## **“If Trees Could Talk”**

On Sunday, March 8, artwork submitted by Old Hammondtown School students was up for display in the Mattapoisett Free Public Library. The presentation/gallery was for the statewide Annual Arbor Day Poster Contest.

The contest is sponsored by the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation, the US Forest Service, and the Massachusetts Tree Wardens’ and Foresters’ Association. The Mattapoisett Tree Committee serves as the local sponsor for the contest. It has been held for over 10 years, with this year’s theme being “If Trees Could Talk.”

At the library on Sunday, thirty-four 5th graders from Ms. Greta Anderson’s art class at Old Hammondtown had their works laid out in the library’s Meeting Room for all to see - and vote on.

Visitors received a ballot where they could rank their favorites as they circled the room and perused the art laid out in a horseshoe pattern.

Last year, there were 28 local entries with Bea Apperson clinching first place.

On Sunday, judges tallied the votes and postmarked them to the DCR by the March 15 due date. The winners of Mattapoisett’s 2026 contest have not yet been announced but will be soon! Winners of the local contest will get a ribbon and a cash prize.

From there, the DCR decides on final, statewide winners. The overall first place winner will have a tree planted on the grounds of their school, as well as art/science supplies provided. The overall second and third place winners from 3rd, 4th, and 5th grade applicants will receive a recognition award as well as school supplies.

This year, Arbor Day itself falls on Friday, April 24. So, a timeless question, why “Arbor Day” and not

“Tree Day” you ask? Fun fact: there is a bit of debate on the etymology of the word “arbor.” It’s generally agreed that the word derives from the Latin “herba,” being a place to cultivate crops, shaded by trees. Eventually, the word “arbor” was separated off in Old English to just refer to trees while “herb” remains just referring to the small plants grown.

They not only build *us*, but have also built our communities, while often forced into the shadows or lost pages of history. Though we all know of Cleopatra VII, what of the millions of women who assisted in the building of her empire?

In our own communities, such as Marion, we often speak on Elizabeth Taber and her paramount role in shaping the town's modern footprint. No Taber means no Town House, no Taber Library or Museum, no Marion Art Center, and no Tabor Academy. Among other things, without her and so many other dedicated women, there would be no Marion, at least not in any recognizable form.

That is not to say Taber's contribution saved Marion from being a dilapidated ruin, but it would truly not be Marion as it is today.

Following decades of charity and public service still blinding visible today, the widow would eventually be buried alongside her husband and children in Acushnet. Born Elizabeth Pitcher, her parents, Theophilus and Sarah Pitcher are both buried in Marion's Evergreen Cemetery, along with some of her siblings.

Back to the world stage, the international day of observance has an interesting, albeit surprising history and origin (it's sort of like Labor Day). The first observation of a day for women being by the Socialist Party of America (now defunct) right after the turn of the century in 1909 where women's rights and suffragette demonstrations were held in New York City on February 28. There were more widespread demonstrations in 1911, though the fighting of the Great War would silence many voices.

Women in America would attain their right to vote with the passage of the 19th Amendment in 1920, able to vote in their first federal election later that year with Warren G. Harding elected the 29th President.

How we get to March 8 being an *International Women's Day* came 13 years later, when Vladamir Lenin, first Premier of the Soviet Union, declared March 8, 1922, to be the first international day for celebrating women. The United Nations would accept and promote the day in 1977, making next year's day the 50th widely observed.

**Why Do Women Live Longer Than Men?**

*What Does The Doctor Say?*

As of 2024, while the average life expectancy in the U.S. climbed to 79, there was a striking and persistent gap between men and women. Women lived an average of 81.4 years, men 76.5. This five-year difference has been consistent over recent decades.

Why do women live so much longer than men?

Some of the difference is biologic and not anything men can change. Women have two X chromosomes, men one. This means that women have "backup" for loss of X chromosome gene deletions or losses. There is some animal data suggesting that the male

Y chromosome has deleterious effects.

Women have stronger immune responses, letting them better fight off infections (but also making them more prone to auto-immune diseases like lupus).

