Hugh Thanks His 'Chain of Survival'

Captain Kevin Richard of the Rochester Fire Department could not believe his eyes.

Having received the call at approximately 8:30 am on May 10 that a golfer at Rochester Golf Club was unconscious and not breathing with CPR reportedly in progress, he arrived at the course parking lot off Route 105 to the sight of Hugh McGonagle's arms flopping into the air and back down, out of sight.

"That's the best CPR I've ever seen," Richard recalled saying.

The life-saving intervention was being performed by fellow Sunday-morning golfer John Magilton, who intercepted McGonagle's playing partners in transport back toward the clubhouse from way out on the 3rd hole where McGonagle had collapsed while sitting in his cart. Magilton, a medical professional who recognized the trouble from the 1st hole, told them upon reaching the parking lot that McGonagle needs to be on the ground, where he furiously worked for two minutes until EMT's were on site.

"I was spent," Magilton confessed.

Critical recognition, critical seconds, critical training and critical decisions among several parties that morning saved McGonagle's life. In celebrating this success story on Friday at the Rochester Senior Center, Richard identified Magilton's intervention as an essential component in the "chain of survival."

The arrival of Rochester Rescue 210 and Engine 193 coincided with that of the Rochester Police Department. Suddenly, a team of EMT's, paramedics, and police officers were engaged in McGonagle's treatment and evaluation. CPR continued in the parking lot, upgraded with use of the Lifepak 15 Cardiac Monitor and

the Lucas automated CPR device. Several shocks were administered.

An ambulance took McGonagle to Tobey Hospital. On the way, he regained consciousness and communicated but, being critically ill, was taken from Tobey to Boston via Boston Medflight Helicopter.

Paramedic Steve Cody, McGonagle's son-in-law and a nurse practitioner, paused to reflect on the storm in his mind as he was faced with such a personal situation.

"I flipfopped back and forth between paramedic

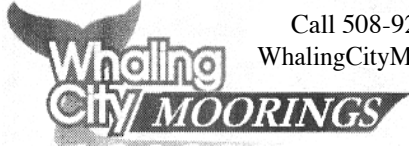

and son," he said, recalling the realization that his wife Danielle, McGonagle's daughter, was listening on the other end of his cell phone. "Literally, it was a switch back and forth between medic and son. I talked to him, he'd look up at me, 'Stevie, Stevie,' he'd recognize, then I'd have to do something else. It just depended on where my brain was at the time."

Cody, 50, has been on life-saving missions for 29 years. He served in the trauma unit now known as BMC South (Brockton), worked in the emergency room and, as a psychiatric nurse practitioner, plans to point his career toward mental health.

"I'm just hoping we can get 'CPR saves lives' message to people because, honestly, it takes five minutes

to get there, and if you're not doing anything, that's five minutes wasted," said Cody.

Response times to the rapidly growing, eastern end of Rochester around Routes 28 and 58 are substantially longer. Due to prohibitive, post-Covid construction costs, pursuit of an auxiliary fire station in that area has been tabled with the town fiscally challenged to build a long-overdue replacement of the main station adjacent to Rochester Elementary School.

Inflation only amplifies Cody's concern that residents learn CPR and buy their loved ones – or any victim – critical minutes while professional help in on the way.

As Richard described the effort before officially recognizing the many who pulled together to save McGonagle, the chain of survival on May 10 was instant, cohesive, cooperative, and unbroken. As miraculous as it sounds, those involved saw individual public recognition as an opportunity to reinforce the message that this can be a normal response.

"We talked about the chain of survival because it's literally a chain," said Cody. "You have to recognize immediately, you have to call 911 immediately, you have to start CPR immediately, you have to continue CPR, it has to be effective, we have to get there, we have to (defibrillate) immediately, as soon as possible. You take any one of those chains out, and he had three to five minutes without a pulse."

The loss of any one of those links in the chain, said Cody, would have produced a different outcome.

Richard compared McGonagle's event to the one Fire Chief Scott Weigel suffered at home. The chief was in attendance Friday to present awards to participants in McGonagle's rescue.

– Danielle is also an EMT and soon-to-become nurse practitioner – the survivor was fully cognizant of all that went into his rescue and shared big hugs with his family and friends.

“I can start a little light golf – chipping and putting – after six weeks. This Sunday makes five weeks,” said McGonagle, who goes 6-foot-1 and is down from 245 pounds when he collapsed to 226 as of June 12.

“They’re healing,” he said of his ribs. “It feels much better now. At least, if I have to cough, I can cough ... it was hard to breathe.”

When McGonagle woke up in the hospital to tremendous pain in his chest, he asked his doctor why. The answer was his ribs were broken. “How many?” he

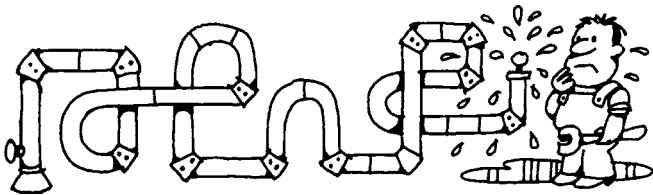

asked. "All of them."

