Bulbs: A Fantasy Come True

The Seaside Gardener

This afternoon with a tiny window of light left on



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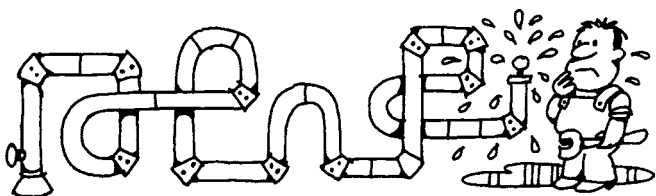
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this November day, I managed to install my second round of bulbs – something that feels like a huge achievement as the workweek and other commitments compete for my time. And you never know how the weather will be on the weekend.

I adore planting bulbs, but as I noted here a few weeks ago, I hold off planting them because I pretty much want the ground to seal over and harden as soon as I install them, so the pesky squirrels won't dig them up. It's a strategy I hold fast to. I used to actually fasten old screens over the area where I'd planted and also shook red pepper around the bulb installation as a deterrent. Not the most efficient system, admittedly. Now, I simply hold off until mid to late November.

I'd nearly forgotten about ordering bulbs this year but had saved my copy of John Scheepers catalog: *Beauty From Bulbs/The Art & Soul of Spring*. The Connecticut-based company has long been my go-to for bulbs, and I can't resist ogling their color photos, *oohing* and *ahhing* every page.

I would go so far as to say that bulb catalogs are the gardener's version of Sports Illustrated's annual swimsuit edition. I've long since given up trying to be thin or gutsy enough to wear the gear from the latter. I'd rather be outfitting my garden with fritillaria than myself with pieces that have the feel and resilience of Clingwrap. It's not so much an acquiescence to middle age as it is a preference for the practical. Bulbs are accessible, inexpensive, attractive and diverse and last many seasons.

When it comes to popularity, nothing tops the tulip. They were once so coveted that \$25,000 was paid for a single bulb. I'm referring to the episode of Tulipmania that gripped 17th-century Holland! Between 1634 and 1637, a major financial phenomenon resulted from the frenzy created over the tulip, something that would never be repeated on such a scale in the horticultural world.

While tulips are typically my main interest when I shop bulbs, (Scheepers has 29 pages of them) daffodils (represented in equal numbers) are surely second. There are so many types, it's almost exhausting to search through them all. Whatever hue and size you desire, you will find it here. Before being swept away, I urge

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you to try to think of specific sections of the garden and the color you would like to see come next spring. What perennials will be in bloom? Do you want it to be an informal, natural-looking garden or a statement about color? When in the spring season do you want it to bloom (early, middle or late), and what can you do to disguise the withering foliage once the blooms have passed.

Tulips often require replanting each year, except in the case of species tulips. So, it was natural that this was the bulb that most filled my cart. I have a raised bed off of our back deck, and it is dazzling to have it brimming with all sorts of colors and shapes of tulips. You might not want to plant a border in the same manner, but this is largely for cutting so I don't need a uniform design

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here. Quite the other extreme.

I have to confess I'm wild about Parrot tulips with their exotic, fringed plumage and cutting-edge striations. I ordered a batch of "La Courtine" which sports bright golden-yellow with narrow scarlet stripes alongside exterior green feathering and ruffled edges. So reminiscent of our little green and yellow parakeet "Betty White" (our pet sitter Charlotte deserves credit for naming her and her mate "Gainsborough" for his Little Blue Boy color). Along with these, I also purchased the "Parrot Tulip Mixture" to plant in the same area.

My other favorite kind of tulip is the Rembrandt reminiscent of the 17th-century Tulipmania varieties, but they were out of stock by the time I placed my order. I did

secure a batch of Emperor tulips which come from a wild species from Central Asia. My choice "Flames Mystery" will add a bright red color to our patio area next April, and with a little luck they will naturalize.

The tulips still await planting, but I did put in a number of bulbs thus far including the recent narcissus "Silver Chimes" that promise eight flowers per stem with a silvery white perianth and a soft primrose-yellow cup that pales as it matures. I installed them between the prostrate juniper that serves as a base to our Elizabeth Magnolia. A few years back I'd put miniature bulbs here where they continue to be, but I realized they didn't really show well (too diminutive), so I'm hoping these Narcissi will work and also jibe well with the soft yellow blossoms of the tree.

One never really knows exactly how your canvas will look when they emerge in spring, but I try to envision the picture I'm trying to create. I added more Spanish



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bluebells to a section of the woodland garden, under an ailing rhododendron and a handful of erythronium commonly called dog's tooth violet or trout lily. To give a natural look, I placed them between an old decaying stump and a standard hydrangea "Pinky Winky."

Another bulb (actually a tuber) that I am testing this year is winter Aconite, one of the earliest spring bloomers. This 1892 naturalizer yields vivid, lemon-yellow flowers that hungry bees need to thrive after their long winter hibernation. They are also deer and rodent resistant. I planted them for a splash of color near our little fishpond. And finally, though I have many snowdrops along the front wall that have spread over the years, I was intrigued by the "nivalis Flore Pleno" or

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double snowdrop. This will go in a side bed where the light is filtered, and the soil retains a bit of moisture and only a few spring blooms reside.

The act of planting bulbs is part mechanical – using the t-handled bulb planter to open the soil and then placing the bulb the required number of inches deep and then tenderly yet firmly covering the opening. But it also has a mental component: sparking daydreams of creating a living masterpiece – much like the gardens Claude Monet meticulously cultivated at Giverny, designed specifically to inspire his paintings. Channeling my inner Monet, I can only hope my own garden will offer some art-worthy brushstrokes of its own.

‘Hi-Viz’ Vests Available in Marion

Marion: Be Seen, Be Safe

A new initiative has just been launched in Marion. In an effort to increase pedestrian safety, free “hi-viz” (high-visibility) vests are now available, with proof of Marion residency. Being dispersed from the Marion Town Hall Annex, 14 Barnabas Road, the vests are available on a first-come, first-served basis.

You can get the vests from the building’s greeters from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm, Monday through Friday. The event is sponsored by the Marion Board of Health. Vice-Chair Edward P. Hoffer, MD, told The Wanderer the program has begun, and residents can now come, at times cited, to pick up



their vests. Hoffer said the town ordered about 100 adult vests and 50 child-sized at the current time. He mentioned that, since they were ordered from Amazon, if more are needed, it's easy to order more.

He said this "grew out of an experience I had a couple weeks ago. It was around 7:00 pm; I almost hit someone with dark clothing walking a dark dog." To increase public safety and their visibility, the "cart full of vests" is currently at the Annex. Hoffer added, when referring to dark clothing, "you may be visible inside, in the light, but you're not visible outside." As anyone who has driven around town at night, that's fairly self-evident, especially with Tabor Academy students out and about.