Women have much more circulating estrogen than men, which seems to delay the onset of coronary disease, though women “catch up” after menopause when their estrogen levels drop.

There are many factors over which men do have control. Men are more likely than women to smoke and drink heavily, both negative factors for longevity.

Men are more likely to work in hazardous occupations (construction, fishing, forestry, police and fire, etc.) than women. Men also engage in more risky behaviors such as speeding in cars, fighting and extreme sports.

Women are much better than men at looking after their health – getting regular checkups, seeing a doctor if something seems wrong. Men tend to avoid doctors until forced to.

Women generally have much better social networks, a consistent factor promoting longevity. Men's friendships tend to be less intense and less personal.

So, while we cannot (yet) engraft a second X chromosome into men, there are a lot of things men can do to emulate women and hopefully add a few years to their lives.

and around the colonial Province of Massachusetts Bay. Last week, at long last, the Continental Army began the “hot” phase of the Siege of Boston as artillery atop Dorchester Heights, brought east by Colonel Henry Knox from Ticonderoga, began to rain down metal on the Shawmut Peninsula that Boston occupies. Around 6,000 men occupy the top of the highlands with many hundreds of others guarding the neck heading towards the city. The British had tried for a push towards Dorchester, with much of the approaching seas frozen, but have been unable to get close, nor can their cannons in the city shoot American positions. Boston is surrounded at all sides as casualties mount and options dwindle for the British.

On March 8, 1776, Boston has been shelled by



American artillery for the past three day. At this time too, many British ships were in range of the guns atop Dorchester Heights, leading to immense anxiety to the defenders. The Boston Selectmen wrote to General George Washington, saying, "As his Excellency General Howe is determined to leave the town with the troops under his command, a number of the respectable inhabitants being very anxious for its preservation and safety, have applied to General Robertson for this purpose, who at their request has communicated the same to his Excellency General Howe, who has assured him that he has no intention of destroying the town unless the troops under his command are molested during their embarkation." Is that it then; Howe pledges to leave the city?

That same day, the four Selectmen, Samuel Austin, Thomas Marshall, Timothy Newell, and John Scolley left the city and crossed the neck with white flag in hand. They affirm that Howe intends to leave the city but has threatened to destroy it should he not be allowed to leave the city with his roughly 11,000 men, soldiers and loyalists citizens, in peace.

The next day, General Washington finally sends an update to President John Hancock in Philadelphia after nearly a week of no writings. He gives a timeline of events so far, saying, "When the enemy first discovered our works in the morning, they seemed to be in great confusion, and from their movements to have intended an attack," though mentions their good fortune had made it impossible.

However, that night, a counter-attacks begins. This time, a successful one. The British open fire from across the city towards Dorchester, targeting Nook's Hill, the nearest hill towards Boston. Lieutenant Isaac Bangs from Harwich on Cape Cod would write in his journal, "Heavy fire from the shipping in the harbor from several of the wharves & from several batteries; such a firing, before was never before heard in New England they killed 4 men with one ball." This devastating attack shattered the seeming invincibility of the Continental Army's Position, but it did nothing to halt the siege. Bangs would add, "the next morning we picked up 700 balls that they had fired upon us."

On March 12, Boston Selectmen Timothy Newell would write in his journal aptly named "A Journal Kept During the Time that Boston was Shut Up in 1775 - 6," "The Inhabitants are greatly distressed thro-fear the Town would be set on fire by the Soldiers."

That would prove to be the final push though, as General Howe would issue a proclamation to those in the city the next day, confirming a British withdrawal from the city was eminent. It would be published in the *Pennsylvania Evening Post* a month later, allowing us to read it today, "As linen and woolen goods are articles much wanted by the rebels, and would aid and assist them in their rebellion, the Commander in Chief expects that all good subjects will use their utmost endeavors to have all such articles conveyed from this place. Any

who have not opportunity to convey their goods under their own care, may deliver them on board the Minerva, at Hubbard's wharf, to Crean Brush, Esq; marked with their names, who will give a certificate of the delivery, and will oblige himself to return them to the owners, all unavoidable accidents excepted. If, after this notice, any person secrets or keeps in his possession such articles, he will be treated as a favorer of rebels." Thereby confirming the Americans would soon have command over the city, and its stockpile.