Magilton said, "You're welcome." Laughter ensued.

Danielle Cody thanked the Rochester Fire Department, the civilians who intervened and the community at large in a letter shared on social media.

"Statistically, the odds were against him, but the immediate action of those around him changed everything. ... I wanted to share the full story because it is a beautiful, rare testament to the power of quick thinking, community, and the compassion of strangers and friends alike," she stated in her letter. "My family and I are eternally grateful. We are overwhelmed by the skill and heart shown by first responders and everyone on that course. On a lighter note, if you're looking for a place to play golf, head to Rochester – it's clearly the safest course around!"

Assistant No More: Principal Charles West By Sam Bishop

Charles West has a long history of working in education. Though he was not an educator himself, he worked at Rochester Memorial School for approximately 23 years, first as a social worker and later becoming assistant principal in 2013, 13 years ago.

Last month, the Old Rochester Regional School Committee approved West's appointment as the new principal at Mattapoissett's Center School, taking over from Dr. Linda Ashley who is retiring after 35 years in education and three as principal.

Taking a short break from working on teacher evaluations at RMS, we spoke with Charley last week to get a sense of how it's going preparing to move schools and towns after so many years. He has worked on the Summer Adventures in Learning (SAIL) program at Center School, so he will not be totally alien to his new workplace. He will officially start his new role on July 1, finishing out the year at RMS and shifting into running SAIL and preparing to become principal of Center School at the same time.

"I'm looking forward to joining a wonderful group of educators there at Center School," he said. "The school has a great reputation of academic excellence combined with a really supportive and caring learning

environment for students." On the excitement, he said he was looking forward to this new chapter of his professional career, calling it "energizing."

"I have kind of a clinical background. Prior to coming into the public school system, I worked in everything from community mental health to the clinical director of a residential treatment program for kids in Vermont," he said. West mentioned the work positioned him well for schoolwork, then becoming a school social worker at RMS in the early 2000s. Charley said he loved directly working with kids, but said he "believe it or not, missed the management pieces of the work." He highlighted bringing people together, collaborating on initiatives, and forging connections as motivating factors in his original involvement in school administration.

Though he is excited, he said he will most miss the relationships he made with staff, families, and the community in his long career at RMS. "It's going to be a loss to be moving away from them. The good news is I'm not going very far, and I'll still be able to stay connected," he said.

In heading to Center School, West said he has received a warm welcome from teachers, students, and staff. "They've been great, as well as the outgoing principal," he said, citing help and guidance from Ashley. West stated he looks forward to "seeing what's going on there," and wants to "respect the traditions that currently exist." To that, he added, "it's a great climate and culture

there, so I'm not planning to go in and burn it down and rebuild." He again emphasized collaboration and sharing ideas to troubleshoot.

Charley West is spared a trial by fire, having the summer to get acclimated and prepare for the start of the new school year in September. A nearby resident, Charley exclaimed his excitement for the option of peddling to work on the bike path. "I'm a big biker, so that is pretty cool. I can just zip down there. That's a cool little bonus."

Structure Fire at SEMASS/Covanta Waste-to-Energy Facility

On Sunday at approximately 11:57 a.m., the Rochester Fire Department responded to a reported structure fire at the SEMASS/Covanta Waste-to-Energy Facility located in Rochester.

First-arriving units reported heavy smoke coming from the shredder area of the facility. Upon establishing command and conducting an initial size up, crews determined that the conveyor belt system which feeds waste into a shredder had broken and had spread the fire within the facility.

Firefighters immediately initiated suppression operations. Due to the size and complexity of the incident, automatic mutual aid was requested from the Marion and Mattapoisett Fire Departments.

Additional mutual aid resources were requested including a Tanker Task Force consisting of tankers from the Wareham, Lakeville, Acushnet, and Freetown Fire Departments. Additional engine companies and manpower responded from Lakeville, Freetown, Acushnet, Wareham, Middleborough, Carver, and Onset. Ambulances were also requested from the Wareham and Freetown Fire Departments to support on-scene operations. Marion EMS responded to a medical call in Rochester at the time of the fire.

During firefighting operations, one firefighter was transported to a local hospital for evaluation and treatment of heat exhaustion. The firefighter's condition is not believed to be serious. An employee from the facility was evaluated by EMS for an injury and released.

During the incident, firefighters reported a partial

collapse of a section of the facility's roof due to the intense heat generated by the fire. Crews adjusted operations accordingly and continued suppression efforts while

maintaining firefighter safety as the top priority.

After approximately two hours of sustained firefighting operations, crews brought the fire under control. Firefighters remained on scene conducting overhaul operations and extinguishing remaining hot spots for several hours. The cause of the fire remains under investigation.

extra money and took on some lawn-care work. Over time, he had several customers and was even entrusted with caring for a newly installed landscape, including overseeing its watering schedule in addition to mowing lawns. It seems that this early immersion – along with the many chores he handled at home – served him well. Now in his thirties, Tristan finds great satisfaction in gardening and spending time outdoors.