So far, only a couple of people have reached out to pick up vests, but the Board of Health and Town Hall Annex are ready to go, and excited to see how the initiative performs.

Using AI for Health Information

What Does The Doctor Say?

Health information has always been one of the top reasons people turn to the Internet. "Dr. Google" has helped answer many questions, though the fact that savvy programmers could ensure high placement and that sponsored sites got preferred placement meant that the results were sometimes suspect.

Facebook has also become where too many people

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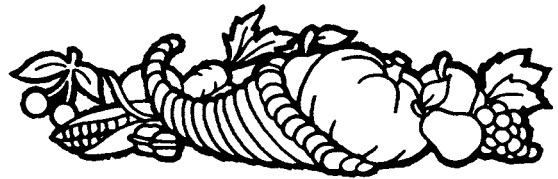
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get health information, even though misinformation about many subjects exceeds valid information. Just because someone says something loudly does not make it true.

Another terrible place to get health information is from "influencers" on TikTok or Instagram, most of whom are paid to push a product or service.

I have long advocated that seekers after valid health information turn to trusted sites maintained by non-profits or major health systems.

For information about vaccines, Google "Vaccine Information Center," a site maintained by The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. For female health issues, go to ACOG.org and click on For Patients (this is the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology). For children's

health, go to Healthychildren.org, a site maintained by the American Academy of Pediatrics. For general health questions, there is a wealth of good material at clevelandclinic.org under the Health Library tab.

The newest way to get help with health-related questions is to use one of the Large Language Model (LLM) "chatbots," such as Gemini, Claude or ChatGPT, and use of these programs has exploded. Health questions are among the top inquiries they handle.

Before getting into specific suggestions, it is crucial to remind you that these programs do not think – they apply statistical methods to generate relevant text in response to queries. You can think of them as "autocorrect on steroids." Just as your phone or email program usually anticipates what you are going to say and advance types it, LLMs generally give helpful responses. They also can be wildly off-base, having no "common sense" to check their replies.

If you are asking a chatbot for advice, be as specific as possible. The more detail you give them, the better their response. Don't say "I have a cough. What could it be?" Say: "I am a healthy 32-year-old with 3 days of a dry cough, a mild sore throat and a fever of 99 to 100."

Ask the bot what more it wants to know. A follow-up to its initial response should be "what else do you want to ask me to help answer my question?"

Remember that chatbots want to please. They will always give you an answer, even if they must invent something. So-called "hallucinations" are a very real phenomenon.

They will also appear confident in their responses when they should not be – if something appears odd, ask them for the source of their information – and check that source.

Do not rely solely on an LLM. They are best used as the start of a health information search, not the end. They can prime you for what to ask your doctor and can give you alternatives to consider.

Chatbots are great at retrieving information, but they are not health professionals and they do not know anything about you beyond what you tell them.

Montgomery Captures Montreal

This Week in Revolutionary History

This week in Revolutionary War history, let's check up on what was going on 250 years ago in and around the colonial Province of Massachusetts Bay. Last week, Washington had to curb the anti-Catholic celebrations inherent to Guy Fawkes Day. This was primarily to not alienate the Catholic Quebecois, for whom Washington hoped to win the favor of on the battlefield. In Canada, the Continental Army moved closer to Montreal, capturing Fort Saint-Jean. Even with that victory, Colonel Benedict Arnold's column faces severe supply shortages and abandonment. The British appeals to those enslaved also began, with thousands fleeing their brutal plantations to take up the ranks in the British Army. Finally, the Continental Congress had voted on and approved another mission into Canada. This time, to send a seaborne assault with marine divisions to capture Nova Scotia.

On November 12, 1775, Washington issues his General Orders from Cambridge and in them, details various actions required by new recruits, primarily focused on the incoming winter. He says those enlisting will need to furnish their own weapons, although uniforms and blankets will be provided. He does say, "Two dollars will be allowed to each non-commissioned officer, and soldier, who provides himself with a good blanket," a nice incentive to supply for yourself even more.

Much of the orders regard the enlistment, or re-enlistment, soldiers, with Washington adding, "The officers are to be careful not to enlist any person, suspected of being unfriendly to the liberties of America, or any abandoned vagabond to whom all causes and countries are equal and alike indifferent - The rights of mankind and the freedom of America will have numbers sufficient to support them, without resorting to such wretched assistance - Let those who wish to put



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shackles upon freeman fill their ranks." Ironically and unfortunately, Washington explicitly outlaws Africans or those "unfit to endure the fatigues of the campaign" from enlisting, a sharp contrast to the British who are rally support among the enslaved. At the time, there were around half-a-million enslaved people in the Thirteen Colonies. The total population of the colonies was around 2.5 million.

On November 13, Washington hears from Colonel Benedict Arnold. "The wind has been so high these three nights that I have not been able to cross the river" says Arnold, writing from Pointe de Lévy, just across the Saint Lawrence River from Quebec City. That same day, Brigadier General Richard Montgomery crosses the Saint

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Charles and arrives on Pointe-Saint-Charles, an island of Montreal. The garrison and people of Montreal surrender without much of a fight, welcoming Montgomery.

The next day, Washington's General Orders are jubilant, declaring "This moment a confirmation is arrived, of the glorious success of the Continental Arms, in the reduction, and surrender, of the Fortress of St Johns." He has not yet been notified of Montreal. He continues, "The Commander in Chief is confident, the army under his immediate direction, will shew their gratitude to Providence, for thus favoring the cause of freedom and America."

On November 16, Washington gives his instructions to Colonel Henry Knox for what will become a legendary expedition. He writes, "You are immediately to examine into the state of the artillery of this army & take an account of the cannon, mortars, shells, lead & ammunition that are wanting; When you have done that, you are to proceed in the most expeditious manner to New York." Knox is to travel to New York City and then head north to Ticonderoga or further to gather captured artillery and armaments for Washington's use. "After you have procured as many of these Necessaries as you can there, you must go to Major General Schuyler & Get the remainder from Ticonderoga, Crown point, or St Johns - If it should be necessary, from Quebec, if in our hands - the want of them is so great, that no trouble or expense must be spared to obtain them." Thus began the "Knox

Expedition," otherwise known as the "noble train of artillery."

On November 17, Washington writes to Major General Artemas Ward, also stationed in the area, with another warning with the dropping temperatures. He writes, "As the season is fast approaching when the bay between us and Boston will, in all probability be close shut up, thereby rendering any movement upon the ice as easy as if no water was there." If the Charles River is the freeze, either General William Howe will be able to flee the city or receive reinforcements for the British garrison. Washington is further pushing the idea of a pre-winter offensive, though is still unsure of the exact methods.