As the 11,000 evacuees got organized, ships amassed in the harbor all while shelling continued. American privateers, staying near the coast, harassed the British frigates and even managed to capture some supply ships. Abigail Adams, wife of the future president, would herself count around 170 ships in the harbor as she watched on with other spectators from afar.

On March 13, Washington again write to Hancock, mentioning the eminent capture of the city and the British departure, saying, "I mentioned the intelligence I had received respecting the embarkation of the troops from Boston & fully expected before this, that the town would have been entirely evacuated - Although I have been deceived and was rather premature in the opinion I had then formed, I have little reason to doubt but the event will take place in a very short time." The British await favorable winds for the departure, and it has been stormy with sporadic hail the last weeks.

International Women's Day was this past Sunday, and it doesn't take much to look around at the half of the population whose strength and determination better the world. One such notably woman is Hannah Strom, who after her life took an unexpected turn in 2020 showed those in her home in Marion that though life can be unfair

at times, you don't need to give up.  
 Though Hannah now resides just outside Boston, those in Marion and the region all know her story. To recap, On January 15, 2020, Hannah, at the time a Sophomore and member of the College of the Holy Cross in Worcester's rowing team, was in Vero Beach training with her team when their team van got in an accident with a pickup truck. Strom's teammate and friend 20-year-old Grace Rett tragically died in the crash. Eleven members of the team suffered injuries, including Hannah who, along with a broken femur and pelvis, suffered a traumatic brain injury (TBI) and was placed in a medically induced coma.

About a week after the accident, she was flown

north back to Massachusetts where she had rehab at Spaulding Rehab Hospital. Finally, Hannah had a homecoming a few months later, on June 3. Hundreds lined the streets of Marion to welcome her back to her home on Pitcher Street. Through this time, the Stroms, owners of Kool-Kone ice cream shop, held various fundraisers and events through their business.

Over six years have passed since the accident, and Hannah faced the challenges head-on and has pushed hard to rebuild both her body and her life. In recent years, Strom attended Quincy College's PTA program, working to become a physical therapist.

She became a TBI Ambassador with Model Systems Knowledge Translation Center (MSKTC) that works to advocate for and assist in the rehabilitation of those with spinal cord injuries (SCI), TBI, and burn injuries. They offer online courses, videos, and other help, as well as running a database of information pertaining to the injuries and their recoveries.

In her drive to become an ambassador and activist, Hanna said in her bio that she was "motivated to reduce stigma, uplift survivor voices, and connect individuals and families with resources that encourage independence, resilience, and a higher quality of life."

Though her recent work as a rehabilitation aide, Hannah has assisted others in the recovery process she herself fought through at the same center she herself was a patient. She mentioned the full days of therapy and the hard work of those she now works alongside allowing her to give back. "From where I was, I can't believe I've come so far," she said in a video made by MSKTC. Using what she gained from others as well as what she has learned on her path, she has dedicated herself to helping others with TBI.

Though the work was hard and the journey to recovery may not be a short one, Hannah Strom's resilience and determination to give back and help others are a light of positivity to others she assists and inspires.

She works hard and regularly posts updates on her ongoing journey. "Grief is a synonym for love. Where there is love, there will be grief. They say that grief is just love, with no place to go. To this, I agree," she said. To

### Ready, Set...

What a killjoy the weather can be. Still, it takes more than a late season blizzard to put the kibosh on our hopes and plans. I mean as visionaries, we gardeners can see and feel beyond nature's little pranks.

Isn't that what we set out to do each spring? With our creative minds, earnest souls, and hardworking bodies we make things grow, tend them and harvest the results. I keep that in mind while rubbing my feet together to keep them warm. My fingers are busy writing a script for the growing season that is just around the corner.