I sometimes wonder whether teenagers still mow lawns for spending money the way they did when I was growing up. According to my high school students, the answer is yes. One young entrepreneur told me he earns \$16 an hour and takes home roughly \$300 a week. For another former student, mowing lawns became much more than a summer job. His small venture blossomed into a full-fledged lawn-care business, with his client base tripling in

a single year to nearly 75 customers and a growing menu of services.

Thoughts on...

**Someone I Miss
By Dick Morgado**

Recently someone writing on our local social media page asked the question "Who do you miss?" It drew an enormous response by residents, past and present, naming persons (and places) they missed growing up in our town. Here is someone I miss.

Much has been written about Abraham Skidmore, the legendary son of former slaves who for some 70 years was Mattapoisett's town barber whose last shop was in the tiny building on Church Street. Few know the story of his successor Al Morgado. After "Skid," as he was known, passed away in 1954, Al took over the shop and became a fixture in town annals for nearly 30 years until his death in 1983.

Al was born three days before New Year's 1917 in Mattapoisett on Cathaway Lane, now Driscoll Lane, in a house his parents, Anna a homemaker and José Morgado, a laborer for Dennis Mahoney and Sons, rented for \$10 a month. Al was one of 10 children, a twin one of three sets.

Life was not easy for this large family. A sister, Erina, contracted tubercular meningitis and died on her fifth birthday in 1919. Five years later, Al's father

contracted tuberculosis and was moved to a treatment hospital in the town of South Hanson where he passed away in November 1924, leaving Anna a widow whose oldest child was just 17 years old. Al was seven. Shortly after, Al's grandmother, Mary DeMello, who was 88 years of age and well known in Mattapoisett for her daily walks around the village, moved in with the family to help raise the children.

Al attended Mattapoisett Center School through the ninth grade where he acquired the nickname "Hook." According to the 1934 junior high school yearbook *The Wanderer*, he participated in Junior Achievement, Traffic Squad, Drama Club and Baseball. His suppressed desire was "to become a commercial artist." By 1940 he was working for the WPA (Works Progress Administration) along with his brother Manual as a laborer on a water project. Later, following in his father's footsteps, he went to work for Dennis Mahoney driving an oil delivery truck.

In 1941 he married Pearl Duclos and moved in with her parents in a two-tenement house on Field Street in New Bedford. When war was declared after Pearl Harbor, Al enlisted in the Navy and by June was standing watch on the deck of the USS *Pennsylvania*, an ice breaker battleship plying the cold waters of the Bering Sea near the Aleutian Islands off Alaska.

Al spotted a notice on the ship's bulletin board seeking experienced barbers for the ship's shop, which was well below deck and warm. With no experience at all, he mustered up enough courage to march into the barber shop and declared that he owned two barber shops in New Bedford, Massachusetts. Duly impressed, the head barber assigned Al a chair and tools and told him to go to it. The first customer was an officer. Al set the sheers at the back of the officer's neck and proceeded to mow a swarth right up and over the officer's skull. A reverse mohawk. "You don't know how to cut hair, do you?" the head barber said. Al confessed, saying he hated the cold, and for some reason the head man agreed to teach him how to cut hair. A career was born.

While the *Pennsylvania* was docked in San Francisco for an overhaul and an update of equipment,

Al was injured in an automobile accident and was transferred to the naval hospital at Treasure Island, California. Later, because of his accident, Al escaped being on board his ship when it was hit by a Japanese torpedo while docked at Okinawa. The ship suffered a hole in its side which flooded many compartments. Family lore suggested that one was the barber shop.

After discharge, Al used his hair-cutting experience to land a job at the Harmony Barber Shop on Union Street in New Bedford. The shop was so named because the owner was a member in the singing group the "Harpoon Harmonizers." Using the G.I. Bill, he bought a home in New Bedford and second, two-tenement house that Pearl's parents lived in, renting the remaining

When Pearl's parents died a year apart, Mattapoisett beckoned. Al wanted to own his own barber shop, so when Skidmore passed away, he acquired the business and settled into the same small building on Church Street where Skid cut his hair as a kid. Al would drive to Mattapoisett every day in his used, late-1940s, green Studebaker coupe which he said he had to spin the wheel twice around to turn a corner! Shortly after, he sold the houses in New Bedford and returned home to Mattapoisett. He found a small house in the heart of the village, just a short walk from the shop. The builder, Freddy Hield, was a local carpenter who built it for himself, then suddenly died before it was finished. Al would spend nights and days off finishing the inside, making it a permanent home for the family.

Al jumped right in, participating in town activities. He acquired a big base drum and took up the mantle of Skidmore marching at the front of the Halloween parade, sans Skid's goofy hat. Every kid in town soon realized that a knock on the barber-shop door and a polite please would elicit a tasty lollipop. In 1957, during the town's 100th Anniversary parade, Al rode in an old Model T truck, dressed as a hobo, tossing candy to the youngsters along the route.

He started a Youth Bowling League at the old Bowlmor Alleys for all the kids in town. Every Wednesday, Al's day off, after school a line of kids would



exit Center School to march up Barstow Street to the alleys. At the end of the school year, he would throw a dinner at the Colonial Coach restaurant in Marion to present awards to the bowlers.

