followed by Stolba, who said this was her final event as Interim Secretary. She stated she was happy it could be in such a beautiful location. \$1.9 million of the final price tag came from a Seaport Economic Council grant through the Massachusetts Executive Office of Economic Development.

Finally, Select Board Chair Randy Parker spoke, detailing his and the board's collaboration with everyone present to finish the build. "I'd be two times a day" he said, detailing his walks around the construction site and on-the-fly problem solving as issues arose. Following his speech, he grabbed his big scissors and headed up the stairs with other representatives to officially cut the ribbon.

Ashley Stolba with Kelly Dooner cut the ribbon, thus ending the long project and officially beginning the new site at 1 Island Wharf Road's projected long history of managing Marion Harbor.

'A Proclamation for Suppressing Rebellion and Sedition'

This Week in Revolutionary History...

This week in Revolutionary War History, let's discuss what was going on 250 years ago in and around the colonial Province of Massachusetts Bay. Last week, Washington concluded his spout with General Thomas Gage, gunpowder was successfully stolen from Bermuda, and Washington appointed Thomas Mifflin to Quartermaster General in continuing attempts to curb the Continental Army's supply crisis.

On August 20, 1775, Washington writes to General Philip Schuyler at Fort Ticonderoga apologizing for supply delays. He says he has met with members of the Continental Congress from Philadelphia, who assured Washington powder will be forwarded north. He also instructs Schuyler to "seek a strict neutrality of the Indian Nations," or don't engage in battle with local tribes as to not push them into allying with the British. He also says, if possible, broker offensive alliances. Washington then outlines the most important message of the letter, "The design of this express is to communicate to you a plan

of an expedition, which has engrossed my thoughts for several days: It is to penetrate into Canada."

While we now benefit from hindsight, the Continental plan was to march north from Ticonderoga, go around Montreal, traverse along the Saint Lawrence River and assault Quebec City. Quebec had, by far, the most population of any Canadian city. Capturing it would secure the loyalist colony and disallow the British from supplying in the region. That's the thought, at least. There was also the prevailing sentiment that the French Quebecois, having been conquered by the British about 15 years earlier, would ally with the 13 Colonies. Washington promises to send Schuyler an additional 1,000 to 1,200 and envisions Colonel Benedict Arnold leading the incursion.

A couple days later in keeping with the theme of supply shortages, Jonathan Trumbull of Connecticut writes to Washington saying, "We are greatly exhausted" and states no powder has arrived following his request. He states he and the state General Assembly have encouraged the people of the state to collect saltpeter and



sulfur, issuing bounties for both materials essential in powder creation.

On August 22, Washington's General Orders stray away from supplies and instead focus on something else. "The General does not mean to discourage the practice of bathing, whilst the weather is warm enough to continue it; but he expressly forbids, any persons doing it, at or near the Bridge in Cambridge, where it has been observed and complained of, that many men, lost to all sense of decency and common modesty, are running about naked upon the bridge, whilst passengers, and even ladies of the first fashion in the neighborhood, are passing over it, as if they meant to glory in their shame: The guards and [s] entries at the Bridge, are to put a stop to this practice for

the future." Incredible. Again, the ragtag group of farmers seriously lacks discipline.

We move across the pond to London, August 23, 1775. King George III issues and signs a proclamation at Saint James Palace. It is titled, "A Proclamation, by The King, for Suppressing Rebellion and Sedition," more generally known as the *Proclamation of Rebellion*. The King states the colonies, "misled by dangerous and ill designing men," are hostile in their obstruction of commerce and law. Britain now officially sees itself in a full state of war, with the King telling subjects "to use their utmost endeavors to withstand and suppress such rebellion." There is also a hunt for traitors and conspirators. The *Olive Branch Petition*, sent to London by the Continental Congress on July 5, was therefore rejected and ignored by King George III.



Do You Need Electrolyte or "Performance" Drinks?

What Does The Doctor Say?

One of my favorite cartoons showed two young men walking off the basketball court, one saying, "I am bushed; I must be really low in electrolytes;" Response: "yes, we really need some electrolytes right away. "First man: "What are electrolytes?"

