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The Filming of The Weekend on Cape Cod When Everything Changed By Sam Bishop

On the nights of April 9 and April 10, the temperature floated in the 30s and 40s. That did not halt the filming of *The Weekend on Cape Cod When Everything Changed*. A beach wedding scene was to be filmed on those nights. Local extras were asked to park at Mattapoisett's Park and Ride to be shuttled to the "ultra secret filming location." Though it was cold, the wardrobe was that of a late-summer/early-fall "country club wedding."

The location of this shoot was 3 Goodspeed Island Road, the same property originally slated to be the filming location of the Netflix series until the SAG-AFTRA labor strike which began last summer and is still officially ongoing. The location of filming sits on roughly one acre of land on the water with beach access. Along with filming on the property, there were also film crews spotted near the Water St. General Store. The crew will also film at various locations on the Cape itself. The movie will film over 18 total days, according to Noll.

The movie began filming in the last weeks and has drawn much public fascination and wonder as to what locations will be shot and what stars will be spotted. The movie is written by Dalia Rooni (*Gen V* [movie], *NCIS: Los Angeles*) and is being directed by Lauren Noll (*Gen V* [movie], *The Heart of Texas*). The movie's principal stars include Joey Lauren Adams (*Chasing Amy, Dazed and Confused*), Richie Moriarty (*Ghosts, What We Do in the Shadows*), and Kevin Nealon (*SNL, Weeds, Happy Gilmore*).

The movie saw fundraising by Lauren Noll through Seed & Spark, where it raised \$76,285. According to the project page, an excerpt on the movie's plot states: "To keep her visa status, a wide-eyed Iranian immigrant

accepts a proposal from the son of her billionaire boss. What begins as a green card wedding on Cape Cod becomes so much more when her two closest friends arrive with their own boyfriends and cross-cultural baggage in tow." The movie takes place, as the title suggests, over the course of one weekend on the Cape and exhibits similarities to 2009's *The Proposal*, with it also being a comedy/rom-com.

Already being two weeks through principal photography, the movie is roughly halfway through its filming. Following this and editing, it will likely have a release later this year. Though nothing has been confirmed at this time.

Speaking Dog By Marilou Newell

One of the best presentations offered took place on April 3 at the Mattapoisett Free Public Library hosted by the Mattapoisett Land Trust. The title of the presentation was "Kids And Dogs Do Mix." The trust's presenter was Tadhg Irving of OutHounds Adventure and

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Training Academy, a for-profit organization that teaches dog training and nearly every other aspect caring for the much-loved domesticated animal.

This presentation focused on best practices when coming in contact with a dog whether you know the dog or not. Basic first contact techniques were explained in simple easy to understand terms geared primarily towards children but relevant for all ages.

Irving delved into the dos and don'ts, such as never approaching a dog before getting permission, never hugging a dog (they don't like it), and becoming familiar with a dog's physical cues for stress. Examples for signaling intent and stress include shifting weight, blinking, licking, yawning, sniffing, and squirming.

Irving said that by reading a dog's facial expression, including the eyes, the dog's social emotional condition may be surmised. And let's not forget, the tail.

A dog's tail gives clues as to how the dog is feeling. A wagging tail is not an indicator of a happy emotionally balanced animal. A dog's facial muscles give further clues. Look to see if the face is relaxed or tense. There are a variety of ways to make interactions with dogs safe and fun, and it starts with education.

Irving demonstrated what to do if a dog runs up to you, do you run, do you scream - NO, you gird your loins. First, stand perfectly straight placing hands over the groin. If you get knocked down, cover the head and neck area with hands and stay as still as possible.

In recapping the salient points shared, Irving said dogs communicate through body language. If approached by a dog "make like a tree," don't move around, always ask permission to pat a dog, dogs don't like hugs, never be alone with an unfamiliar dog, and when in doubt, play it safe.

What Does The Doctor Say?

Falls can have very serious consequences as we age. Every year more than 25 percent of adults 65 or older have a fall, and 3 million are treated in emergency departments for fall injuries, according to the CDC.