Somehow, I think writing this column makes me more thoughtful about my garden practices. I consider it an adventure just as gardening is a kind of adventure. It's a bold, exciting undertaking with an outcome quite unknown and guaranteed to bring many joyful days in the execution.

We hatch plans that in turn hatch more - all part of the adventure. Whether you take your first step with routine precision or a more serendipitous approach, here are ten ways to get started.

1. Clean up the debris of winter, smoothing all



the battle scars - branches, withered leaves and uneven soil and in my yard the displacement of shells from our driveway. In doing so you will have a preview of the shoots and buds marching toward the light. You'll also get some good old-fashioned exercise and fresh air! A feel-good experience at many levels. 3. Seeds glorious seeds! You can start seeds indoors in pots now until early April, aiming for 6-8 weeks before the last frost (late May). Start slow-growers like peppers and onions and some perennials now; tomatoes, cabbage, kale and herbs mid-to-late-March; and faster-growing vegetables like cucumbers, summer squash and melons in April. Use a seed starting mix and a heat mat or a radiator for initiating seed development. After the seedlings have sprouted give them six-plus hours of light from a sunny, south-facing window or grow lights. Move plants outdoors after the last frost (Memorial Day to be on the safe side).

4. Invest in a cold frame to protect your vulnerable seedlings during the inconsistent spring

nighttime temperatures. In a pinch you can cover seedlings with a garden cloche or an overturned bucket or pot, but cold frames are the best method



of creating an area with stable temperature for giving seedlings a head start in spring. They also help see many cold hardy plants through the fall.

5. If you are ordering plants online, remember to schedule it out for when the ground is warmer (above 40 degrees) and drier. The biggest mistake growers make is planting in cold and muddy soil. You're usually safe with delivery in early May. Meanwhile get the beds ready and read up on the plants you intend to install.

6. Sharpen your pruners and get going on Clematis jackmanii and C. Vitcella varieties. Old deciduous hedges should be hard pruned in spring where necessary and then fed well to encourage new growth. (We bought a 10-10-10 fertilizer today for that purpose). Keep off the spring-blooming trees - but prune roses when they bud out. It's a good time to cut back fruit trees

if you have not done so yet. Watch out for signs of frost damage, but don't pull out a plant that appears to be dead. It may show signs of revival in early summer and can then be trimmed of any deadwood.

7. Admittedly not the most exciting task, it's time to turn the compost pile and burn the sticks and brush (be sure to get a permit). Provided it is dry, use some of that fresh compost and seasoned manure to top-dress your gardens. No need to dig it in, as you'll disturb precious ecosystems. Nutrients added from the top will work their way down.

8. Early spring is the best time to repair trellises and fences. Getting it done before plants begin to grow ensures that the structural elements are ready for the summer season. I always seem to have something that needs repair. [Note to self: reinstall two greenhouse windows that were blown out by the storm].

9. When the garden finally defrosts and the soil crumbles it's time to plant early spring vegetables. Normally I plant peas on St. Patrick's day, but this year hasn't been typical. Soggy soil won't do. It's not advisable to plant in wet, compacted soil, as the reduced aeration will hinder. But soon (if the weather doesn't go bad again) I'll put in some peas, spinach, lettuce and leeks.

10. One absolute necessity for me this year is inventorying all the contents of my shed and greenhouse. It's time to pare down. (I say that every year). I don't know how things get disheveled out there, but they do.

the Department of Public Works and the Facilities Department budgets.

Following the approval of minutes from the committee's prior three meetings, Chair Sean Healy moved to discuss the upcoming budget for Facilities. Facilities Director Shaun Cormier began, stating there were two main lines that would require budget increases for the next year. Those being, the Town House and Marion Police Station.

Cost increases for the Town House, Cormier said, are "mostly due to the increase in services with the renovation project." He mentioned the installation of the new sprinkler system, that along with their incorporation into the building, which turns 150 this year, must also be regularly checked and maintained. He also pointed to the new HVAC system and its accompanying heat pumps and ductwork.