Andrew Daniel's Petition

Marion will hold its Fall Town Meeting this Monday, November 24 at 6:45 pm in the Sippican School Multipurpose Room. Andrew Daniel, resident and Planning Board Chair, filed a Citizen's Petition regarding the separation of water and sewer meters. Leading up to the vote, Daniel spoke to The Wanderer regarding the reasoning for his petition, his drive for filing it, as well as the support he's garnered in doing so.

"This started because I was doing a project for my house," he started, after being asked of the origin of the filing. In doing the work, he said "Man, I'm spending a fortune in sewer fees." I asked of the importance of his initiative, and the timing of it. He referred to the town's past, saying, "they've talked about the second meter as long as I've been in town - the timing was kinda perfect." He continued, "As you start researching, most towns have the ability to split. I noticed Fairhaven, Wareham, Mattapoisett, they had votes similar to this one." He later continued, "It's the fair and the right thing to do. I've heard it again and again from the other towns. The other towns saw a small increase in water and a decrease in sewers. I don't think you should be a millionaire to take pride in your property, or water your lawn or wash your car.

I asked how the public perception has been and whether he has largely heard support or detraction. "I started meeting with people, I heard some sad stories. They had to stop taking care of their outside because they couldn't afford it," he responded. For a Citizen's Petition, the document needs 100 signatures to be brought forward at Fall Town Meeting. Daniel collected those the final day applications were open, September 18. "I thought there was no way I'd get 100 signatures by the end of the night. I got 120 within like 6 hours." He said he has gotten support from many residents since filing the petition on the final open-day. "I've learned a lot," he finished.

He referenced issues and discrepancies he's detected in town, saying "A lot of people have put in well. If you're driving around and see a really nice lawn, odds are, it's a well. They're expensive and a gamble," he said, referring to the unknown water quality of well-drilling.

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I referred to the Select Board meeting from October, where Daniel and the board argued over the petition and the Select Board presenting arguments against, cautioning against strikes to the town's budget. He said, "the Select Board agree, but they're worried about the financial impact, which I understand." He finished on budgetary concerns, saying "But it's all a guess."

For his final comments on the petition, Daniel said, "It would be allowing people the opportunity to have a choice. Now they have no choice." He then stated, should the petition not pass, "At the very least, I got the conversation started." He finished, "My intent wasn't to cause trouble. It's time for the rate-payers to get a small



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victory. Whenever there's a debt, the whole town gets a vote, but it's a small share paying the bill. Give them a choice. That's it. The premise of it is pretty hard to deny. It's not going to be a big money-saver to most people. But if I was allowed to put in a second meter, I would definitely take advantage of that. At least I know I'm paying for the services I'm getting."

Andrew Daniel's Citizen's Petition is to be Article 2 of the Fall Town Meeting. Article 1 is the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) bylaw, to align the town's regulations with those put forth by the Environmental Protection Agency. The MS4 Bylaw was largely worked on by the Planning Board, which Daniel is the Chair. "It's going to be the Andrew Daniel meeting at this point." He joked. "Hopefully we get a lot of people talking."

A "No" From Rochester

Rochester's Old Colony Vote

Rochester's election on November 18 seeking approval of both a \$288 million Old Colony Regional Vocational-Technical High School building project and a debt exclusion to fund the town's \$24 million share of that cost resulted in a resounding "No" to both questions.

The question to approve the building project, which was also on ballots in Old Colony's other member towns, Acushnet, Carver, Lakeville, and Mattapoisett,



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failed in Rochester with a tally of 680 voters saying "no" and 503 votes saying "yes."

The question on the town ballot to approve a Prop 2 1/2 debt exclusion for the expense garnered 682 "no" votes and 507 yes votes. Town Clerk Marjorie Barrows reported 1,192 ballots were cast in Rochester, a town that has 5,717 residents as of the 2020 census.

Now the school district awaits the final voter tallies from Acushnet, Carver, Lakeville, and Mattapoisett. That's what Old Colony School Committee member and Rochester resident David Hughes said he is waiting for. "The people of Rochester have spoken," Hughes said. "Now we'll see what the other towns will do to come to form a final conclusion."

The state School Building Authority's reimbursement for the new school's price tag was projected to be \$129 million. The remaining total cost that the school district members would share was estimated at approximately \$159 million. Rochester's share of that price tag would have been \$28.4 million. The debt exclusion would have cost \$646.86 per year for the average home assessed at \$610,000.

The money would have funded a larger, more modern building that replaces the serious infrastructure deficiencies of the current facility at 476 North Avenue, Rochester.



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Fall Town Meeting Warrant Review

Marion Select Board

The Marion Select Board met on Monday, November 17 in the Marion Music Hall for a list of action items, as well as the Fall Town Meeting Warrant Review.

The board began by recognizing Marions new firefighters. Fire Chief Brian Jackvony rose to speak, mentioning the five new recruit firefighters who recently, November 5, graduated from the Massachusetts Firefighting Academy. Chief Jackvony called the new volunteer firefighters up for a picture and recognition: Jonathan Brown, Johnathan Gurry (unable to attend), Kyle Proffitt, Nicholas Sheehan, and Jackson St. Don. With handshakes and pictures, the men were recognized for their hard work and dedication.

Next, Robbi Dunn Tracy's appointment as a Full Member of the Marion Affordable Housing Trust was approved.

Town Administrator Geoffrey Gorman then provided his updates, beginning with the new Department of Public Works building. He said the building is on schedule, although the air-to-water heat exchanger is not yet operational as it awaits a parts delivery. The building is heated, but the floor heater is what is affected.

For the Town House, Gorman said "it's looking great." He said the workers have started drywall, with

electrical and plumbing still being put in. The lift is still yet to be installed, though the hole in the ground is present with support beams being installed.

The Flags of Marion Project, proposed last month by local artist Mike Malone, then had an update. The town's legal counsel cautioned against putting flags in the middle of the street, and instead suggested flags on a crosswalk, or several crosswalks. That, or putting the flags in different locations on the street. Malone preferred the latter. Gorman then cited a letter from the Marion Historical Commission in opposition to any flags on the road in the town center. "Mike's ready for it, if you give a thumbs up," the Town Administrator added. To further discuss plans and locations, the board tabled discussion on flags until their December 16 meeting.