Several things increase your risk of falling. Blood pressure that falls when you get up is a common culprit, and this in turn can be due to medication you take. If you feel light-headed when getting up, have your BP checked

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sitting and standing and if there is a fall of more than 10 points, discuss this with your doctor.

Poor vision, particularly when combined with poor light, can lead to a fall. Be sure that you have adequate light in your bedroom if you get up to go to the bathroom.

Be wary of electric cords that are everywhere and can easily trip you. Tape them down or to the wall.

Inadequate leg strength and poor sensation in the feet can lead to falls, as can vertigo from inner ear problems.

What can you do to reduce your risk of falling in addition to the above suggestions?

Doing specific exercises regularly will help. Start with three simple ones:

- 1. Stand with your feet shoulder-width apart for 10 seconds, increasing this to 30 seconds
- 2. Next, stand with feet together for 10 increasing to 30 seconds
 - 3. Stand on one leg then the other If these are too easy, do them with your eyes

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closed. (Be sure there is a sturdy surface you can touch such as a kitchen counter available.)

Walk heel-to-toe near a wall that can offer support.

Sit on a sturdy chair; get up without using your hands if possible. Sit down. Repeat, aiming for 10 times.

Do these exercises twice a day.

When you are going up or down stairs, hold on to the railing!

Finally, three points of contact are much more secure than two. If you are concerned about falling, a walking stick can be a great safety device.

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
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Mr. & Mrs. Wingate Celebrate 100 By Mick Colageo

The couple's travels have taken them to residences in Marion, Mattapoisett, Cape Cod, western Massachusetts and Florida. They reached their 80s and decided to settle in Marion. Mr. Wingate worked in construction management in New Bedford, Virginia and Florida. While in Florida, Mrs. Wingate managed a travel agency.

Mrs. Wingate was obviously suited for the role, as the couple has visited approximately 28 countries and lists Scotland as their favorite.

In a written statement, the couple expressed appreciation to the Marion COA.

Summer Rodeo in Rochester

Rochester Select Board

Get ready for some ropin' and ridin' on Pine Street. Rochester's Select Board Monday reviewed a proposal to allow a rodeo this summer at the former Country Fair campgrounds at 65 Pine St.

Kelly Pina of New England Rodeo, an officer with

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the group offering the plan, said it would like to put on a rodeo show on its 18.6 acres one Saturday each in June, July, August, and September. But it would like to take possession of the property in May to begin setting up the parcel for that use.

The board concluded that before voting its approval a public hearing would be needed first to gauge public reaction to such a plan. That hearing was scheduled for its next meeting, April 28, at 6:10 pm.

Select Board Member Adam Murphy suggested led to that conclusion after New England Rodeo owner Elias DaSilva said the organization's other rodeos have attracted around 1,000 visitors to each show. Murphy said he wanted to make sure how the neighbors would feel about such an event coming to their neighborhood and whether the town's public services, fire, police and Emergency Medical Services, can handle such a crowd.

Pina promised that public safety and community involvement would be the group's priorities. New England Rodeo will invite local groups and charities to participate and do fund raising at its rodeos. Speakers will be pointed away from residential neighborhoods. Medical services will be on-duty and safety protocols in place.

Town Administrator Cameron Durant reported that town council has advised him the arrangement for using the site should be a license rather than a lease. A lease agreement would require going out to bid for other interested parties, he said.

Selectmen chair Brad Morse asked if the group was aware of future plans for the site, a new fire station. Pina said the group was aware and that it required only an 'interim' use of the property.

Earlier Monday, the board continued another big review to an April 28 hearing. Durant revealed that the 24 articles proposed for the May 19 Annual Town Meeting include the FY26 budget (a number that has yet to be finalized), spending \$363,000 on Capital Improvement funding, a proposal to allow town employees to opt out of the town's health insurance plan and revising the 40R Smart Growth Development District on Cranberry Highway to encompass an additional parcel. He said the Select Board will need to meet jointly on April 28 with





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school officials and the Finance and Capital Planning committees regarding town budgets.