Electrolytes are minerals, predominantly sodium, potassium and calcium in the human body, that both circulate in the blood and are inside our cells, that regulate our fluid balance. The body tightly regulates the levels of electrolytes under most conditions.

You lose electrolytes, predominantly sodium, along with water when you sweat. If you lose enough, you become dehydrated and can suffer low blood pressure and feel faint.

Under most circumstances, drinking water is all you need to balance the fluid loss from heavy exercise and sweating. Rarely, if you are doing an endurance exercise such as running a marathon, particularly in hot weather, and are drinking large amounts of water, you can dilute down your serum sodium to dangerous levels. There have even been deaths.

Dozens of "sports drinks" promise to replace your electrolytes and improve your athletic performance. Most also contain lots of sugar, though sugar-free varieties are available

Do you need these? Almost certainly not. For most sports activities, simply drinking water is fine. Remember that you also get electrolytes in your food. Bananas are rich in potassium; dairy products are rich in calcium and many foods contain sodium.

If there is anything useful in these drinks, it is

more likely the sugar, which will give you quick energy for exercise. The amount of electrolytes they contain is generally modest and will not have an impact on your performance or health.

There have been recorded cases of toxins such as arsenic in these commercial sports drinks.

So, save your money. Carry a water bottle when you exercise in warm conditions and have a few pretzels when you get home.

Another product of which to be wary are the "energy drinks" and "energy shots" such as Monster, Red Bull, Celsius and Rock Star. These contain large amounts of caffeine and are often consumed by people who should get off the road or put away their books and sleep rather

What's Up There?

Astronomy Update for September

Summer vacation is over, and autumn is nearing. This month, be prepared to see some stars, planets, and meteors as the cool air chases away the humidity

(hopefully).

The Aurigids Meteor Shower is ongoing from August 28 to September 5. Its peak will fall on September 1, producing around six meteors per hour. The comet of origin, C/1911 N1 (Kiess), passed by the Sun in 1911 and was discovered in 1935. It will pass again around the year 4400 with a 2,490-year orbital period.

This month's full moon, the "Corn Moon," will be on September 7. That is the same day as a lunar eclipse visible for most of the world's population – but <u>not</u> us. A total lunar eclipse will be visible over most of Asia and Oceania with a partial eclipse being visible across Africa and Europe. However, no luck for the Americas this time, with no visibility of the event for us (we're also missing out on a solar eclipse that will be partially visible across the Pacific on September 21).



Another! The Epsilon Perseids Meteor Shower, not to be confused with last month's Perseid Meteor Shower, will take place September 5 to September 21. It peaks on September 9, and due to it falling two days after the full moon, meteor visibility will likely be hampered a bit by lunar light. The shower is unrelated from last month's Perseid, with the origin of these meteors not being wholly confirmed. Like the Aurigids, this shower won't be nearly as intense as the greats, with only around five meteors per minute.

On September 18 in Nevada, on the opposite end of the state as the ongoing Burning Man, the Great Basin Astronomy Festival starts on September 18 at Great Basin National Park. Be prepared to see some great pics on your

Ethics of Appointments Debated

Mattapoisett Select Board

During the August 26 meeting of the Mattapoisett Select Board, the issue of ethics with respect to a short-term appointment became a flash point. The agenda listed "Action Items discussion and possible vote on Board of Health Interim Member to the Board of Health." The appointment would fill a vacancy expected on the board before the end of Alexandra Nicoloci's term ends.

It has been the practice of the town to fill short-term postings with residents willing to provide short-term assistance. But there was resistance to the board's selection of Douglas Schneider who was a candidate for the Board of Health ultimately defeated in the last election.

Select Board member Tyler Macallister advocated for Schneider's appointment saying he was qualified and had shown obvious interest in the position. But current BOH member Michelle Bernier lobbied for a replacement with a public health background, Kathy Eklund. Eklund had submitted a multipage curriculum verte that outlined her many years working in the public health sector.