Cormier added he was able to remove \$800 allocated for overtime in previous years to help tackle the increased budget line items next year. He said the "big raise" was to property maintenance contract services, with an increase of \$4,000 pertaining mostly to renovation work. Another noted increase was vehicle maintenance on the department's four aging vehicles, a raise of \$1,500 from last year's budget to cover additional needs found with older utility vehicles and trucks. An ongoing discussion was the age and constant maintenance needs of the department's vehicles.

Next, the FinCom moved to DPW where the hour-and-a-half long budget discussion was broken down into categories: highway, utility, water, and sewer. As there were many sporadic increases, it was discussed that a general 2% increase in most line items would be typical as to keep with rising costs.

First, for highway, there is a 22.2% increase in licenses and certifications. It was explained by DPW Director Jody Dickerson that "the Commonwealth of Massachusetts has put more requirements on my employees. They need special licenses to use the side arm mower, one to use a street sweeper." He attributed this budget jump to state-mandated trainings and certifications. There is also a 2.5% increase in overtime

costs, which he noted was different than other departments' overtime. For the DPW, overtime is mostly for emergency call-outs, funeral/bereavement leave, and work at the Transfer Station on Saturdays (as DPW employee contracts specify they work Monday-Friday).

Dickerson mentioned they went over the overtime budget this year due to lengthy and unpredictable snow removal by somewhere <\$100,000, though it hasn't been fully calculated yet. Another large cost was trash pickup, with the Director citing not just Marion as facing soaring costs for the service, though he said he is working with the Town Administrator to look for alternative options. Currently, it costs the town around \$50,000/month with concerns that it will continue the rise.

For water, Dickerson mentioned new buildings: the Harbormaster's Maritime Center and the new DPW facility. These will see increased water usage by the town. He mentioned that solar would be added to the DPW building this spring or summer, which will help curb electricity costs. They are also looking to add solar generation to the top of the nearby landfill, though that is in early stages of investigation.

It was noted the FinCom wants to meet with the Marine Resource Commission to plan out their FY27 budget, as well as consult with them on harbor fees and management.

Along with increased water use from the new buildings, Dickerson said the DPW has to replace the waterline feeding the hydrant at Island Wharf as well as the Maritime Center itself. With this work, they are also seeking the installation of additional hydrants to give more coverage to the village.

There is still planning to be done and much preparation left before FY27 by the town. The FinCom commended the DPW on their hard work during the recent snow and its subsequent clearing.

The next meeting of the Marion Finance Committee was scheduled for Thursday, March 12 where they were to discuss ORR and Sippican budgets with Superintendent Mike Nelson.

The March 9 meeting of the Mattapoissett Conservation Commission had an agenda featuring cases where action was taken, though most cases were continued to future meetings.

In the continued category, the commission, at the request of the applicant, continued the Notice of Intent filed by Mattapoissett Offshore IV Ltd for the construction of a pool, garage, sports courts, porches, replacement deck, and landscaping at 23 Holy Woods.

Also continued was the Notice of Intent filed by Stephen Vaitses for determination of right-of-way for clearing activities. The Commission believed the filing required a Certificate of Compliance for work previously conditioned and comments (if any) from the DEP needed to be processed. The location of the action being requested is Bryne Avenue and Shell Beach Road.

Continued until March 23 was the Notice of Intent filed by Thomas and Patricia Lee for property located at 14 Barstow Street for the construction of a new home in the flood plain. The case is awaiting a DEP file number. Abutter questions regarding storm water management were addressed by Rick Charon of Charon and Associates who noted that roof runoff will be channeled into a below surface recharge system. This is the site of the former Presto Press.

Conditioned was the Notice of Intent filed by Neil and Cynthia Musamte, 4 Dyar Road, for the construction of an elevator shaft for the elevated residence.

The next meeting of the Mattapoissett Conservation Commission is scheduled for March 23.

The Rochester Planning Board Tuesday held a public hearing at the COA packed with very vocal residents on a proposal to rezone lots on Mary's Pond Road and County Road from Residential to Limited Commercial.

