also on the Board of Assessors.

Town Concerned over Lack of Up-Front Money

Marion Planning Board

The Marion Planning Board met on Monday for a list of action items that also included preparations and scheduling for 2026.

The meeting began with confirmation of the 2026 Planning Board meeting schedule, available on the town website: www.marionma.gov/783/Meeting-Schedule. "My mind doesn't work that far in advance, so I'm going to say it looks good to me," Chair Andrew Daniel joked. The schedule was confirmed with a unanimous vote.

Next was the continued Public Hearing on the Site Plan and Special Permit for the Toll Brothers property at 78 Wareham Road. Daniel began by commending the representatives from Toll Brothers on sending revised plans with little notice following a discussion with engineers. "I don't think I've ever seen that on the Planning Board," Daniel added. Jeff Heidelberg, representing the Toll Brothers, accepted the thanks from the chair. Heidelberg and a representative from Crossman Engineering went through the revised plans and presented CAD files and drawings. Most of them initially spoke on changes revolved around water piping, sewage, and fire hydrant conformity.

The representative detailed the customizability of the proposed properties, saying the houses should be sold before they are completed, allowing the new owners to pick certain colors and materials before completion.

After much discussion on the new plans, Chair Daniel stated, "obviously we have to send this to (Town) Counsel, and we have to ask him some questions." He stated additional changes will be necessary following that process. Daniel was also concerned over the lack of money to the town upfront, saying it leaves the town "a little bit unprotected." He noted that Toll Brothers had not



fully closed on the purchase of the property at this stage. Daniel stated further discussion is necessary before the next meeting. The Public Hearing was continued.

The next meeting of the Marion Planning Board will be Monday, November 17 at 7:00 pm in the Marion Police Department Conference Room.

BBC Gets Green Light to Restore Bog

Rochester Conservation Commission


Rochester's Conservation Commission Tuesday approved the Buzzards Bay Coalition's Notice of Intent proposal to ecologically restore a former 240-acre cranberry bog at 0 Walnut Plain Road by issuing the plan a positive Order of Conditions with special conditions.

The plan here includes removal of berms, culverts and irrigation lines, and filling and re-grading bog surfaces and ditches to the goal of creating "recreational improvements" and returning the land to its natural state. BBC Project Representative Sarah Gonsalves said the independent peer review of the plan has been completed and no significant concerns were raised. "We are taking the property back to its natural state and hydrology," she said. Project Engineer Alex Patterson elaborated that the peer review's comments were only on minor details of design. "No significant issues," he said.

Conservation Commission member Michael Gifford noted his take on the comments was that they were asking BBC whether the plan would make the property better or worse. "Their consensus seemed to be it will be an improvement of the habitat there," Patterson countered. "Trees will grow in their natural condition."

Before the approval vote, Russell and Wendy Keeler of Walnut Plain Road and the Rochester Land Trust praised the plan. "I am grateful they (the BBC) are coming to town," said Russell Keeler. The special Order of Conditions the board set for its approval include requiring a notice of the start of work and the commission to be continuously notified as each phase of the project begins.

In other action, the commission judged a plan to construct a 25x40-foot metal building at 15 Wolf

Island Road that will sit partially within the 100-foot wetlands buffer zone as not needing wetlands-protection permitting. The board did so by issuing it a Negative Determination of Applicability but with conditions including the installation of silt barriers at the wetlands' edge.

The board issued a Certificate of Compliance for the construction of a single-family home with attached garage and driveway at 527 High Street, work that occurred within the 100-foot wetlands buffer zone and an existing cranberry bog. This vote came after Conservation Agent Merilee Kelly reported successful completion of the new home and lawn.

SMEC Clarifies Finances

Marion School Committee

The Marion School Committee met on Thursday, October 30 for a brief meeting. Chair April Nye began the meeting by greeting, via Zoom, Superintendent of Schools Mike Nelson and Assistant to the Superintendent and the



School Committee Melissa Wilcox.

Superintendent Nelson invited Catherine Cooper, executive director of the Southeastern Massachusetts Educational Collaborative (SMEC), to speak regarding her proposed amendment to the SMEC Capital Reserve Account. The amendment would primarily be that of a language change, with Cooper saying, "The purpose of this amendment – is pretty much just clarification language, making it more clear." Another change would be to increase the maximum potential balance in the account. She asserted this was not a request for more funds, but a grammatical clarification and increase of the stated maximum dollar amount. The current maximum is \$500,000 with the increase pushing it to \$2,000,000.