There ensued a period of discussion that included questions about the number of times Schneider, a civil engineer will need to recuse himself due to business relationships a common occurrence with the current board given that the BOH chairman, Carmelo Nicolosi is also

a civil engineer. Resident Donald Fleming, commenting from the floor, pointedly asked Nicolosi how frequently he recused himself from voting on matters brought before the BOH. He wasn't sure possibly four times a year.


Bernier stated that it was sometimes difficult to vote on projects brought before the BOH because of Nicolosi's affiliation with Charon and Associates. Naming another local engineer might not be prudent she believed. Bernier said that although the BOH deals with a number of septic related hearings, public health is also a large part of their area of responsibility.

Nicoloci said he had spoken to the state ethics board but when pressed by Fleming said it wasn't a written opinion. Fleming said, "... this whole thing seems to be evolving about ethics." The need for board members to recuse themselves from some matters due to their personal or business relationships requires the members to "self-report" town administrator Mike Lorenco said.

Resident Nikki Demakis said that even the appearance of a conflict was problematic. "...they have an obligation under their appointing authority." She said, "It does not make sense not to appoint her (Eklund).

The Select board ultimately decided to take the matter up with legal counsel.

Another hot button item discussed was a citizen's petition to hold a Special Town Meeting specifically to hear voters in the matter of another citizen's petition that passed at the Fall Town Meeting. The petition,

authored by Nikki Demakis sought to determine the public's appetite for increasing the Select Board from 3 to 5 members. It passed the Spring Town Meeting. Now the voters will be asked whether or not they wish to overturn that vote and leave the Select Board as a 3-member board. The Select Board will check schedules to determine viable dates to hold this one-article Town Meeting and will post that date one week before holding the meeting.

In other matters, the town received a check from ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) in the amount of \$57,500.

They tabled a request from the Marine Advisory Board for a reduction of voting members from seven to five citing the difficulty in achieving a quorum especially

Also on the agenda was the official appointment of members to the Open Space and Recreation Steering Committee. The mission of the OSRC Steering Committee as noted in their charge is to advise the Select Board on matters related to open space and recreation. They will facilitate the development of the OSRC plan document which reflects and supports the committee's priorities and goals. It will establish goals that will examine issues for the future of open space and recreation. It will also establish a timeline for achieving goals.

The committee consists of nine members representing the Conservation Commission, the Bike Path committee, the Mattapoisett Land Trust, one member of the recreation staff, and four members from the general public. The committee's volunteers are Nathan Ketchel representing the Planning Board, Barry Lima representing the Conservation Commission, Richard Grahn representing the Bike Path committee, Marissa Hughes from the Mattapoisett Recreation Department, Kristen McCormack from the Mattapoisett Land Trust, and from the community at large Robin Lepore, Frank White, and Janice Robbins.

The committee is charged with working with town staff officials, the public and the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development in the establishment of goals and objectives, action items and review of all materials including the review of public feedback from surveys and public meetings. The synthesizing of all materials into coherent actionable strategies will be a key element of the OSRC's work.

The next meeting of the Mattapoisett Select Board is scheduled for Tuesday, September 9 at 6:00 pm in Town Hall or on Zoom.

for a large-scale solar photovoltaic array at Rochester Memorial School which will allow construction to happen during the school year.

The plan in question is to construct a canopymounted 250KW AC solar array system over a portion of the school's rear paved parking lot. Planning Board Chair Arnold Johnson said Tuesday one of the conditions of the permit was that construction was to take place over the summer vacation when no children would be around and the space would not be so busy. Circumstances around that plan have changed, he said. Now the contractor, Solect Energy Development, Hopkinton, is looking to start construction in September and finish work by the end of December.

Johnson began discussion by noting board members have visited the site and reviewed details such as the necessary performance bond for the work. He then asked if the work would impede student drop-off in the morning and pick-up in the afternoon and faculty parking.