Following the board's action items, they then moved to the Fall Town Meeting Warrant Review with the Planning Board. First discussed was Article 1, or the MS4 Stormwater Management Bylaw. Chair of the Planning Board, Andrew Daniel, then read an executive summary of the proposed bylaw, saying:

"The town of Marion received a formal order of non-compliance from the United States Environmental Protecting Agency. The EPA [is] requiring the town to adopt a post-construction stormwater management bylaw no later than December 15, 2025. In order to meet the Federal Clean Water Act requirements, our Marion Subdivision Bylaw Chapter 300-4.6 addresses many aspects of the 2016 Municipal Separate Stormwater Sewer System (MS4) requirements. But they do not include land clearing outside of the subdivision development. This bylaw addresses that requirement. Passing this proposed bylaw at the Fall Town Meeting is a key step in meeting the compliance schedule set by the EPA and avoiding looming enforcement actions or penalties. The order specifically recognizes this Fall Town Meeting as the town's latest opportunity to adopt this needed bylaw.

If residents approve this bylaw, the Planning Board will hold public hearings starting in December for input on its associated regulations. For context, stormwater runoff from development can lead to flooding, road damage, water pollution, [and] costly fixes if not properly managed. Currently, our permit acknowledges two pollutants that impair our affected water bodies. This proposed storm water management bylaw provides a targeted way to protect public and private property and infrastructure; drinking water supplies; safeguard the health of our local wetlands, rivers, streams, coastal waters, while minimizing the burden on our residents. The bylaw minimizes those burdens [for those] who are required to obtain permits and only applies to larger projects that have a meaningful impact on the drainage and soils. It establishes a straightforward standard. Any land disturbance of one acre or more requires a storm water management permit issued by

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the Planning Board. The same requirement applies to smaller activities only if they are part of a larger development plan that will ultimately disturb one acre or more. This threshold aligns with the existing federal rules and focuses oversight on the most significant source of stormwater impacts. Typical residential property maintenance such as gardening, landscaping, lawn care, the installation of fences or driveways are not affected. Protects fully regulated under the Water Protection Act or site plan review may also qualify for streamline compliance when they demonstrate that the stormwater standards are fully met.

Under this bylaw, the Planning Board were to review plans before the work was to begin to ensure proper erosion control and storm water measurements are in place. The town would have the clear authority to inspect these work areas as it progresses and issue a Certificate of Compliance once final requirements are met and take action if runoff problems occur. This bylaw includes standard enforcement tools to address serious and ongoing violations if needed. This bylaw positions Marion to meet the federal MS4 requirements while supporting responsible growth, protecting neighborhoods and infrastructure, and maintaining clean and healthy water resources. It offers a balanced approach to modern, modern storm water protections where they matter most without creating new obligations for the average Marion resident."

Following the executive summary, Andrew Daniel said, "this has been on our plate for a while," highlighting the long progress of planning the MS4 Bylaw. "We came up with what we feel is the best, least intrusive way of doing this," he added. It was noted the EPA would also have to approve the regulation following a passing vote.

Next was Article 2, a Citizens' Petition filed by Andrew Daniel. Daniel read the summary of his petition:

"To see if the town will vote to authorize and direct the Marion Water Department to establish a policy permitting property owners to install at their own expense a secondary water meter for outdoor water use such as lawn irrigation, gardening, feeding of livestock, swimming pools, and other non-sewer activities. Policies shall include but not [be] limited to the following elements, permitting and inspections. The proper owner seeking to install a secondary meter shall hire a licensed plumber. The plumber shall pull a plumbing permit from the building department prior to installation. A Water Department technician shall meet with the plumber on-site before installation to review requirements and confirm proper placement. Following the installation, the Water Department technicians shall install and seal the secondary meter. It shall be the plumber's responsibility to ensure that all required final inspections are complete and initial installation fee shall be paid by the property owner to cover the meter costs. The labor and inspection annual billing for the secondary meter shall be issued separately from the PRI primary account once per year.

During the fall billing cycle, water rates for secondary meters shall be exactly the same as the rates for the first meter as set by the town of Marion Water Department, consistent with the town's water rate schedule and subject to adjustment by the Select Board. The



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Water Commissioner's sewer charges shall not be assessed on water consumption measured by the secondary meter administration and oversight. The Water Department shall maintain records of all properties with secondary meters. Fees may be adjusted periodically to affect meter size replacement labor and materials. The Water Department shall adopt and publish rules and regulations to administer the program."

Select Board Vice Chair John W. Hoagland cautioned against, arguing "whatever we lose in sewer revenues has to be made up." Saying sewer bills will likely rise.

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Tree Lighting Time Change

Rochester Select Board

Rochester's Select Board Monday did ordinary business until it came time to discuss the November 18 election asking the town to approve the \$288 million Old Colony Regional Vocational-Technical High School building project.

The Select Board began by voting against exercising its right to purchase Great Bear Farms, 53 Dexter Lane, which is currently changing ownership. Town Administrator Cameron Durant noted this property is not changing use, so acquiring it as a protective measure is unnecessary.

Durant reported that this year's Tree Lighting Ceremony at the Town Office Building will be on November 30 from 3:30 pm to 5:30 pm, a dramatically changed time from past years. The board approved a flammable liquids license for the propane tanks at the Water Department buildings at 87 Marion Road, 189 New Bedford Road and 52 Wolf Island Road.

The board then appointed Herbert LeFleur to the Historic Commission.

The board saved the most impactful for last. Chair Adam Murphy ended the meeting with what will happen whether or not the Old Colony Regional Vocational-

Technical High School building project is approved on November 18. He said there will be a lot of work to do either way.

Murphy said on that date the town needs the debt exclusion override vote on the town ballot to pass as well as the Old Colony district's (Acushnet, Carver, Lakeville, Mattapoisett, and Rochester) request to approve the \$288 million plan for a new school building. The town now takes \$500,000 from free cash nearly every year to balance its budgets, he emphasized. To fit another \$2.4 million, the project's cost to the town, into that budgeting without a debt exclusion "won't happen," he said.

Asked what the town will do if the school project is approved but the town does not approve the debt exclusion, the board declined to say that it would go directly to another debt exclusion ballot vote. The response will be some serious planning.

Durant noted the town's first major payment of this debt would be 2028. "We'll have some time to plan what we need to do," he said.

"We'll have a plan, and quickly," Member Brad Morse said.

"We'll have a lot of work to do either way," Murphy said.

The Board of Selectmen did not schedule its next meeting before adjourning.

Heron Cove Estates Joint-Meeting

Marion Zoning Board of Appeals

The November 13 joint Zoning Board of Appeals and Select Board meeting centered around whether the ZBA can grant a Variance for the Heron Cove Estates project off Route 6 near the Wareham line.