"We do not have anywhere near that amount of money," she added. SMEC is looking for state funding and would need the increased maximum to have a place to put the money, if awarded. The account was established in 2015 and was previously amended in 2019, with this being the second amendment.

The committee unanimously approved the proposition, though SMEC still needs approval from other school committees it serves.

Next, Doctor Leslie J. Sattler, associate professor at the School of Social Work at Bridgewater State University, presented her plan to conduct research examining the effectiveness of comfort dogs, namely being the Plymouth County Comfort Dogs Program dog Norman with his handler Marion Police Officer Jonathan Tracy. The superintendent spoke of his and the administration's support for the program, though he said Sattler wasn't available at the time of the meeting. Regardless, the research proposition was approved unanimously by the committee.

Next, the committee approved various donations: \$1,000 from the Ludes Family Foundation for Project Grow, from eight to 10 "Thankful Boxes" from the First Congressional Church of Rochester with food items for families during Thanksgiving, two to three Thanksgiving dinners for Sippican families from Girl Scout Troop 67041 of Marion, 18-20 holiday wish-list gifts for Sippican families from the Friends of Jack Foundation, and four books in memory of Leslye Ribeiro from Sue Bender and other retired teachers. All donations were accepted with a unanimous vote of approval and much thanks.

The next meeting of the Marion School Committee is scheduled for Thursday, December 11, at Sippican Elementary School. The next Joint School Committee meeting will be held on Thursday, January 29, in the ORR Junior High School Media Room.



the outstanding experience of teaching at Old Rochester Regional High School for 25 years. Working together with students – and sometimes with their families – in the community I live in was a privilege.

Over the years, I saw how often a student's biggest challenge wasn't in the classroom, but at home: when the oil tank ran low, when a parent lost work, or when a child needed new glasses their family couldn't afford. Those needs, when unmet, make it hard for any student to thrive.

In 2010, my family and I started William's Fund, named after my father, to quietly and quickly help students and families in moments of crisis. Growing up on the Cape in the sixties, I learned that neighbors look





MOVIE REVIEW



Barely Alive

Frankenstein. Starring Oscar Isaac and Jacob Elordi. Directed by Guillermo del Toro. Running time: 149 minutes. MPAA rating: R. Now playing in select theaters; streaming on Netflix starting November 7.

There are many sexy Draculas, but not nearly as many sexy Frankenstein's monsters. There's Michael Sarrazin in *Frankenstein: The True Story* (before he starts to rot), and perhaps Srdjan Zelenovic in *Flesh for Frankenstein*, and that's about it ... until Jacob Elordi in Guillermo del Toro's disappointing new *Frankenstein*. Elordi stands 6'5" and is physically right for the Creature, and he gives a performance rich in rage, incomprehension, wonder, innocence and loss of same. But his make-up as the Creature doesn't disfigure him; it makes him look like a fan-favorite character on a *Star Trek* show, and when the Creature grows long dark hair he's like a rock star in his enormous cloak and hood.

Del Toro runs hot and cold with me, and his *Frankenstein* is, sadly but decidedly, cold. It's full of senseless changes to Mary Shelley's story, which would be all right if they worked to make a distinct and excellent vision. But a lot of the movie feels scattered and incoherent, as if certain scenes and even entire plot points were shiny things del Toro had wanted for years to put on film and finally got the clout to do, whether or not the result is any good. And some of it is just second-rate and junky. If you're going to do a whole scene involving vicious wolves, you might want to make sure those digital wolves are convincing in motion, and when they're attacking equally awkward digital sheep the movie becomes depressing.

The basics are sort of still there. Victor Frankenstein (Oscar Isaac) still wants to defeat death and create life. He does, with the help of a moneybags arms manufacturer (Christoph Waltz) who just seems to be in the movie to explain where Victor gets the money for all his mad-scientist stuff. This character features in no other version of *Frankenstein*, certainly not Shelley's. (Hell, Mary's husband Percy is given more respect when the Creature reads aloud from "Ozymandias.") Yes, this was always what *Frankenstein* needed — a subplot that makes obvious points about merchants of death bankrolling scientific "advance." Waltz looks faintly bored, as if he too never figured out why his character exists.