In other action, the board approved the Mattapoisett Land Trust and Friends of the Mattapoisett Rail Trail's request to run a charity bike event, 'Tour de Creme', through town on June 1.

The board voted against exercising the town's Right of First Refusal to purchase 0 Walnut Plain Road, which is being converted from Chapter 61B forest and horticultural land protection for residential use.

Morse announced the town's receipt of the SEMASS Payment In Lieu of Taxes payment for March 2025 of \$412,890.

Durant reported the Highway Surveyor Jeff





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


Eldridge will be clearing the brush behind the town office building to extend parking there.

The board approved Town Clerk Marjorie Barrows' request to allow in-person early voting on Saturday, May 24 and during normal business hours on May 26.

The board approved the FY26 Cost of Living increase for municipal employees' salaries to 2.5 percent, a jump that was recently endorsed by the Finance Committee.

Murphy informed the board he is speaking to stakeholders to find an alternative to utilizing the Regional Old Colony Communications Center Dispatch Call Center in Duxbury should the town's contract with



that organization not get renewed. The board agreed to allow Murphy to continue as the town's liaison on this discussion.

The next meeting of the Rochester Select Board is scheduled for Monday, April 28 at 6:00 pm at the Council On Aging senior center, 67 Dexter Lane.

Pier Repair Talks Continued Again

Marion Conservation Commission

The Marion Conservation Commission met Wednesday, April 9 and immediately jumped into a hearing for a Determination of Applicability for the construction of a screened-in porch for 50 Holly Road. The Commission stated they had gone out the prior weekend to survey the site. Brian Engstrom, property owner, stated they bought the property in 2022. Engstrom stated there was originally a deck on the house before the current owners and while some alterations have been made, the new work would encompass much of the original footprint, though being enclosed with a screen. Hearing was closed and approved unanimously.

The next hearing was for a Notice for Intent for 548 Point Road for the repair of the property's pier, removal of a stone wall, and step installation. It also includes the restoration of eroded areas of the shore. Bob Rogers of GAF Engineering appeared as representative to the owners. The Commission also visited this property the past weekend. There was some concern from the Commission regarding the removal of sand from the beach inland to shore up the property's bank where they asked if alternative methods were possible. The representative stated he would try and come up with an "approximate quantity" for the amount of material/sand needed. A continuance was requested and granted for the next meeting, April 23, in order for more information to be gathered.

For action items, the Commission granted a Request for Certificate of Compliance for an older approved order which no work was completed upon. Olivia Prior, Marion Administrative Assistant, was thanked personally from the requester's representative for





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her help in figuring out and solving problems stemming from the original order, the Commission joked was "old enough the drive."

The next meeting of the Marion Conservation Commission is scheduled for Wednesday, April 23 at 7:00 pm in the Marion Police Department Conference Room.

Unpermitted Work Reviewed

Mattapoisett Conservation Commission

Coming before the Mattapoisett Conservation Commission on April 14 was Robert Rogers of GAF Engineering representing Robert Beauregard, 2 Jowik Street. Beauregard had filed a Request For Determination of Applicability seeking a negative decision from the commission to install a concrete slab for a prefabricated storage building, a storage shed, and paved driveway. However, some of the structures are already in place without Commission oversight. The presence of what appears to be an intermittent stream, a jurisdictional area, also came into play.

Much of the landscaping and outdoor structure have been in place for a number of years, a neighbor noted in a letter to the commission. Any new work might create drainage issues on abutting properties it was stated. It was further noted in the letter that outdoor lighting for a proposed pickle ball court was intrusive and the noise from the court would be a nuisance.





But the issue of the stream became the biggest issue taken up by the commission.

Rogers had done some research on whether or not the stream in question was jurisdictional. He said photographic evidence in support of the stream's status was in hand and would file them before the next meeting. The visuals must substantiate the owner's contention that the stream is intermittent and not perennial. To do so, there must be four consecutive days of dry soil.