The PLC (Professional Loafers Club), a collection of retired "townies," would meet every day at the shop to solve the town's problems and the world's as well. Many of the old timers would be waiting at the door at 5:00 am when Al arrived, complaining that he was late. Al joined the Lion's Club shortly after its inception and became a member of the Machacum Club, the American Legion and the Knights of Columbus. He would work the annual clambakes as a waiter, and when one of his customers was in the hospital Al would visit to give the patient a free

haircut. Some called him the "Mayor of Mattapoisett."

One wall of the shop was covered with clippings and stories about the town, notes from customers who had moved away, postcards sent from customers' vacations and old historical photos. If business was slow, you might find Al at Tony's PX restaurant next door, grabbing a cup of coffee, or asleep in his barber chair, arms raised, pantomiming cutting someone's hair. He would never take a vacation nor buy a "new" car nor raise his prices, fearing his customers would abandon him. Not likely.

Al died in his sleep on Wednesday, August 24, 1983, his day off. His wake was held in Fairhaven for two afternoons and two evenings. At all sessions the line ran around the block with mourners waiting to offer condolences. On the drive to the funeral, the hearse detoured down Main Street past the Town Hall, turning left at Church Street, pausing for a moment in front of the barber shop before continuing past Center School to St. Anthony's Church. Along the route stood many friends and parents with little children who had their first haircuts at "Al the Barber's." Albert Morgado is buried alongside his wife Pearl in St. Anthony's Cemetery on North Street.

Remembering Separation Day

This Week in Revolutionary War History

This week in Revolutionary War history, let's check up on what was going on 250 years ago in the Thirteen Colonies. Last week, the Continental Congress was forced into formal discussions around independence. From that, they established the Committee of Five to begin drafting a declaration of independence.

On June 14, 1776, there is an important meeting in the New Castle Courthouse outside Wilmington, Delaware. As talks of independence permeated the halls of the Continental Congress in Philadelphia, other colonies took notice and took action, benefiting congress' own push for colonial governments to do so. Representatives of the provincial government of the Lower Counties on the Delaware, or Delaware Colony, met in the courthouse and passed the Act of Separation, which severed ties with the Crown and established the State of Delaware.

In modern times, there are various celebrations throughout Delaware in early June for Separation Day.

On June 16, John Adams writes to his wife Abigail Adams. The future president is working hard as a member of the Committee of Five in Philadelphia. Adams is to edit what Jefferson writes for a declaration that will ultimately be seen by Parliament and King George III. In his letter, Adams writes, "Don't be concerned, about me, if it happens now and then that you don't hear from me, for some weeks together. If any thing should injure my health materially, you will soon hear of it. But I thank God I am in much better health than I expected to be. But this cannot last long, under the load that I carry."

On June 17, it is the one-year anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill. The past year has proved to be a flurry of events as the balance of power rocks back and forth across the continent. By this point, the British had evacuated Boston around three months ago.

The next day, the first meeting of the Pennsylvania Provincial Conference is held in Carpenters' Hall in Philadelphia. At the meeting, 97 out of 103 delegates meet and discuss the colony's independence.

Over the next few days, the delegates declared the colonial government to be void and thus established the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. With that, they began preparations for elections to a constitutional convention to draft a governing document for the commonwealth, as well as formally mobilizing the Pennsylvania Militia for the war.

Also on June 18, Congress passed the Tory Resolution, which ensured "That no man in these colonies, charged with being a tory, or unfriendly to the cause of American liberty, be injured in his person or property, or in any manner whatever disturbed." So long as the Tory in question did not aid the enemy, they were to be guarded against persecution. In a way, this act could be seen as a way to placate the local Tories, as New York was seen as a sanctuary of British support.

Speaking of Tories, on June 19, William Franklin, Colonial Governor of New Jersey and son of Benjamin Franklin, was allowed to see his wife Elizabeth one last time before being placed on house arrest for treason for his loyalty to the Crown. Elizabeth would die a year

later, with William not having seen her again, nor being allowed to attend her funeral. William would remain in prison until 1778, never accepting independence, nor reconciling with his father. The two would only meet once after the arrest, many years later and after the war.

On June 21, Benjamin Franklin writes to Washington. He, also a member of the Committee of Five and having just recently turned 70, writes, "I see in it a detail of the mighty force we are threatened with; which however I think it is not certain will ever arrive; & I see more certainly the ruin of Britain if she persists in such expensive distant expeditions, which will probably prove more disastrous to her than anciently her wars in the Holy Land." He makes no mention of his son, possibly not yet

All's Well That Ends Well

Marion Select Board

The solution was elusive but not impossible for the first action item on the agenda of the Marion Select Board during Tuesday night's meeting at the Police Station.

Homeowner Corey Ferreira had requested a waiver from a bylaw that would have allowed him to install a drinking-water well on his property at 373 Wareham Road (Route 6).

Ferreira's representative, David Davignon of Schneider, Davignon & Leone, Inc., laid out an \$18,000 plan that would include four actions including the water, the well, a tie-in to town sewer, and a retaining wall.