The board was poised to approve passing the amendment to rezone four lots at 0 Mary's Pond Road, 711 Mary's Pond Road, 475 Mary's Pond Road, and 35 and 73 County Road on the Spring Town Meeting Warrant even as abutters voiced arguments against it that focused on what the changes might do to their neighborhood.

Chair Arnold Johnson began Tuesday's meeting by explaining that the goal is to better protect Mary's Pond with lighter development than multiple houses. The owner of the largest Mary's Pond Road property has expressed interest in building 12 single-family homes there. The rezoning to Limited Commercial could help that developer make other choices and give town boards more control on what goes in there. He said this is a proactive step to limit housing development there. He noted owners of existing lots in the area will not lose their rights. He explained it provides a potential developer with other options. Because two lots were removed from the original proposal and another was added at the board's last meeting, the hearing had to be re-posted and conducted again.

Residents responded by bombarding the board with concerns about the change's impact on their area of Mary's Pond Road. "Will this truly strengthen the town against housing development on the pond?" one resident asked. Johnson answered "yes, it will." Jackie Souza of 507 Mary's Pond Road asked if one of these lots was

behind her home. After being shown the zoning map, she told *The Wanderer* she was not happy at all with what she saw.

"Why not take the Marion Road bogs off the rezone?" a resident asked. "Keep Rochester as a farming town," she said.

Johnson said the developer has expressed his intent to not farm the bogs but build on them.

"The town has to have additional options available," Town Administrator Cameron Durant answered. "less environmentally impactful ones."

Another resident argued that the zoning change move is reactionary rather than proactive. It's reacting to one developer and is like spot zonings she said.

Another asked if the eight parcels would go to town meeting separately so voters can choose or as one 'all or nothing' proposal. Johnson said before voting on moving the plan to Town Meeting that the board would break up the parcels into separate warrant articles.

In other action, the board approved the Site Plan Review permit for a plan to create a second home lot from an existing 5.25-acre parcel at 314 Neck Road.

The board advanced to Town Council for their approval a proposed new Planning Board regulation that places special conditions on land swaps within subdivisions.

The board continued until its next meeting its hearing into a modification of the Definitive Subdivision

Plan permit for the previously approved Snipatuit Pond Estates at Gerrish and Bishop Road. It is a proposal to swap two parcels of open space to create a 3.578-acre buildable lot on one of them.

The board also continued to its next meeting the Site Plan Review hearing on a proposal to clear and re-grade land behind Town Hall for an 8,220-square foot parking lot.

The Rochester Planning Board's next meeting will be Tuesday, March 24 at 7:00 pm at Town Hall, 1 Constitution Way.

realities of building projects and infrastructure.  
 The other finalist, Ann Morgan, has lived in Marion for about two years and brings a career focused directly on municipal planning. With approximately 40 years of experience in the field, she recently retired as Director of Planning and Economic Development for the Town of Webster, a community with nearly twice the population of Marion.

Ms. Morgan’s professional background closely reflects the core responsibilities of a planning board: guiding orderly growth, reviewing development proposals, interpreting zoning bylaws, issuing certain special permits, and helping shape long-range planning through documents such as the town’s Master Plan.

Her academic preparation includes a master’s degree in regional planning and a bachelor’s degree in environmental design with a minor in art history.

During the interview process, Ms. Morgan also demonstrated familiarity with Marion’s planning framework. When asked whether she had reviewed the town’s 2017 Master Plan, she confirmed that she had and observed that the document appeared outdated. # MOVIE REVIEW

## Monster Mash-Up

***The Bride!* Starring Jessie Buckley and Christian Bale. Directed by Maggie Gyllenhaal. Running time: 126 minutes. MPAA rating: R. Now playing in theaters.**

One of the terrible things about Paramount's acquisition of Warner Brothers is that Warner's reputation as a studio sympathetic to oddball (and expensive) film visions seems in jeopardy. Warner, after all, has released two of Oscar's frontrunners (*Sinners* and *One Battle After Another*), as well as the surprise hit (and decidedly oddball) *Wuthering Heights* ... and, yes, Maggie Gyllenhaal's *The Bride!* I'm glad this frenetically shambolic thing exists, especially since it's been scandalizing critics from coast to coast. Like *Wuthering Heights*, another singularly female vision (Emerald Fennell), *The Bride!* seems almost a self-willed cult film, aimed at a small crowd who will embrace its thorns and all, and defiantly heedless of the rest.