The project, which has been in the works for several years, once proposed 125 apartment units with around 20-percent affordable apartments, in accordance with the state Chapter 40B guidelines.

However, Steen Realty and Development Corporation has since modified the project. It is now proposing 57 town houses and is still debating as to whether to sell all at market value and pay more money to the town or mark approximately four below market value.

According to officials, Steen representatives have cited a financial hardship with the initial plan. They cited a large hill in that area, which would hike excavation costs, as well as the rising costs of building supplies.

Select Board members Randy Parker, John Hoagland, and Normal Hills all spoke in favor of the project.

The ZBA members were divided, however. Some members questioned if the ZBA could legally grant a variance, given that new plans call for lots much smaller than the average in Marion. Some ZBA members said that there may be less financial gain for the town, given how the project has been scaled down.

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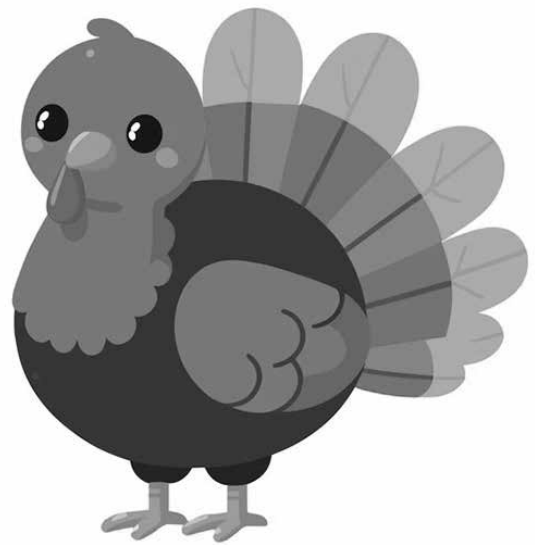
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They also questioned if the homes would put higher stress on town services, such as higher school enrollment, as well as more emergency calls, given that Steen is now proposing single-family homes.

Select Board Vice Chair John Hoagland said that the scaled-down version of the project will likely attract older people without families. He said the development would connect to the town's sewer and water, helping improve that infrastructure, as well as make road improvements in that area.

Hoagland also said that the development's close proximity to town businesses would be a boon to the local economy. He and other Select Board members said the developer has also promised around \$500,000 to the town in addition to tax revenue.

Member William Tiftt said because of the project's close proximity to Wareham, it might bring more business to that town instead.

Others questioned whether the project should trigger a Town Meeting vote in the form of a zoning change or a Planning Board review before the ZBA could act on it. Chair Cynthia Callow and Town Administrator Geoffrey Gorman stressed that the granting of a variance is well within the ZBA's jurisdiction, despite changes to the project.

The ZBA did not vote on the matter. The joint-session was designed for the ZBA to gather more facts about the changes and eventually decide if financial hardship should trigger the need for a variance approval.

In other ZBA news, the board granted three variances, one for the building of a pier, and two for home additions.

The next meeting of the Marion Zoning Board of Appeals was not scheduled at adjournment.

Motel Site Plan Review Continued

Mattapoissett Planning Board

The November 17 agenda of the Mattapoissett Planning Board listed a Site Plan Review as requested by the owners of the Hillside Motel, D.B.A, Krishi Kisan Corp. located at 92 County Road. The hearing, however,



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was continued to December 1 at the request of the applicant.

Initial plans for the site include an expansion of 24 rental units placed in two rows of 12. No action was taken as the continuance was granted.

The board heard from Dave Maddigan of Maddigan Land Surveying for property located at 0 Hereford Hill Road. The applicants, Robert and Maria Randall, requested an Approval Not Required decision to allow for the establishment of several lots for future development. Maddigan stated that the property does not contain jurisdictional wetlands and meets frontage requirements. The request was granted.

An operation and maintenance plan for a solar array located off 29 Randall Lane was also approved by the board.

Though listed on the agenda, the board did not take of the matter of a new bylaw for cottage style living units on this night. Further discussion will be scheduled as needed prior to public review.

The next meeting of the Mattapoisett Planning Board is scheduled for Monday, December 1 at 7:00 pm at Town Hall, 16 Main Street.

Two-Family Decision Delayed

Rochester Zoning Board of Appeals

Rochester's Zoning Board of Appeals struggled at

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its November 13 meeting over whether to approve a new, two-family home at 309 Neck Road, voting instead to seek Town Counsel's input on whether the variance being requested would be legal.

The plan here is to raze the single-family home there and create a single-story, two-family home in its place so resident Jennifer Jones can move her senior-citizen parents into the back section of the new construction. Jones is seeking a variance of frontage requirements for this plan. She said her parents need to move from their two-story home. She and her young daughter would occupy the front of the new home.

The board continued this hearing to its December 11 meeting after Building Commissioner Paul Boucher



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noted a variance of frontage requirements should not be allowed in this case. "You can't be granting a variance on frontage here," he said. "They should not be able to get a hardship approved. A two-family on that lot is not allowed." Boucher added that Jones should have gone for a special permit instead.

ZBA Chair Donald Spirlet said Jones has the area for the new home but not the frontage. He noted making it an accessory dwelling unit (ADU) would require it to be too small. The legal maximum size for an ADU in the bylaw and state law (by right) is 900 square feet. Counting all three floors, the projected size for the proposed, two-family house is 12,249 square feet.

Board member Richard Cutler motioned a continuance after noting Town Counsel's input was needed because a variance here may not even be legal. The full motion was to continue to December 11 to await receipt of certified plans and seek an opinion from counsel. Board Administrator Andreia Lacerda said the ZBA has two other public hearings on its agenda that night.

The next meeting of the Rochester Zoning Board of Appeals will be held on Thursday, December 11 at 7:00 pm at Town Hall, 1 Constitution Way.

Trust Eyes New Member and Website Revamp

Marion Affordable Housing Trust

The town's Affordable Housing Trust met on November 12 in the police station conference room and met with a potential new member with decades of relevant experience, and the trust talked about revamping its web site. MAFT also discussed logistics for special emergency lock boxes for elderly residences, as well as seeking grant opportunities for the MAFT's housing production plan.

Town resident Jennifer Newsom spoke with the trust and said she has worked with the state Department of Development Services for the past 25 years. She also has conducted housing subsidies-related work for the state for 37 years.

Trust members appeared impressed with her credentials but her potential appointment was not on the agenda, and it had not gone before the Select Board. Newsom sat in on the meeting.

If all goes well, Newsom will be named as an Associate Member of the trust.

Just like last meeting, the trust is looking for ways to revamp its website, so it is more consistent with the trust's purpose and goals.

At the last meeting, the trust was contemplating seeking an intern who could conduct such work, which would save money.