Davignon told the board that the town's water line runs along the opposite side of Route 6 from Ferreira's address, and a state-approved dig could take up to six months to complete. The well, according to Ferreira, was always part of his building permit.

What concerned Select Board member Randy Parker was precedence.

"Everybody who builds a house is going to apply

for a well," said Parker.

Citing that a well would be half the price of the \$38,000 it will cost to get a water line across Route 6, Davignon cited details about Ferreira's lot and asserted that his quandary is rare enough not to be concerned with copycats.

"Unfortunately, Dave, for the first time in my life I disagree with you," said Parker, who insists trouble lies ahead with such an approval. "I've never approved (a well) for domestic water – and especially (for a home) on (town) sewer – at least in nine years."

Town Administrator Geoff Gorman confirmed that there remain no more buildable lots at Ferreira's location, but Parker stuck to his argument that an approval for a domestic well at the address would prove to set a bad precedent for the town.

Davignon countered with a request that the town consider relief on the \$10,000 sewer hookup. Parker requested a number. "If I'm greedy, I would ask for the exact difference," said Davignon, advocating for the applicant. Board Chairman John Hoagland asked if Ferreira would consider \$5,000 in relief.

The compromise was thereby reached: Route 6 will not be dug up, Marion will not approve a domestic well, and will not fear having opened the floodgates for future domestic-well applications. But Ferreira will pay half the regular fee for his sewer hookup. It will cost him \$17,000 for a temporary tie-in to the neighboring water line at 369 Wareham Road.

After a 6:00 pm Public Hearing, it was voted via three motions that the town approves the transfer of the all-alcohol, off-premises license and inventory of ICJ Corp dba Top of The Hill Liquors, 311 Marion Street (Route 6), to Sri Vinayak Corporation, the principals of which are Sonalben Patel (50%), Jaiminkumar Patel (40%) and Vishal Patel (10%).

The third motion conditioned that ownership would revert back to ICJ Corp should the Patel ownership fail to meet its end of the bargain. ICJ is financing the Patels' purchase pending an agreed schedule of payments of principal and interest.

Jaiminkumar Patel will act as manager. He has been working for another Marion-based business since

2021 with no violations. Hours of operation at Top of the Hill Liquors will stay the same.

The application now goes to the state agency ABCC for its approval.

Before delving into action items, Hoagland announced that former Marion Harbormaster Adam Murphy has filed a suit against the town, claiming he was fired at a January 28 meeting with the Select Board chairman, the police chief and the town administrator. Hoagland noted that the town disputes Murphy's narrative, stating that the Marion participants are in agreement that Murphy submitted his resignation at that meeting and it was accepted. Hoagland said he would keep the town informed as the case develops.

Davignon's work was also evident in a 26-spot, parking proposal for the area between Wells Road and Route 6 now owned by "JJ" Pope and Michelle Pope. The plan was well received by the Select Board, which has considered the area "an eye sore" for years. Gorman will seek guidance to determine what it will take to bring the plan forward.

Seeking compliance for a delinquent water bill over three years for a Rochester resident (284 New Bedford Road), the board agreed to waive the required 10% down payment on the principal and the interest provided the resident remain current on the five-year payment schedule. A lien will be applied should the property be sold. Hoagland said there are more such cases

to come.

The Select Board is still trying to get the bottom of a discrepancy between \$2,100,000 and \$2,600,000 in the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between member towns and the Old Rochester Regional School District regarding Gateway Health Group funding. The Mattapoisett Select Board approved the MOU, and Hoagland wants to know how that affects Marion's options. Citing no quarterly reports from the ORR School Committee since January, Hoagland also wants monthly reports and for ORR to move up from a December 31 deadline to September 30 with year-end information. The other Select Board members considered Hoagland's requests reasonable, and Gorman said he will forward the

changes to ORR Administration.

Normally the purview of the Board of Health, the Select Board discussed the Third Read of the town's Blighted and Vacant Property Policy. Both Burr and Parker dislike the document, but Hoagland said he can think of at least four properties in town that need intervention.

"Pitcher Street, when are we going to wake up? They owe us thousands of dollars, and it just sits there rotting," he said. "I think we owe those residents on Pitcher Street some action."

Parker argued that, before arming the town with policy, it would be better to "find out what's going on behind the scenes and see what we can do with those. ... there were times when town found money to help someone. You have to find out what's going on ... I think we're still that town."

Hoagland's was the dissenting vote against Burr's and Parker's that tabled the matter.

A discussion regarding the Department of Public Works buildings on Route 6 yielded interest in putting together a group (committee), and the focus shifted to the town's two water towers, their maintenance and apparatus and certification. With neither in use, Parker suggested learning what it will cost to decommission them. Hoagland said it will cost \$250,000 to take down the water tower at the former DPW headquarters. The ground there also will need testing. Gorman will provide information that will enable action by the board.

The town's new contract with Waste Management adds a third curbside recycling date. Affected residents will be notified.

Inclusionary Bylaw Fees will remain at \$75,000 per unit. Toll Brothers' project at 78 Wareham Road is already in for \$75,000 per unit, but uplands of the former Lockheed Martin business park could be affected.