The filing is pending a DEP file number required before the commission may proceed further. The filing was continued to April 28. The issue of whether or not an After-The-Fact filing is needed may be taken up at a later date.

An Enforcement Order naming Micheal Dupont, 122 Mattapoisett Neck Road, was taken up at the end of the agenda but was given lengthy consideration as Dupont explained the situation. No permits had been issued for site work.

One tree was inadvertently removed by contractors, he explained. Other landscape modifications were believed to be located in uplands versus wetlands, Dupont said. He said plans for the property included large gardens for vegetables, but the soil was problematic but hoped to improve them.

Chairman Mike King offered a commission site visit to help the Duponts establish wetlands from uplands and to share ideas for future improvements.





An RDA filed by John and Deborah Baglini, Old Slough Road was given a negative 2 decision and a Notice of Intent filing by Gary and Illene Searle, 25 Grandview Avenue was conditioned for the construction of a concrete pad and pavers patio. It was unclear from the filing the full extent of work being proposed; thus, the filing was continued.

The Mattapoisett Housing Authority sought and received conditions for the construction of a new emergency egress and access walkway for Village Court.

The next meeting of the Mattapoisett Conservation Commission is planned for April 28 at 6:30 pm.



Buzzards Bay Coalition Granted "OK" for Conservation

Rochester Conservation Commission

The Rochester Conservation Commission began its meeting Tuesday by permitting a project to restore a bog on Wolf Island Road to natural wetlands.

The Commission granted a Negative Determination certifying that wetlands bylaw restrictions do not apply to the Buzzards Bay Coalition's proposal to install up to four temporary wells and two shallow water level monitoring wells to gauge river and groundwater levels at 52 Wolf Island Road. Coalition Restoration

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
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Coordinator Evelyn Mortimer explained these actions are part of a plan to restore the Morris family bog there into wetlands while the family retains use of two acres. The work, she said, will include removing a dam and restoring a natural water channel for fish and other wildlife and a red maple swamp.

Before the unanimous vote, Conservation Agent Merilee Kelly asked where the new well would be placed. Mortimore said, north of the site. Commission Member Ben Bailey asked how soon work such as removing the dam would commence. Mortimore admitted the project has been years in the making and the dam won't go anywhere for around two years. Bailey asked if the grass along the bog will be maintained so people can continue to view the annual boat race from that spot. Mortimore said the Coalition would work with the town and the Land Trust on these details.

Next, the Commission quickly approved a Notice of Intent for a plan to install a new private well, a rear deck and clear brush and deadwood within a wetlands buffer zone at 57 Gifford Lane. The vote came after the applicant's representative, Darren Michaelis, noted a very deep well is being proposed for the site.

In other action, the commission approved an amended Order of Conditions for a plan to construct a new home and driveway at 7 Forbes Road. Project engineer Brian Wallace, attending on Zoom, explained the amendment is needed because of changes to the site





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
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plan. The changes are to shrink the footprint of the house, lose some area in the wetlands buffer zone and move the driveway location to the left side of the house. The Commission voted to approve the Order of Conditions with the amended site plan.

In response to a Notice of Intent application to construct a single-family home on a new lot on Gifford Lane, the Commission set a site visit for April 19 at 7:30 am and continued the hearing to its next meeting. The applicant's representative, Christian Farland, explained the 8.5-acre site is currently wooded. It is basically a peninsula facing the pond. The concerns of Commission members focused on keeping the project at least 25 feet from the wetlands, as regulations require, and moving







where the driveway is placed. "Kicking the driveway over," Commission Member Mike Gifford said, "would make our lives a lot easier."

The next Conservation Commission meeting will be Tuesday, May 6 at 7:00 pm, at Town Hall, 1 Constitution Way.

Withdrawal of Petition

Rochester Zoning Board of Appeals **By Michael J. DeCicco**

The Rochester Zoning Board of Appeals met briefly on April 10 to announce the withdrawal of a problematic petition for a variance to extend the housing dwelling at 142 Sarah Sherman Road 10 feet into the side



yard setback to add new office space.