Norman Hills, the Select Board Representative on the MAHT, said he would follow up with the Town Administrator about the endeavor.

The trust tabled action on seeking funding and working through logistics for emergency lockboxes for seniors and other residents in need. These boxes are dubbed "Kox boxes" and have been a topic of discussion at the last few meetings.

MAFT members said that there are legal challenges, such as a deed restriction for anyone with these lock boxes. Such lock boxes would allow fire and emergency officials to break into a home in the case of an emergency.

MAFT members also discussed whether they should seek funding from the trust's account or seek community preservation funds for such a project.

MAFT members also referenced the town's



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housing production plan, which was last updated in 2022. MAFT members said they would like to seek grant opportunities toward realizing goals within the plan.

The Marion Affordable Housing Trust is scheduled to meet again Tuesday, December 9 in the Marion Police Department's conference room.

The Old Rochester Regional High School football team rebounded from a challenging start to the 2025 season by reeling off three midseason victories that propelled the Bulldogs into the MIAA Division 6 state tournament as the 13th seed, and on November 7 they stunned fourth-seeded Wilmington in six overtimes by a 47-39 score, a goal-line tackle stopping what would have set up a point-after to tie the game.

The Bulldogs' hopes for further playoff upsets ended in a 34-7 defeat against 9-1 Hudson, the fifth seed that on Saturday will play for a shot at the Super Bowl in the state semifinals against top-seeded Norwell. That game will kick off at 12:00 noon at Weston High School. The winner takes on the winner of Saturday's other Division 6 semifinal between neighboring Fairhaven and Bishop Fenwick. 'Codables' Unlock Reading Growth

ORR Tri-Town Education Foundation Fund

With additional funding in hand, Center School teacher Carolyn Pawlishen sought additional ways to engage and empower her second- and third-grade reading students. She wanted tools that would help them overcome challenges with phonics and build the



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foundational skills they need to become confident readers.

Based on a body of research known as the Science of Reading, Pawlishen considered multi-sensory learning boards, games, whisper phones, magnetic tiles and online-subscription-based computer programs for this project that she called “Empowering, Engaging, and Motivating Students with Learning Differences.”

But what she found most effective for the project – funded by a grant from the Old Rochester Regional Tri-Town Education Foundation Fund – was something called “decodables” – decodable text and books.

“My colleagues have asked how students were able to achieve such significant growth this school year,” Pawlishen said. “I shared that it was a combination of the new decodable materials purchased by the grant, paired with the small group routines I was coached in this past school year. The decodables play a vital role in the planning process for small group instruction.”

The Old Rochester Regional School District and Massachusetts Superintendency Union #55 are pleased to share the outcome of more than \$9,400 in private grants provided by the nonprofit Old Rochester Regional Tri-Town Education Foundation for the 2024-25 school year.

The Old Rochester Regional Tri-Town Education Foundation Fund is a growing endowment under the umbrella of the SouthCoast Community Foundation. Supported by community donors, the fund helps educators pursue innovative, high-quality learning experiences for students throughout Marion, Mattapoisett and Rochester.

This is the first in a series of articles describing the impact of grants awarded by the Tri-Town Education Foundation Fund to support innovative teaching and student enrichment across the Old Rochester Regional School District and Massachusetts Superintendency Union #55.

Pawlishen described the vision for her reading learning-enhancement project, and she applied to the Tri-Town Education Foundation Fund, which awarded her a \$2,000 grant for the reading initiative.

This came after two years of difficulties in getting second and third-grade students to their grade-level

benchmarks.

Pawlishen then teamed up with Center School teacher Deb Camacho to consider what specific grant-funded materials they could use to enhance small-group reading instruction, meeting the needs of diverse learners while keeping it a fun and engaging experience.

While she initially envisioned pupils conquering their greatest reading challenges partly through games, digital programs and audio tools, Pawlishen quickly realized how effective and fun “decodables” are for the students.

Decodable text and decodable books are specially written and designed to help beginning readers – and those with reading difficulties or dyslexia – to better practice and reinforce their phonics skills.

Decodable text is carefully constructed using words that follow specific phonetic patterns that the student has already been taught systematically as part of their reading curriculum. This allows the reader to “decode” words by recognizing those phonetic patterns, allowing them to better link letters to sound, rather than relying more on rote memorization of entire words.

Pawlishen then used the grant funding to purchase several sets of decodables: Pioneer Valley Books’ “Lifting Off,” Sets 1 and 2, along with Set 1 of “My Codables: Sally the Cow” and “My Codables: Bella and Rosie.”

The result: They were a hit with the students and proved effective.

By the end of the school year, all of Pawlishen’s third-grade students had reached or exceeded grade-level benchmarks. DIBELS data, which measures students’ performance on key reading skills, showed impressive growth for all students involved. The process has also given Pawlishen useful ideas for enhancing her reading instruction more broadly.

“Using these decodables provided more opportunities for practice of repeated readings, and they’re very engaging, resulting in students making great strides in their reading scores as well as growing a stronger love for reading,” Pawlishen said. “All of the knowledge I gained showed me other ways to engage and empower students to be strong readers.”

Early Childhood Coordinator Doreen Lopes celebrated the Tri-Town Education Foundation Fund grant’s support for specialized, joyful literacy instruction.

“This project reflects our commitment to making early literacy joyful, accessible, and tailored to the needs of each student,” Lopes said. “These materials allow teachers to nurture curiosity and confidence while strengthening foundational reading skills for all learners.”

Superintendent Nelson expressed appreciation for the Foundation’s support of innovative classroom work.

“We are deeply grateful to the Tri-Town Education Foundation for recognizing the value of targeted early literacy instruction,” Superintendent Nelson said. “This grant strengthens our educators’



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ability to meet students where they are and ensures that every child feels supported as they grow as readers. We hope that our community will continue to support the foundation with its fundraising efforts to help make more impactful projects like this one possible in the future."

ORRJHS community. Community members donate pies, turkeys, gift cards and door prizes.