Heather Corrigan's request for a Special One Day Alcohol Beverage License for a July 31 fundraiser for the Marion Art Center from 5:00 pm to 7:00 pm was approved. The event anticipated approximately 300 attendees.

Other votes approved the removal of the July 7

and August 4 Select Board meetings, noting the board can schedule a special meeting to address any business, the scheduling of two meetings in August for the Select Board Goal Retreat, the appointment of Police Officer Nathan Oliveira (effective June 16) to a one-year probationary period, the appointment of Jennifer Petersen as a full member of the town's Affordable Housing Trust, the dissolution of the DPW Building Committee – with gratitude, the reappointments of many members of Marion boards, committees and staff, and a Water/Sewer Commitment of \$1,401.54 (final readings June 4).

Pier Replacement Approved at Wings Cove

The Marion Conservation Commission met in the Marion Police Station on June 10 for two approvals of Certificates of Compliance, as well as a continued Public Hearing for pier alterations.

The commission began with their continued Public Hearing for a Notice of Intent submitted by Elizabeth H. O'Leary of 81 Cove Circle for the removal and replacement of a timber float. Matt Leone of Schneider, Davignon & Leone, Inc. represented the applicant, whose 4.13-acre property consists of a single-family home, detached garage, and pile-supported pier into Wings Cove (near Piney Point).

The proposed project would see the removal of an existing 12x24 foot, bottom-anchored timber float, as well as its connections, and replace this pier support with four 12-inch diameter timber piles driven into the sea floor, which will in turn support a new wooden float.

The representative stated the sea zone is mapped by MassWildlife's National Heritage and Endangered Species Program, which had indicated the work being proposed on the pier would not adversely affect the environment. Following no public comments, the Public Hearing was closed and work was approved.

Next, the commission voted on the approval of two Certificates of Compliance, one for 122 Register Road and one for 546 Point Road. Both were approved and granted.

The next meeting of the Marion Conservation Commission is scheduled for Wednesday, June 24 at 7:00 pm in the Marion Police Station's conference room.

Legal Advice Sought for Decision

Rochester Zoning Board of Appeals

The Rochester Zoning Board of Appeals opened its June 11 meeting with a petition regarding a new detached garage at 100 Ryder Road that required a telephone call to Town Counsel.

The applicant's representative Joseph Mardo explained homeowner Ashley Ohrenberger is seeking variances for a new garage measuring over 1,000 square feet and set 20 feet rather than the required 40 feet from side setback. It is a plan to replace an old garage. Board members seemed agreeable to the plan, except for one aspect of it.

The board noted a shed, pool house, and deck non-conforming to town zoning bylaws also sit on the property. They wondered aloud if these issues would complicate the variance the board would grant for the current project. Could the board condition that the applicant seeks variances for the non-conforming items be allowed? These questions led to a brief recess so Board Administrator Andreia Lacerda could telephone Town Counsel for the attorney's input. The attorney responded that the board, in fact, legally could include this condition in the variance permits. The board, as a result, unanimously granted the variances with the condition that the shed located in the leaching field in the western portion of the property be moved or demolished.

Next, the board approved a new Special Permit with amended conditions for a personal fitness

training business at 12 Mayflower Lane, an operation that had received a trial-period permit in September when neighbors raised concerns about it. Owner Jorge Rodriguez said he was given a temporary permit nine months ago and would now like a permanent permit, and one with amendments. He said he wants to change his hours of operation from the current 8:00 am to 6:00 pm to a schedule adding one hour to both ends of the day, making it 7:00 am to 7:00 pm. He also asked to increase the limit of students in his classes from five to eight to help his business grow faster.

“Our goal is to get a large following and move out of the neighborhood,” fellow coach Jessica Hurd said, urging the board to endorse the amendments. “None of his abutters are here to voice concerns,” board member Dennis McCarthy said. “So, they must be running a tight ship.”

After some hesitation, the board reasoned this would be a new permit and therefore the conditions can be amended. The ZBA unanimously approved the new permit with Rodriguez’s requested amendments.

The zoning panel ended the meeting by approving a variance from the 40-foot side-setback requirement for a new 20x20-foot shed in the backyard at 324 High Street.

The Rochester Zoning Board of Appeals did not schedule its next meeting before adjourning.

Development Permit Extended

Marion Zoning Board of Appeals

The Marion Zoning Board of Appeals met on June 11 in the Marion Police Station for a single Public Hearing.

The hearing was for a Special Permit submitted by Joshua and Nicole D’Ambrosio of 8 Crapo Street. The couple sought approval for the proposed setback of a proposed new home. The demolition of the current home and construction of a new house on the property would have a front-yard setback of 35 feet. Representing the applicants was Bob Rogers of GAF Engineering, who referred to the project as a “tear-down, rebuild.” The new home was described as a “typical Cape” style home.

There was no marked height for the new home, with the max height for a new building not requiring a Special Permit, standing 10% taller than the original 16 feet. If eventually the applicants’ plans were to exceed that increase, they would need to resubmit another request. After a short discussion, the hearing was closed with a unanimous vote, and the permit for the new setback was approved.