RMS Principal Heidi Letendre answered that parents will be asked to extend their "que" line for dropoff and pick-up further around the front of the school and the time students will be allowed in the school will be altered. Solect consultant Clint Shuckel assured the board the contractor will not do heavy work between seven and eight a.m. (when students arrive for the school day) or 2:30-3:30 (student pick-up time), and sub-contractors





are being instructed to not make deliveries during those times. He said work hours will be 7 a.m.-6 p.m., Monday to Friday, and no Saturday work hours.

Town Planner Michaela Shoemaker said Police Michael Assad has indicated concern over unauthorized personnel entering the school building. ORR District Facilities Manager Gene Jones responded that all personnel working in the school area have been CORIchecked (Criminal Offender Record Information).

Discussion ended with a decision that this was a minor rather than a major permit change. A major change would have required a public hearing. The approval vote was 4-1, with member Marc Rousseau voting against.

The board's next motions were continuations. The



panel continued to its next meeting the Definitive Subdivision application hearing on turning an 8.67-acre parcel at 19 County Road into three lots after a lengthy discussion over the expensive road bond the petitioners are being asked to post.

The plan here is to retain the existing house lot and create two new lots for additional four-bedroom residential housing. Patrick Mulvahill, representing the petitioners Robert and Christine Murphy, said he had questions for the town's consulting engineer, Ken Motta, in response to the lengthy peer review letter with permit requirements that Motta recently issued. He wanted to know if covenant language in the permit waivers could address the high cost of the road performance bond. "This

is money the Murphys did not foresee having to pay," Milvahill said.

Johnson explained a road performance bond protects the town and future residents of the homes should the contractor go belly-up before finishing the road. Consulting engineer Robert Espisito, appearing on Zoom, requested the continuance after concluding he will first speak with Motta on the details of the peer review and the road bond issue.

The board also continued to its next meeting the Special Permit and Site Plan Review hearing for the proposal from Logging Swamp Solar dba ReWild Renewables to install a ground-mounted, large scale solar panel array with associated site work on 49 acres in the area of 600 Snipatuit Road.

The board then continued to the same date its other large-scale solar project hearing: the Site Plan Review application for the construction of a floating and ground-mounted solar array with associated battery energy storage system at 53 Dexter Lane.

In other action, Johnson announced that long-time member Ben Bailey has resigned. But Bailey has agreed to stay on until the conclusion of the Logging Swamp Solar project, he said. The board needs a supermajority of its members to be present to legally vote on such a permit and Bailey has been involved in the hearings since the beginning. The board then elevated member Michael Murphy to Board Clerk to replace Bailey in that role and



appointed Matt Bache as Assistant Clerk.

The board tentatively set September 3 as the date for its site visit of the Dexter Lane floating solar array project.

The Rochester Planning Board's next meeting will be Tuesday, September 9 at 7:00 pm at Town Hall, 1 Constitution Way.

Farm Stand's Withdrawal Lacks Closure

Mattapoisett Zoning Board of Appeals **By Marilou Newell**

Michael King's variance petition case 1563 involving King's right to use 84 North Street as a farmstand came to an end on August 21. King, through his attorney James Marsh, asked for a withdrawal without prejudice which was granted by the Mattapoisett Zoning Board of Appeals.

King's long journey to get a definitive ruling from the Building Department seemed to take a number of twists and turns, not the least of which was King's assertion that Mattapoisett is a right-to-farm community and that the farmstand is covered by the Dover Amendment which grants farmers certain rights over and above local zoning ordinances, and that the property in question had a history as a farm.

After a number of meetings including not only the Zoning Board of Appeals and the Planning Board, which subsequently approved his requested site-plan

review, King withdrew his petition. However, that withdrawal did not include a discontinuation of what he referred to as "self-serve" operation for the sale of meats, fruits and vegetables. His ability to sell products from the stand was not challenged by the ZBA.

The board members were in agreement that a withdrawal could be granted; the case was quickly opened and closed, leaving abutters wondering if they could voice their objections. That was not to be the case. Chairman Susan Akin said, "This goes someplace else now," although where was not noted. She said, "We don't deal with this any longer."

Town Administrator Mike Lorenco said in a follow-up that, although the ZBA noted the Select Board

is now a likely route to a conclusion in this matter, that is not actually the case. He said the Building Department is the authority over this matter.