A synopsis would probably be folly, but I can at least try to set it up. The ghost of Mary Shelley (Jessie Buckley) takes over the body of apparent gangster's moll Ida (also Buckley) in 1936 Chicago. Ida soon dies. Meanwhile, the creation (Christian Bale) of Victor Frankenstein, who calls himself Frank, visits a "mad scientist" named Cornelia Euphronius (Annette Bening), who has studied the work of Frankenstein. Frank wants a mate, and he and Dr. Euphronius dig up Ida and shock her back to "life." Frank and Ida, who takes the name Penelope, fall madly in love. They go to a lot of movies together and would be fine if they weren't accosted by louts and mobsters, and after a while they go on the lam.

Some of *The Bride!* is awful, and some of it gives off a glittering vibe you won't see anywhere else, except maybe in the more feverish movies by Derek Jarman. On the evidence, Gyllenhaal is a better director than writer; she can forge and sustain a mood, and she gets cult-iconic performances out of Buckley and Bale. Yet the script is quite consciously bonkers, anachronistic and veering from plot point to plot point. It's a mad ball, with singing and dancing and tips of the hat to any number of *Frankenstein* films. But it's



also joined to a story trying on various serious notions about consent and desperation, and dropping them in favor of the next shiny object. What Gyllenhaal is attempting here wouldn't work if handled more precisely, but it's tough not to feel that she doesn't do justice to some of the ideas she raises.

The crime element of *The Bride!* may seem shopworn, but it addresses how women in particular are mauled body and soul by the gangster milieu. The lovers are pursued by a pair of detectives, Wiles (Peter Sarsgaard) and Malloy (the apparently ageless Penelope Cruz), and Wiles delivers a sad tale indicating that men, too, are pulverized by gang violence, while women like the Bride and Euphronius and Malloy manage to exist in the chaos and impose their will on it. That seems to be the movie's primary point, if there is one: If life and the world are crazy, create your own flavor of crazy in opposition.

As long as it is indeed in opposition. There's a plot thread about a female revolution inspired by the Bride that Gyllenhaal more or less loses track of, but it's a fun part of the tapestry while it lasts. *The Bride!* speaks of lives lived in self-defense, misfits and "monsters" trying to maintain their identities in a world that would rather extinguish them. Some of the film is pitched like a Bikini Kill album, a piercing and threatening shriek of contempt and fury. It will drive a certain kind of viewer up the wall, but it doesn't necessarily reward the like-minded, either. We don't get much of a sense of what Ida was like before Shelley and then Frank came into her life; we seem to hear in much more detail about Frank's loneliness in his introductory scene. I wouldn't be surprised if there's a director's cut that stretches about three hours. Whether that ever gets released by whatever Warner Brothers has become is a dispiriting question.





In addition to all the history that we have stored in the Rochester Historical Museum, history can also be found at the Rochester Plumb Library, and not all of it is within the building. If you walk around outside the library building (not recommended with up to 2 ft. of snow on the ground), you will notice quite a few plaques commemorating a variety of subjects.



One item on the edge of the property has a different purpose. There is a granite post with symbol placed on top, as seen here in the picture. This is a waymark or benchmark. Many people finding these along the road or in one case as part of a stonewall may assume that they are distance markers that let one know how far to the next town. This certainly seems like a plausible explanation.

However, these are known locator points set by the state. They are used for surveying work along roadsides. Of course, that means that they shouldn't be

-Cultural landscape/archeology: The site of the structure has an important connection to the local history.