At its previous meeting, the board had to halt the hearing into this petition quickly after realizing the published notice read it was a variance request for bylaw section 20.40 E2, the section regulating accessory dwellings. Zoning panel members said it should read as a variance for the section on side lot setbacks, 20.40 D1. The board gave applicants Jason and Erin Denham and Janice Mello the choice of withdrawing the application 'without prejudice' so the hearing could be advertised with the correct wording or continuing the hearing to a future meeting. Board Chair David Arancio said that with a continuance they would not have to pay to redo the abutters' list notifications or re-advertise. But this will be a good option only if town counsel returns his call to say the section being sited does not need to be changed, he said. Denham opted for the continuance.

On April 10, the hearing concluded in an unexpected way. Arancio, chairing the meeting on Zoom, said the applicants had sent a letter requesting the board allow them to withdraw the petition entirely. Without further discussion, the board unanimously approved withdrawing the application 'without prejudice'.

Board member Richard Cutler explained after the vote that town council had advised the applicant could continue without re-posting. The applicants had decided on their town to no longer pursue the plan.

No further important business came before the





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
board. The next meeting of the Rochester Zoning Board of Appeals was scheduled for Thursday, April 24 at 7:15 pm at 1 Constitution Way.

Dear Citizens of Marion,

A small group of our residents is once again

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attempting to extricate Marion from the Green Communities Program, which since 2018 has provided over \$750,000 in grant funding to make town buildings and infrastructure more energy-efficient. Those improvements are saving the town thousands of dollars each year through reduced energy costs.

Out of the 351 municipalities in Massachusetts, 297 (85%) have joined the Green Community Program. One of the conditions for joining is to comply with the so-called "stretch" building code, which applies ONLY to new home construction and to additions larger than 1000 sq. ft. to existing homes.

The stretch code requires new construction to be more energy efficient than the "base" building code (which applies to non-Green Communities), thereby reducing energy costs to the homeowner. The stretch and base codes were nearly identical until January 2023, when an update to the stretch code was implemented by the state. As a Green Community, we are required to adhere to these updates. A further update in February 2025 relaxed some of the code requirements, notably for historic buildings.

It is crucial for all residents to understand that since the update to the stretch code in January 2023, only two homes in Marion have been affected. While initial building costs of these homes increased by a few percent (after incentives and rebates), those costs will be recovered within a few years owing to the more energy-saving construction. Thereafter, owners of those homes will continue to save money. Meanwhile, ALL the town's residents will continue to benefit from the grant money afforded by our membership in the Green Communities Program. Not only is our town saving many thousands of dollars, we're also reducing carbon pollution.

Comfort Dog Norman and his handler, School Resource Officer Jonathan Tracy, have become an integral



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part of Sippican School. Norman is tasked with providing comfort to children and staff who have experienced trauma, de-escalating stressful situations, and serving as a friendly face for the Marion Police Department. Other benefits of having a comfort dog like Norman include teaching empathy, helping students to develop stronger social skills, and building up stronger bonds between

students and police.

"Norman and I are happy to be able to recognize the students who go above and beyond with their behavior and school expectations," said Officer Tracy. "We are so proud of all the students who have earned the award so far this year,

and we look forward to presenting more awards to the students who have been 'Norminated.'"

Norman joined the Marion Police Department on June 7 last year, acquired as a 13-week-old puppy from Boone Field Labradors. Norman was the 18th member of the Plymouth County Comfort Dogs Program, overseen by District Attorney Timothy Cruz, identifying grant funding to get the Labrador trained by Professional Canine Services in Middleboro.



MNHM Annual Meeting

Marion Natural History Museum's Annual Meeting featuring Chris German of Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution will give a talk on "From Submarine Vents to Life on other Ocean Worlds" on May 16 from 6:30 pm to 7:30 pm.


