The licensing authority may deny, revoke or suspend any license or permit, including renewals and transfers of any party whose name appears on said list furnished to the licensing authority from the tax collector or with respect to any activity, event or other matter which is the subject of such license or permit and which activity, event or matter is carried out or exercised or is to be carried out or exercised on or about real estate owned by any party whose name appears on said list furnished to the licensing authority from the tax collector; provided, however, that written notice is given to the party and the tax collector, as required by applicable provisions of law, and the party is given a hearing to be held not earlier than fourteen days after said notice. Said list shall be prima facie evidence for a denial, revocation or suspension of said license or permit to any party. The tax collector shall have the right to intervene in any hearing conducted with respect to such license denial, revocation or suspension. Any license or permit denied, suspended or revoked under this section shall not be reissued or renewed until the licensing authority receives a certificate issued by the tax collector that the party is in good standing with respect to any and all local taxes, fees, assessments, betterments or other municipal charges, payable to the municipality as of the date of issuance of said certificate.

Any party shall be given an opportunity to enter into a payment agreement, thereby allowing the licensing authority to issue a certificate indicating said limitations to the license or permit and the validity of said license shall be conditioned upon the satisfactory compliance with said agreement. Failure to comply with said agreement shall be grounds for the suspension or revocation of said license or permit, provided, however, that the holder be given notice and a hearing as required by applicable provisions of law.

The Board of Selectmen may waive such denial, suspension or revocation if it finds that there is no direct or indirect business interest by the property owner, its officers or stockholders, if any, or members of his immediate family, as defined in section one of chapter two hundred and sixty-eight A in the business or activity conducted in or on said property.

This section shall not apply to the following licenses and permits: open burning: section thirteen of chapter forty-eight; bicycle permits: section eleven A of chapter eighty-five; sales of

articles for charitable purposes, section thirty-three of chapter one hundred and one; children work permits, section sixty-nine of chapter one hundred and forty-nine; clubs, associations dispensing food or beverage licenses, section twenty-one E of chapter one hundred and forty; dog licenses, section one hundred and thirty-seven of chapter one hundred and forty; fishing, hunting, trapping license. Section twelve of chapter one hundred and thirty-one; marriage licenses, section twenty-eight of chapter two hundred and seven and theatrical events, public exhibition permits, section one hundred and eighty-one of chapter one hundred and forty."

A. Purpose

B. Water Withdrawal Prohibition

Except as hereinafter provided, no persons shall withdraw water from surface or ground waters (including, but not limited to, wetlands, streams, rivers, lakes, springs, and ponds) within the Town of Marion into any tank vehicle or into any tank contained in or on any vehicle.

C. Exceptions

The prohibitions contained in Paragraph B above shall not apply to withdrawals or diversions associated with the following:

- 1. Any withdrawal or diversion permitted under a permit issued by the Marion Board of Water Commissioners or their designee, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and/or the United States Government.
- 2. Any withdrawal or diversion associated with agricultural operations by either the owner of a private water supply or any other persons or entity having withdrawal rights of said water body.
- 3. Withdrawals or diversions associated with firefighting or training activities associated with firefighting.
- D. Violations, Penalties and Enforcement

Any person or entity in violation of the provisions herein shall be punished by a fine of \$100 for the first violation and \$300 for each subsequent violation.

This bylaw shall be enforced under the non-criminal disposition provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 21D and may be enforced by the Conservation Commission, the Board of Health, the Fire Department, and/or the Police Department or their designees.

To either of the Constables of the Town of Marion in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts

GREETINGS:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Marion qualified to vote in Town election and Town affairs to meet at the Sippican School Auditorium in said Marion, on Monday, the 8th day of May, 2017, at 8:00 o'clock in the evening, then and there to act on the following Articles, to wit:

Article S1 To see if the Town will vote to transfer from available funds in the Treasury (Free Cash) the sum of \$100,000 to supplement the Fiscal Year 2017 budget of the Department of Public Works to pay expenses associated with the removal of snow and ice from public ways during said Fiscal Year; or take any other action relative thereto.

Finance Committee recommends

Article S2 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury (Free Cash) the sum of \$33,539 to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen for costs related to ongoing mitigation with the Sprague's Cove; or take any other action thereon.

Finance Committee will make recommendation at Town Meeting

Article S3 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury (Free Cash) the sum of \$27,115 to be expended by the Facilities Department to install a fire alarm system at the Benjamin D. Cushing Senior/Community/Recreation Center; or take any other action thereon.

Article S4 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury (Free Cash) the sum of \$35,000 to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen for costs related to ongoing capped landfill post-closure monitoring activities; or take any other action thereon.

Finance Committee recommends

Article S5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the Treasury (Free Cash) the sum of \$34,300 to obtain designer services, including architectural and owners project manager, for the purpose of completing feasibility study of a new Town House on the Benjamin D. Cushing Senior/Community/Recreation Center site as recommended to the Board of Selectmen including, but not limited to, those recommendations made by the Town House Building Committee; or take any action thereon.

Finance Committee will make recommendation at Town Meeting

And you are directed to serve this Warrant by posting up attested copies thereof, one at the Elizabeth Taber Library, one at the Town House, and one at the Marion Post Office, all in said Marion, fourteen days at least before the time of holding said meeting aforesaid.