The next meeting of the Mattapoisett Zoning Board of Appeals is scheduled for Thursday, September 18 at 6:00 pm at Town Hall.

Parks Seek Doubled Budget

Rochester Park Commission

Rochester's Park Commission on August 21 focused its discussion on needing a bigger budget for FY26.

Commission Chair David Sylvia said the board hasn't had a budget increase since he began serving on the board 21 years ago. Its annual allotment is \$25,000 for expenses and another \$7,000 for salaries. He said the department will likely exhaust its salary account by November due to a part-time employee, an Old Colony Regional Vocational-Technical High School student who is currently maintaining the town's athletic fields.

The commissioners concluded they will ask for funding increases as high as double current levels when the next budget cycle rolls around, early next year. As examples of the dilemmas they face, commission member Kenneth Ross said fencing around the athletic fields needs replacing every year. Sylvia said the commission cut back on fertilizer for the fields' grounds in 2025 to use the funds on other important projects. That cut shaved from the budget \$2,000-3,000 for a single application, but the commission said it's a move that should not be repeated.

The commission cannot keep cutting back on fertilizer every year, member Nathan Reece said. "Rochester people don't want their fields to turn into a dust bowl," he said. The commission needs to update its budget to make it realistic, he noted, as the cost of everything keeps going up.

The commission agreed to seek some kind of budget increase based on exact calculations of what extra funding they need.

The commission did not set up its next meeting before adjourning.

The Marion Marine Resources Commission held a brief meeting on August 20 at the town's Maritime Center Conference Room. The meeting spanned less than 13 minutes but was filled with some unforgettable tributes. The Select Board and the MRC gave citations to retiring commissioners: Toby Burr, Greg Houdelette, Peter Borsari, and Eiv Strand.

Murphy and other officials said these years involved the creation of a harbor patrol, as well as increased use of the harbor and all the oversight needed for that expansion.

Houdelette has 38 years of experience serving on the MRC, according to Select Board Chairman Randy Parker. Strand has 36 years of service to the MRC; Burr also has 36 years of service, and Borsari has 22.

"We appreciate your time and work and time away from your family," Parker said. "It's a lot of time invested."

EMC Shifts Focus to Education on Green Energy

Marion Energy Management Committee

If all goes as planned, author David Green will be coming to town with tips on how homeowners can save energy. This topic was one of many energy-saving ideas discussed via Zoom at the August 24 Marion Energy Management Committee.

Green is a graduate of Oxford University and Harvard Business School and is the author of *Zero Carbon Home*, which touches upon how heat pumps, triple-paned windows, and solar panels can help save money for homeowners.

Green has been in contact with one EMC member and would be willing to conduct a talk, according to committee members on Monday. If approved by Select Board members and a location is secured, the EMC is hoping to secure a talk by Green, a name fitting to the green initiatives he would talk about.

EMC members proposed that the Music Hall or the police station meeting room could be good candidates for this discussion. Committee members also said copies of his book would be available.

Seeing the town's strategy as short-sighted, the EMC unsuccessfully recommended against the May 12 Town Meeting vote that revoked Marion's participation in the state's Stretch Code, the building code that exceeds state law, prioritizing electric energy over fossil fuels. The vote rescinded Marion's membership in the commonwealth's Green Communities program, which awards grant funding to compliant municipalities based on incentives. The Town of Rochester had preceded Marion by becoming the first municipality to reject



Massachusetts' Stretch Code and membership in Green Communities.

Another outreach opportunity was also discussed by the EMC. A video is in the works that highlights all the green initiatives in Marion from 2018 to 2024. The EMC is looking to master this product and release it on Old Rochester Community Television (ORCTV) and through other platforms.

Also revealed on Monday was that the town has received a feasibility grant through the state to assess potential locations to set up vehicle charging stations.

The EMC is looking to contact the ORR School District to assess school buildings and how the schools can save on energy costs and initiate other green strategies. According to EMC members, there is \$5,000,000 available for Massachusetts public schools.