Then there's Elizabeth (Mia Goth), whose identity never seems to stay the same from *Frankenstein* to *Frankenstein*. In the Kenneth Branagh version, for instance, she was Victor's adoptive sister but was engaged to him anyway. Here she's the Waltz character's niece, who is engaged to Victor's younger brother William. Mia Goth's appeal for many horror fans continues to elude me, and her Elizabeth is around to flirt briefly with Victor, read about insects, and take pity on the Creature, whose gift of a leaf she embraces to her bosom for ever. The gothically inclined who love doomed dark romance may appreciate this *Frankenstein*, and I wish I could join them. I wish it worked for me.

Instead, it comes off as cluttered with half-baked ideas and some downright cheese. When the Creature has to escape the burning castle, he slides down a long run-off gutter just ahead of a fireball. It's the sort of thing you'd expect to see in one of the later *Die Hard* sequels. The Creature is also big on throwing people into walls or into campfires, which is kind of funny until it gets tired. Meanwhile, Victor gets thrown into a rock by an explosion (so much fire in this thing), breaking his leg clean off, so that he has to stomp around on a 19th-century prosthetic. Why? Maybe for that obsessive Ahab vibe. Past a certain point I just tossed up my hands and stopped expecting the movie to make any internal or external sense.

Something about *Frankenstein* has defeated many a fine filmmaker. Branagh's attempt was terrible, and del Toro's isn't much better. Some Canadian producers wanted body-horror master David Cronenberg to make a version back in the early '80s; he was sensible enough to realize he'd been making his *Frankenstein* all along, and passed on the idea. Del Toro has been making his *Frankenstein* for over 30 years now, and that might be part of why an actual *Frankenstein* with his name on it feels been-theredone-that.





From the Files of the **Rochester Historical Society** By Connie Eshbach

Recently there was mention of early talk of separation between the town of Rochester and the Mattapoisett section of town. The 1736 organization of the second precinct was about the creation of a Second Church of Rochester and had no change in the governmental structure of the town. However, at this period of history very little of Rochester's infrastructure was carved in stone.

It's interesting how much was fluid in the early Rochester area. Road names came and went with both names and boundary changes that would confound many cartographers. A lot of the descriptions of new

roads being created relied on the property under a specific owner's name. Also, deeds and roads often relied on impermanent markers, such as trees, stones, and small streams.

Some of those streams seem to have come and gone.

In 1699, it was "voted that the meetinghouse shall be sit on the westerly sid of the long Bridg". This has puzzled many looking back at old Rochester as it has not seemed possible that there was any "long Bridg" in the center of Rochester. Additional study has determined that there was a trout brook behind houses which are today on Rte. 105. Possibly, there could have been a bridge in that area. While that area may have been wet enough to need a bridge, by the 1800's, the land was dry and arable.

Even the town of Rochester went from being in Barnstable County to Plymouth County without moving at all. Most know the story of the homeowner who lived in three towns without moving from his house. Mr. Abiel Robinson petitioned the state in 1826 to change the Rochester town line from being in Rochester, Plymouth County to Fairhaven, Bristol County. His reasons for the move were based on the fact that he worked at the Registry of Deeds in Bristol County, sold real estate there and the schools were less crowded. Amazingly, the set off was granted. Then, in 1860, the town of Fairhaven was divided with Acushnet being set off which then placed his house in Acushnet.

When the towns of Marion and then Mattapoisett separated from Rochester, changes to boundaries and street names were made. While many were happy with the changes, there was one Rochester resident who was adamantly against any change. Capt. David Lewis was Captain of a small sloop and a man well thought of in his community. At the bequest of his "fellow townsmen" he took charge of the town's "poor farm". He moved into 269 Marion Rd. (the last house before Marion) and ran the poor farm for four years. After that, he was the agent for the poor and at one time he was the Town Clerk.

In 1850, Capt. Lewis was appointed to a committee formed to consider Marion's separation from Rochester. He was strongly opposed to the idea of separation and though he lived closest to what would be the new town line, he was reported as saying, "I was born in Rochester and in Rochester, I mean to live and die."