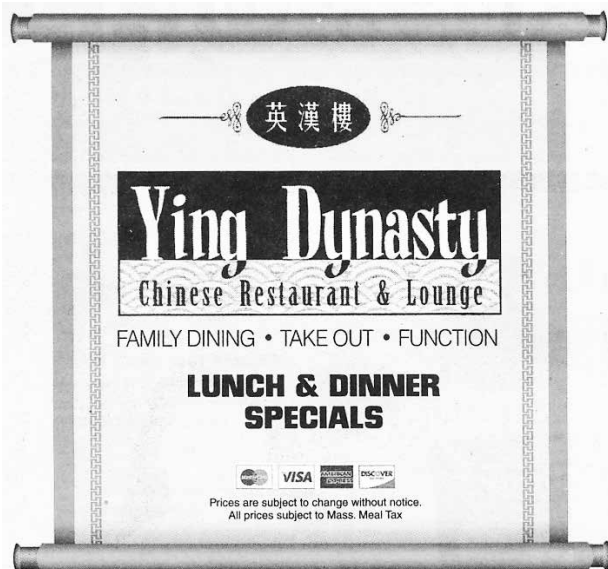

RMS Recognized by State for MCAS Scores

Superintendent Michael S. Nelson, Assistant Superintendent of Teaching and Learning Shari Fedorowicz, Principal Heidi Letendre and Rochester School Committee Chairperson Kate Duggan are proud to share that students at the Rochester Memorial School helped put their school among only 63 across the state to reach or exceed pre-pandemic levels for grades three through eight in the 2025 MCAS test for Math or English.

Rochester Memorial School was honored recently by the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) Commissioner Pedro Martinez for reaching or exceeding benchmarks last achieved in 2019 for MCAS testing in grades three through eight. The school was presented a certificate of recognition for the achievement.

About 54% of students at Rochester Memorial School scored a 500 or better on the 2025 MCAS for math, meaning they reached the state's "meeting expectations" results category. Among those are the 9% of Rochester Memorial School students who achieved a score of 530 or above, putting them in the category of "exceeding expectations."

This is all an improvement from the school's results in 2019, before the COVID-19 pandemic, when 52% of students scored at least 500.

Statewide, MCAS math scores for 2025 among students in grades 3 through 8 were down 8 percentage points from pre-pandemic 2019 scores. Also, MCAS math scores statewide in 2025 showed no improvement from 2024.

Meanwhile, MCAS math scores for 2025 among students in grades 3 through 8 at Rochester Memorial School were up 7 percentage points from the school's 2024 results, jumping from 47% of students "meeting" or "exceeding expectations" to 54%.

Fifth graders at Rochester Memorial School far surpassed statewide results for MCAS science testing, outpacing the state's "meeting" or "exceeding" achievement levels by 17 percentage points.

The fifth graders also improved their MCAS science scores from the previous year, with 60% of students achieving "meeting" or "exceeding" in 2025 compared to 59% in 2024. The 60% also represents a large improvement from 2019, when 49% of Rochester Memorial fifth graders scored "meeting" or "exceeding" on MCAS science tests.

As a result of the school's outstanding performance on the MCAS, the school district is being recognized for its accomplishments at DESE's "Celebrating Academic Success" conference scheduled for Dec. 2 in Marlborough. The event will offer an opportunity for educators representing the Rochester Memorial School to share best practices and strategies with their colleagues from around the state, explaining

how the school was able achieve pre-pandemic levels on MCAS for math from Grade 3-8.

Principal Letendre said she credits the school's success to the dedication of both students and staff, as well as the district's focus on consistent, data-driven instruction and targeted academic support.

"Our teachers have worked incredibly hard to identify students' individual needs and to help every child grow," said Principal Letendre. "This recognition reflects not only our students' perseverance and commitment to learning, but also the collaboration among educators, families, and support staff who ensure that all learners are given the opportunity to thrive."

Assistant Superintendent Fedorowicz said the results highlight the district's deliberate focus on high-quality instruction and timely academic interventions.

"Our team has placed a strong emphasis on using assessment data to help ensure that students receive the exact support they need, when they need it," said Assistant Superintendent Fedorowicz. "Seeing this level of growth affirms that our strategic team approach is making a meaningful difference for students."

School Committee Chairperson Duggan commended the teachers and students at Rochester Memorial, along with the administration, for helping to make this all possible.

"I am so impressed by the students and educators at Rochester Memorial who put in the hard work to earn such solid MCAS scores, as well as by the building and district administrators for fostering an environment where this level of achievement is possible," said School Committee Chairperson Duggan. "While all of these efforts were not made with statewide recognition in mind, it is gratifying to see our town's name listed as one of just a handful in this category of performance improvement. Given our school and district's recent adoption of new high-quality curricula in math and ELA, I look forward to building on this accomplishment and Rochester Memorial's reputation for excellence in the years to come."

Superintendent Nelson said the recognition demonstrates the strength of the district's instructional practices and its commitment to continuous improvement.

"This achievement is a testament to the strong teaching and learning happening every day at Rochester Memorial School," said Superintendent Nelson. "I am deeply proud of the students, educators and families who have worked together to reach this milestone, bringing this hard-working elementary school back to - and even beyond - pre-pandemic levels of success."

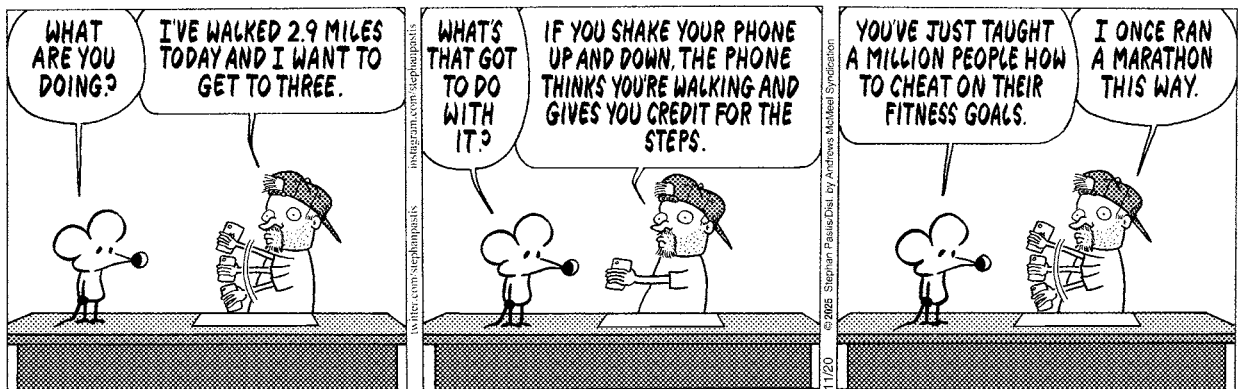

Dear Editor,

As our community in Marion rallies to support neighbors through food drives and donations to Damien's Food Pantry in Wareham, we are reminded that democracy is more than elections or party lines. It is a living moral agreement, a shared promise between citizens and the government they create. That promise, at its best, rests on three enduring duties: protection, sustenance, and lawful governance. The philosopher John Locke taught that government exists first to protect our basic rights, life, liberty, and property. When families face hunger or hardship, that duty extends beyond safety from harm to ensuring no one is left unseen or uncared for.