The committee then set up a meeting with the Select Board about the potential for solar energy that could be used by the town. The EMC said that tax rebates and other incentives will be drying up at the end of this year.

Members said homeowners looking to procure solar panels or other energy savings through Mass Save should begin seeking out those plans before the end of the calendar year.

The next meeting of the Marion Energy Management Committee is scheduled for Monday, September 22, at 6:00 pm.

To Rent or Buy? Harvesting Milfoil

Rochester Water Commission

The water-choking, invasive, plant species milfoil or water milfoils (Myriophyllum) was recently found growing in four of Rochester's ponds: Snipatuit; Snows; Leonard; and Hathaway. The Rochester Water Commission may have a unique solution to the problem by buying its own weed-harvesting equipment.

The Water Commission met on August 13 to discuss this and other concerns regarding the town's 900-acre pond system. Chair Fred Underhill said the notice about the milfoil problem originally arrived in an email

from the Conservation Commission. "It's a problem we've been dealing with for a couple of months," he said. Underhill also said commission member Rick Charon has been studying the problem and has more data on it. Charon was unable to attend the August 13 meeting.

Water Commission member David Hughes noted the Town of Acushnet has started a clean-up program on Lake Street in that town with rented weed-harvesting equipment. That's when Underhill and Town Administrator Cameron Durant offered an alternative solution. Both men said they have reached out to State Representative Mark Sylvia for funding to buy a piece of milfoil weed-harvesting equipment for the town's regular use.

Durant said renting such equipment would cost \$5,000 a day. However, to buy this equipment outright, it would cost roughly \$105,000. He is reaching out to Sylvia's office to apply for an Environmental Bond Bill grant to fund all or part of that purchase. He noted what rented equipment will return again in the future. "In a couple of years, we'll have to do it again," he said. The town would have that equipment to use on a regular basis.

He cautioned, however, that the clean-up won't happen until next summer, especially since Town Meeting action in May 2026 will probably be needed to fund part of the purchase. The Water Commission, nonetheless, signaled its full support of the plan.

In other action, the commission approved 19 County Road's request to access Wareham municipal water to the level of 900 gallons per day. Commission members elaborated that the property owner is now subdividing this lot.

Commission consultant and former Town Planner Nancy Durfee initiated discussion of a report that the commission received regarding water flowing north (leaving in the wrong direction) from Snipatuit Brook and Snipatuit Pond and the Mattapoisett River watershed. The goal, the report states, is to "explore ways to keep more water in the Mattapoisett River System." Durant elaborated, "Water is flowing in the wrong direction to benefit other communities."

Woodland Walk for Mushrooms

We always have a BBQ on the beach with an open fire. Please bring a few pieces of firewood if you have them around. If you have a small portable BBQ, bring that as well (I will bring a small propane BBQ). The BBQ will be on Saturday night with a rain date of Sunday night.

There is also a Labor Day parade of boats on Monday morning. Other optional activities based on group interest. One possibility is breakfast at the Fisherman's Club.

Moorings are all first come first serve. The inner harbor has moorings and a few slips. The slips for this weekend get sold out months in advance. The moorings fill up fast, anchor locations are few and have extremely poor holding due to mud and eel grass. The outer harbor has many moorings and good anchoring but is exposed to North Winds. Normally winds are from the Southwest. Moorings are \$55 per boat.

Labor Day weekend is the busiest weekend of the year at Cuttyhunk. If you want to be sure of getting a mooring, it is best to show up on Friday, or before noon on Saturday. I believe (check for yourself) that you can raft two boats on the same morning, but each boat must




pay the \$55 fee.





Mattapoisett Museum

Please join the Mattapoisett Museum, 5 Church Street, on **September 4**, from 6:00 pm to 7:30 pm for its Annual Meeting. After a brief business meeting, noted



historian and author, and member of the Aquinnah Wampanoag, Linda Coombs, will speak on the subject of historical erasure - the systematic reduction or elimination of the presence of a people when history is being related by their colonizers of the original people. She will also discuss the Mattapoisett Museum's upcoming permanent exhibit about the Wampanoag, of which she was the primary author.