There was then a discussion on the construction of the new housing development in the industrial area on Barnabas Road by Sippican Holding LLC. The ZBA had originally granted a Variance on the conversion of the building around a year ago, but as construction is ongoing, the developer requested a six-month extension. The current Variance would lapse on June 24, and work

money. On the other hand, we shall probably pay more over time for a patch job on the old building, without any state aid.

To the residents and voters in Mattapoisett,

Voters are once again being asked to decide on Saturday, June 20th, from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. at Old Hammondtown School whether to approve construction of a new Old Colony Regional Vocational High School. Some may ask why the proposal has returned to the ballot. Last year, many voters across the Old Colony District did not fully understand what a failed vote would mean. If the measure is rejected, the state will require the current 50-year-old building to be brought up to code, and the district will have to pay for those repairs without state reimbursement. Those repairs, needed over the next decade simply to keep the building operating, are estimated to cost \$157 million. By contrast, the new school would cost the district \$148 million after state reimbursement, making it the least expensive option.

The school project has a calculator where you can enter your home value and see the difference between the

two options (<https://oldcolonybuildingproject.com/tax-impact-calculator>).

Only 13% of the registered voters in the 5 towns took part in the last election. Mattapoisett was the only town to vote in favor of the project.

The current building limits enrollment and restricts expansion of high-demand vocational programs such as Plumbing, HVAC & Dental Assistant. A new facility would allow Old Colony to continue preparing students for high-demand careers while meeting the needs of the communities they serve. Old Colony's current enrollment is 560 students; with a new build it would increase to 776 students.

New construction - After State reimbursement the District Cost will be \$148,572,618. Mattapoisett's share is approximately \$11 million.

Repair (No state reimbursement) - District cost over a decade long proposed project to avoid Building Code mandated immediate repairs cost would cost \$157 million. Mattapoisett's share is approximately \$11.6 million.

A modernized Level 1 vocational school that serves Mattapoisett enhances local property values. I hope that you can join me in supporting the Old Colony Building Project at the election on Jun 20th at Old Hammondtown school.

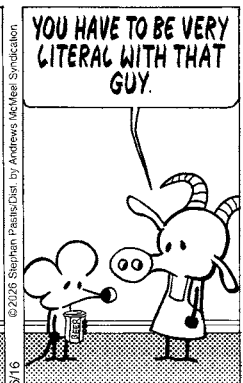
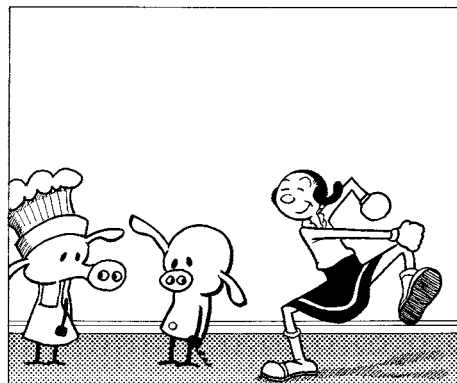
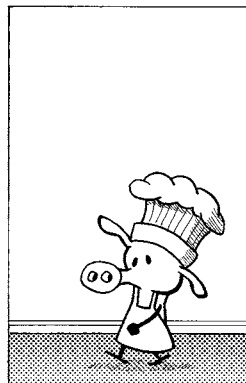

MOVIE REVIEW

Master Pieces

Disclosure Day. Starring Emily Blunt and Josh O'Connor. Directed by Steven Spielberg. Running time: 145 minutes. MPAA rating: PG-13. Now playing in theaters.

Disclosure Day may be Steven Spielberg's greatest alien hits, but I didn't mind his playing the hits again; they were hits for a reason. Spielberg is 79, and his longtime composer John Williams, who again collaborates here, is 94, and they both perform like old masters, which indeed they are. Williams hauls out his deep, menacing tones, and Spielberg — directing a script by David Koepp — keeps everything on the screen in smooth movement while always grounding the action so we can see and understand what's happening.

And yet I was reminded of John Peel's old line about Aretha Franklin's poppy duet with George Michael. Peel observed, after the song was over, "You know, Aretha Franklin can make any old rubbish sound good, and I think she just has." Well ... Spielberg and Williams can't quite make *any* old rubbish sound good, but they've done that here. *Disclosure Day* eventually becomes a paranoid chase thriller with some pull-out-the-stops set pieces, and nobody except maybe James Cameron can touch them at that game. It's the story that occasions a saddening shrug.

Daniel Kellner (Josh O'Connor), who worked cybersecurity, has discovered the existence of aliens and tons of evidence that they've come (or crashed) here. He's on the run with the relevant files, with saturnine secret commander Noah Scanlon (Colin Firth), who runs the extraterrestrial wing Wardex, on his trail. Noah also has a device that enables him to establish psychic links with people remotely. Apparently unrelated, Margaret Fairchild (Emily Blunt) is getting ready to deliver a live meteorological forecast when she begins communicating in clicks. She's whisked off for an MRI, but Daniel hears her clicks as English.