John Rawls, a modern philosopher of justice, expanded that idea. He argued that a fair democracy must also provide sustenance, not as charity but as fairness. Genuine freedom diminishes in significance when individuals lack access to essential resources such as food, healthcare, and opportunities for personal and professional development. When citizens step up, as Marion has, to support those whose SNAP benefits have been reduced, they help fulfill democracy's deeper moral promise: that everyone deserves dignity and a fair chance to thrive.

And John Dewey, the great American pragmatist, believed democracy is "a way of life." According to Dewey, effective governance relies on active participation, where individuals come together to learn, discuss, and work collectively for the common good. Every can of food, every act of giving, every civic conversation becomes part of that shared democratic education.

When we protect one another, sustain one another, and govern together, democracy ceases to be an abstract idea. It becomes something visible and alive, something we practice every day in Marion. By helping to feed our neighbors, we are not just meeting a need; we are keeping faith with the truest meaning of democracy itself.

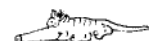

***The Running Man*. Starring Glen Powell and Josh Brolin. Directed by Edgar Wright. Running time: 133 minutes. MPAA rating: R. Now playing in theaters.**

It's good that the hero of *The Running Man* retains his anger. In Stephen King's source novel (published, like *The Long Walk*, under the pseudonym Richard Bachman), that hero, Ben Richards, has been ground down by the dystopian America that makes his existence miserable. He has been fired from more than one job for whistleblowing against the government's poisoning its people with radiation. Now he has to make some quick money to get meds for his sick infant daughter and get her and his wife out of their squalid circumstances. So he looks at the many government-sponsored "FreeVee" game shows that pay their contestants big chunks of "New Dollars." Ben settles on "The Running Man," the biggest game in town. If Ben can go on the run and survive for 30 days, he wins a fortune. If not, he gets killed by the Hunters pursuing him.

In the new movie adaptation, Glen Powell plays Ben as an intelligent but emotionally unmodulated man who's sick to his back teeth of the dog-eat-dog society he lives in. Powell makes Ben angry, yes, but also spirited and mordant. All of which makes him the perfect contestant for high ratings. Slickly directed by Edgar Wright (*Shaun of the Dead*), *The Running Man* is a fairly faithful treatment of King/Bachman's book, though it changes some things that didn't bother me. Right now we don't need the future-noir, everything-sucks vibe of King's denouement. We need rousing hope, though sadly the movie doesn't seem to have attracted the wide audience it needs to make the impact it possibly wants to make. Maybe, like a lot of Wright's films, it will do its most effective work as a cult movie.

There's a genuinely amazing escape sequence featuring Michael Cera as a tech-geek radical who helps Ben, and there are several others like it. *The Running Man* veers close to hypocrisy by exciting us with the same carnage it decries, but it avoids that trap by frequently reminding us of the human stakes. This material was filmed before, 38 years ago as an Arnold Schwarzenegger vehicle that, aside from the basic premise, had about as much to do with King's story as the *Lawnmower Man* movie did with the King tale of that name. Instead of inflating the action to suit Arnie, as the 1987 film did,

surrounding the diabolical game shows. The 1987 version's chief claim to fame was Richard Dawson in on-point casting as the host of "The Running Man." Here, Wright takes the conflict back to the book and gives us shrewd bigwig Dan Killian (Josh Brolin), host "Bobby T" Thompson (Colman Domingo), and lead Hunter McCone (Lee Pace).

Ben runs and runs, using various disguises and holing up with sympathetic rebels, and gradually the public tide turns to support Ben, a detail I don't remember from the novel but which makes sense. The working class comes to root for Ben, while well-to-do people, like Amelia (Emelia Jones), a woman Ben takes hostage, believe what the network tells them about Ben, that he's vicious scum who will cheerfully kill anyone for the fun of it. Doctored footage of Ben puts some of this across; King used a similar ploy in the book, decades before deepfakes and AI. This is the right time for a paranoid dystopian story like *The Running Man*, and King, credited here as an executive producer, has talked it up as such. Its so-so box-office returns perhaps indicate the divided nation we co-exist in.

It's been almost 30 years since the first Richard Bachman film (the awful *Thinner*), and now we get two in the same year. (The others, particularly King's self-suppressed *Rage*, probably don't have as much of a shot at a theater near you.) Both of them concern televised competitions with lethal consequences for the "losers." One could chalk it up as an accident of film-release scheduling, or one could muse that King, back there in the '70s, was having dark thoughts about game shows that seem to resonate with current reality. (*The Running Man* is highly indebted to the Robert Sheckley story "The Prize of Peril." The reader is encouraged to track down that story, first published in 1958. Of course, we've had game shows on American FreeVee since *Truth or Consequences* debuted in 1941.) Some dialogue in *The Running Man* is a little obvious, but in general Wright uses the plot to illustrate the peril of prizes awarded for winning the corporate/government game. *Quiz Show* was the prestigious version that didn't have any exploding heads, and *The Running Man* is the other kind.

energy of summer and the calm stillness of winter. While rooted in Marion, the photographs also speak more broadly

mills and that at one time lumber mills were Rochester's chief industry. There were lumber mills of all types -box, shingle, longboard- and the three principal mills were the Church, Rounseville and Hartley sawmills. In the early 20th century, the supply of softwood, coniferous trees in the region fueled the boom in the business.

In 1888, James Hartley who immigrated to the United States from England purchased the mill site on what was then Rochester Avenue.

This site had hosted other water-driven industries. The business was so successful that at one time the operation owned 2,400

acres of woodlots, was the town's largest employer and the road that ran in front of it was renamed Hartley Rd.

Now, back to the pamphlet. It tells the history of the days when logging was a profitable concern. Gangs of woodcutters would move into Haskell Swamp. They would create their own camps with cabins for housing. Within the camp, they would have teams of horses or oxen to drag trees they felled to an area where the cedar and pines were stacked. The wood would be collected all winter and then when the logging trails became passable, trucks would drive into Haskell's. The loads of logs along with those from other woodlots would be driven to a sawmill and the logs would be fed directly into the mill or dumped into the mill's pond for summer storage.

Logging gradually became a less lucrative business. Box mills lost out to cardboard and plastic. The Hurricane of 1944 brought down close to 90% of the largest pines in Rochester's woods. Once you factored in the demands for higher wages, rises in costs and competition from lumber coming from both the west and south, running a large mill was unprofitable and by the 1960's all the large mills were gone.

The current exhibit "The Tools and Industries That Made Rochester" at the Rochester Historical Society Museum at 355 County Rd., Rochester, has an interesting collection of sawmill tools and memorabilia.