The upcoming exhibit, titled "From the Land to the Shore: The Wampanoag of Mattapoisett" will explore the history and culture of the Wampanoag People who have continuously inhabited this part of New England for



at least 12,000 years. Told from the Wampanoag perspective, in Coombs voice, it follows the story of the Early Contact Period and Colonization through King Philip's War and its outcomes to the Wampanoag culture and community as they exist today. The exhibit weaves in local, Tri-Town-Area-related examples of broader historical narratives whenever possible. However, the scarcity of these examples may

actually be pointed to as an example, in and of itself, of the thorough nature of historical erasure.

Coombs began her museum career in an internship at the Boston Children's Museum, and later worked there in the Native American Program. Coombs also worked for 30 years in the Wampanoag Indigenous Program (WIP) of Plimoth Plantation, now called Plimoth Patuxet, including 15 years as WIP's Associate Director; and 9 years at the Aquinnah Cultural Center. Presently she does independent museum consulting and cultural presentations.

In her latest book, *Colonization and the Wampanoag Story*, Coombs aims to educate students about the Wampanoag perspective of the European colonization of New England. It was published in September of 2023, as one of five titles in Penguin Random House's Race to the Truth series of similarly themed stories intended



Richard Weston Straffin, 85, of Rochester passed away peacefully on August 12, 2025. He had been married for 48 years to the late Lois Carol Phillips Straffin. He was the son of the late Weston and Irene (Reeves) Straffin.

Born in Brockton, he raised a family of 8 in Middleboro, where he was a volunteer fireman. Richard built the home

Movie Review



Hard Case Crime

Honey Don't! Starring Margaret Qualley and Aubrey Plaza. Directed by Ethan Coen. Running time: 89 minutes. MPAA rating: R. Now playing in theaters.

If you were to watch any isolated scene from *Honey Don't!*, the new goof from married team Ethan Coen (director, co-writer) and Tricia Cooke (co-writer, co-editor), you might find it quirky and entertaining, and might want to see the whole movie. If you were to watch the whole movie, you might find it quirky and entertaining here and there, and might wish you'd stuck with isolated scenes. Sometimes a sample is better than a meal.

Like its predecessor *Drive-Away Dolls*, *Honey Don't* is a lighter-than-air confection that strains to be meaningless fun. But there are some heavy resonances here, seemingly imported from a more serious film, that end up killing the fun. It's about being a lesbian in a maledominated world full of male idiots, abusers, and crooks. The hero is Honey O'Donahue (Margaret Qualley), a private detective who gets involved in the apparent "traffic fatality" of a woman who'd contacted her to meet up. The woman's death may be connected to the following: Reverend Drew (Chris Evans), sleazy pastor at a local church; laconic but passionate cop M.G. Falcone (Aubrey Plaza), with whom Honey hits the sheets; and the disappearance of Honey's niece, gothy teen Corinne (Talia Ryder).

It *may* be connected, but as the movie traipses along (it's mercifully short at 89 minutes, which helps) we may get the insecure feeling that none of the plot really matters. I mean, it wraps up, and there's an explanation of sorts, but we get the sense that the real reason Coen and Cooke wanted to make the film was for those isolated scenes. And some of them are damn good. For the most part, whenever Qualley and Plaza share space, all is forgiven. Like Sharon Stone in last week's *Nobody 2*, they understand the assignment (here, a horny neo-*noir*) and shine accordingly. It's a shame, though, about their last scene, which they may have enjoyed enacting, but we don't really enjoy watching.

Honey is surrounded by guys who don't get it, sometimes to their lethal detriment. The movie is the middle piece in a proposed B-movie trilogy (*Go Beavers* is supposed to be the last, if Coen and Cooke



can convince someone to bankroll it) that's meant to be just-for-fun stuff, not much riding on them, certainly no awards prestige. They're the cinematic equivalents of those Hard Case Crime paperbacks that writers like Joyce Carol Oates or Stephen King knock out when they want to feel lowdown and unpretentious. But here, Coen and Cooke introduce a sobering subtext of absent or violent male figures who warp the lives and psyches of girls and women. This is not a bad or invalid theme for a movie, especially one concerning lesbians, but a certain chilly vibe accompanies it, a cold splash of the real world in what's basically a comedic fantasy populated by amusingly inhabited wind-up dolls.