The first Alvin dives to submarine vents, together with the discovery that they hosted new species of animals never seen before on Earth, was hailed as one of the top scientific discoveries of the entire 20th Century. But what was not yet known, as the millennium turned, was that Earth is not the only planetary body in our solar system that has deep saltwater oceans. In the past ~25 years it has become apparent that there may be as many as 20 such "ocean worlds" among the moons of the Giant Planets that orbit beyond our Solar System's "snow line": Jupiter, Saturn, Neptune & Uranus. While the outer pair have not been revisited since the Voyager expeditions of





the 1970s-80s, NASA's Galileo and Cassini missions to the Jupiter and Saturn systems, respectively, have revealed the presence of a number of ice-covered moons, similar in size to Earth's moons, but with salt-water oceans underneath. In the case of Jupiter's moon Europa and Saturn's moon Enceladus, careful study has revealed that those oceans are in contact with an underlying rocky seafloor. Exactly the kind of setting that could host submarine venting of a kind that could host microbial life at the base of a food chain that is independent of sunlight – just like Earth's submarine vents.

In this talk Chris will share some of the insights from WHOI scientists that are helping shape NASA's strategies to explore for life in future space missions to







icy moons – including the Europa Clipper mission, just launched in October 2024 - and how engineering at WHOI is helping to develop technologies that will be needed to explore further, using audacious, robotics-led approaches to gain access to, and explore within, their underlying oceans.





The Misconceptions of Science Fiction

The Mattapoisett Free Library will host a local author talk on Saturday, May 10 from 1:00 pm to 2:00 pm. Local resident Richard Cutler is the author of what has been described as "speculative fiction." This is a subgenre of science fiction of which there are many genres including horror and space cowboy adventures. Those exposed to only one kind of science fiction believe it is the only type and proclaim, "I don't like science fiction." However, science fiction literature in general falls behind only children's and young adult literature in popularity and is read by many but they may not fully understand the variety in the genre. Mary Shelley is credited for writing the first science fiction novel (horror) in 1818 with her story of Frankenstein. Jules Verne, however, helped popularize science fiction with what can now be considered speculative fiction with stories such as 20,000 Leagues Under the Sea. Much of what he considered has come to pass!

Today, people speculate about what will happen when man goes to Mars or how far AI might evolve. A lot of what people saw and experienced thousands of year ago was misunderstood and what they saw speculated

Movie Review



Show of Force

Warfare. Starring D'Pharaoh Woon-a-Tai and Will Poulter. Directed by Alex Garland and Ray Mendoza. Running time: 95 minutes. MPAA rating: R. Now playing in theaters.

The whomping bass impact of explosives, the staccato clatter of gunfire: these sounds defined the combat aesthetic of writer-director Alex Garland's previous film, last year's *Civil War*. Iraq War veteran Ray Mendoza served as Garland's military supervisor on that movie, and now the two have collaborated on *Warfare*, a no-frills, no-nonsense account of a 2006 incident in Mendoza's experience as a Navy SEAL. I'm of two minds about it. Certainly the film, which unfolds in real time and follows only a narrative taken from the memories of Mendoza and others who fought and survived that day, announces itself as pure cinema that pledges allegiance exclusively to what happened.

Narrative, though, isn't only about what happened. It's about who it happened to, and why. Nobody cares about "why" in Warfare — the SEALs just follow orders — and in its indifference to the men as characters the film comes weirdly close to nihilism. The movie is experiential bordering on experimental — someone finally made a war movie devoted to the moment-to-moment carnage and trauma and, yes, boredom (the hurry-up-and-wait aspect) of combat to the exclusion of everything else. It's true that not every movie can be The Deer Hunter, which spent about its first hour with the men who would then be lowered into the meat grinder of Vietnam. But even viewers predisposed to give Warfare the benefit of the doubt may find it wanting on some level.

The cast includes strong actors like Will Poulter, Charles Melton, and D'Pharaoh Woon-a-Tai (from *Reservation Dogs*) as Mendoza himself. Their personalities, expressed through their actions and reactions, aren't quite enough to raise the film above a very well-crafted you-are-there anecdote. The directors may feel that the less insight we get into the men, the more we can map ourselves onto them. So *Warfare* isn't a film that delivers juicy large-scale personae like, say, Gunnery Sergeant Hartman or Colonel Kilgore. It is determinedly small-scale, almost claustrophobic in its limitation to one house where the SEALs hunker down and eventually await



rescue. And there are no authority figures, just guys who give orders but have to clear everything with absent commanding officers. There's a vaguely funny moment when a SEAL has to pretend he's a CO to get some tanks sent out. Otherwise, as Martin Sheen grumbled in *Apocalypse Now*, "there's no [expletive] CO here."

Warfare is expertly assembled and, on a shot-by-shot basis, unquestionable. One imagines combat veterans nodding and approving of the film's verisimilitude. But those veterans might also like a story and characters. This movie comes damn close to saying it doesn't matter who these men are or why they're doing what they're doing. They are Navy SEALs and they do what they're told. This may be true to the reality of being in the service. I have no issue with the realism of what we're shown. But I miss what we're not shown.

Garland and Mendoza deny themselves too many of the tools that dramatists work with; they even leave out drama, in the sense of story conflict (as opposed to the obvious conflict of men shooting at each other) and the sometimes corny, sometimes important tropes that can serve as shorthand or sketch. No SEAL in Warfare pauses heavily and looks at a pocket photo of his wife and kids. I'm not saying any of them *should* — it's corny. But we also don't get anything in place of the clichés the filmmakers leave out. Two of the men are badly injured, and their pain and screaming might mean more to us if we knew anything about them. What passes for narrative has the first-this-then-that cadence of an impersonal military report, complete with dialogue that's almost all code and mumbo-jumbo about protocols. And because of its emphasis on minute-to-minute action, it doesn't — it can't — have anything to say about war that we haven't heard before in over a hundred years of war cinema. One can respect the filmmakers' impulse towards purity and factuality and still miss the shape and complexity a skilled dramatist — even one who's never seen combat — can bring to a war story.

on, correctly or incorrectly. For example, no one considered the giant bones they saw to be dinosaur bones. People might have thought they were from giant humans. If they saw an alien or alien spacecraft, how would they rationalize what they saw? These are the concepts that will be explored interactively to better understand the general topic of science fiction. Cutler will then read a couple of sections from a couple of his books and offer signed copies. Cutler is an engineer living in Rochester and retired from the Marine Biological Laboratory in Woods Hole. He has spent much of career writing technical material working with other engineers and scientists, creating a fertile playground for his mind to consider many "what ifs." Those "what ifs" are now put into print by Cutler. His stories are appropriate reading for teenagers and up.

Rochester Memorial Day Boat and Kayak Race

The Rochester Fire Department will again sponsor the Rochester Memorial Day Boat Race.

The Rochester Memorial Day Boat Race on the Mattapoisett River will take place on Monday, **May 26**, starting at 8:30 am at Grandma Hartley's Reservoir, Snipatuit Road, in Rochester and finishing at the Mattapoisett Herring Weir at River Road and Route 6.

A Kayak Division will again be included in the race this year. Basic guidelines for the division are: minimum age 18, single person kayak that the contestant can sit inside of the cockpit, contestant must wear an approved USCG personal flotation device for the entire race, and there will be a \$10 entry fee. See the rules document for all information pertaining to the kayak division.

For the Mattapoisett River Racer (MRR) boats, the minimum age for contestants is seven years old on Memorial Day. There will be two people to a boat. The boat must be a homemade river racer design of any material you choose. There are no limitations or restrictions on types of paddles.

Divisions include the kayak division and the MRR open/men's, women's, junior boys, junior girls, coed and parent/child divisions. Junior division teams are both contestants under 14 years old. Parent/child is for a parent with his/her child (child under 14 years old) or an adult (25 or older) with a child (child under 14 years old). Trophies will be awarded to the first, second and third-place finishers in each division.

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