Who knows, maybe *Honey Don't!* will look better in the rearview as part of Coen and Cooke's larger project. But like *Grindhouse*, these movies are inspired by genuine rotgut exploitation yarns that weren't created to be clever *homages* or riffs; by and large they were created to pay the bills, and that was the only larger project anyone had in mind. The tension between a tongue-in-cheek tribute to the thing and the thing itself was pretty much the engine of Joel and Ethan Coen's debut *Blood Simple* 41 years ago. The Coens were genuflecting towards James M. Cain and sending him up at the same time.

Ethan does a similar thing here, and Tricia Cooke adds the element of flawed, thirsty lesbians who are nobody's idea of role models, which makes these movies feel new and fresh in that respect. (Well, not altogether new, but new for a film that opened in 1,300 theaters.) Cooke, who identifies as queer, wants to give us characters who'll never be nominated for Best Queer Representation in a Motion Picture. That's appreciated. What isn't is a plot that hits awkwardly on real traumas when it isn't stopping for gags about sex toys or plump women in BDSM leather. The tone and the themes are, and end up, at odds, and we're not sure what our ultimate feelings should be. Maybe Coen and Cooke intended that. If so, hats off. But that probably won't help *Honey Don't!* reach an audience outside of us Coen-heads.

From the Files of the Rochester Historical Society By Connie Eshbach

On August 20 at the Rochester Historical Museum, there was a joint meeting of the Rochester Historical Society and the Rochester Historical Commission. The purpose of the meeting was to kick off a project that will culminate in 2026 for the nation's 250th anniversary. For a rainy evening, the meeting was pretty well attended.

The project is to gain information about the many Rochester men who participated in the Revolutionary War and hopefully, to document their final resting place with a photo. We handed out lists of the Rochester soldiers and sailors from the rolls of the state archives. The lists that can be found in the back of the book "Mattapoisett and Old Rochester" were compiled in a joint effort by James L. Hammond and Mary Hall Leonard. The names are presented with the caveat that there may well be more added with the passage of time.

One way to participate in our project, "The Search to Find and Honor Rochester's Revolutionary Veterans," would be to pick a name or names from the list and then to look for a grave to match. Because the same names

were used over and over (fathers, sons, nephews, etc.), you want to make sure that the birth/death dates coincide with an age that would fit with being a soldier between 1775 and 1783.

Once you have a name, there are quite a few ways that you can find information. Being less of a "techie" and more of a "bookie" (not the taking bets kind), I started at Plumb Library. The library has a collection of encyclopedia type books where the names of Massachusetts Revolutionary veterans are listed in alphabetical order with their town, rank, company and

service. The same name may appear 2 or 3 times in a row as men signed up, served days or months, went home and then signed up again.



For example, Levi

Gurney, Rochester, Private, was in Capt. Seth Briggs' Company which marched "on the Alarm of April 19, 1776." His service was for 4 days. However, he served again with Capt. Edward Sparrow's Co., Capt. John Gibbs' Co. and Capt. Elijah Baker's Co. This can all be found in the books at the library.

There are also several web sites that provide good information and go into greater detail. We have a list of them at the Historical Society. One that I used without much difficulty was the MA, Rev War Index Cards to Muster Rolls, 1775-1783. This also connected me to Family Tree which gave me information on parents, siblings, wives and children. It asks for a birth date. but when I didn't have one, I put in a possible year (I picked 1745) and a name that matched my search came up with the correct year.

For anyone interested, we have packets that contain the lists, websites and likely cemeteries. They will be available at our next meeting on **September** 17 at the Museum, 355 County Road at 7:00 pm. Bruce

Remember that until the middle of the 1800's, Marion and Mattapoisett were sections of the town of Rochester, so some of our veterans may well be buried in cemeteries that are in either of those towns.