Daniel and Margaret are trapped in a car that gets rammed into a passing train, which picks up the car and goes hurtling along towards a train passing the other way, which will surely smash the car and



its passengers into pieces. Spielberg does this kind of cruelly drawn-out yet bracingly tense sequence better than anyone; there are some car chases that just about match it. Yet none of that has much to do with the movie's premise, which is that Earth is going to be presented with evidence that's going to make a whole lot of people freak out. Or so Noah says. There's another higher-up, Hugo Wakefield (Colman Domingo), who has defected from Wardex and gives Daniel and Margaret support. Hugo thinks this information belongs to everyone. This debate doesn't seem terribly urgent, especially since we appear to be on the brink of World War III.

The concept of humanity being pulled back from self-extinction by evidence of aliens is not a new one; Cameron's *The Abyss* ran with it, as did the *Outer Limits* episode "The Architects of Fear" (which inspired Alan Moore's *Watchmen*). Spielberg expends an awful lot of energy on keeping things moving, but the question of how exactly Earthlings would react to aliens among them is unanswered and the drama associated with it undercooked. *Disclosure Day* feels like the pilot episode for a more interesting streaming series that does grapple with these issues. As it is, we don't know if we would simply be distracted by the next news cycle, or if indeed alien presence *would* put an end to a war boiling over.

Spielberg clearly hopes it does. In the past 30 years or so, he has left us with little bits of wisdom. Life finds a way. The list is life. Give us free. Earn this. Here he closes with one word that, in these bifurcated times, doesn't really address the problem. And we can feel that it's supposed to be relevant and helpful, but it just comes off as anticlimactic. But, man, do Spielberg and Williams use the hammer of the gods on this slight story, showing us why they've been on top of their fields for over half a century now. I'd say see it for them (and the actors, especially Blunt and Firth) and let other people re-invent the narrative wheel.

Marion Seeks Input to Help Shape Future of Harbor and Waterways

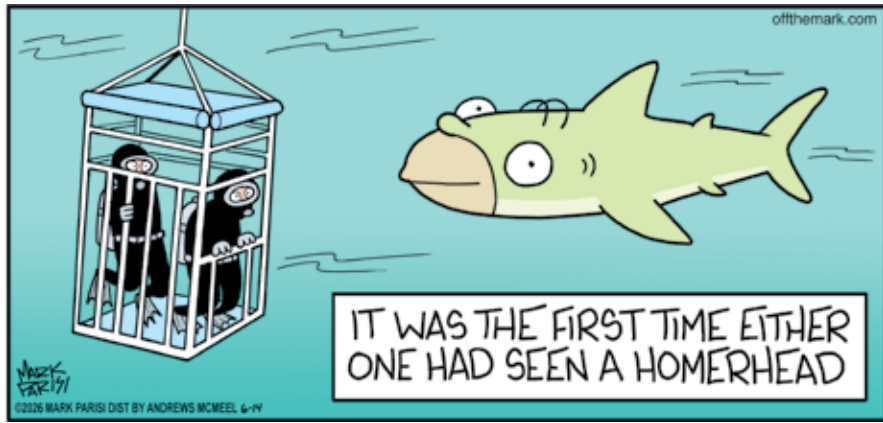
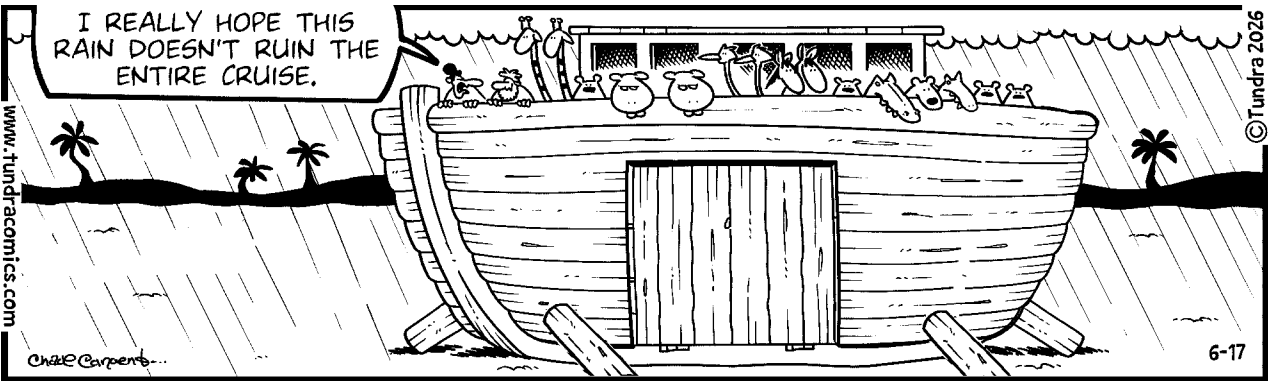

From the Files of the Rochester Historical Society By Connie Eshbach

Sometimes when looking through the many files collected by the Rochester Historical Society, serendipity occurs. I came across an old article entitled "Rochester Was Old When United States Was a Mere Infant." This is not just a talking point but an actual fact. While the United States is celebrating its 250th birthday, Rochester reached 340 years since its incorporation on June 4, 1686.

The article that I found begins with Native American names for four sections that became Old Rochester. They form a couplet:

Snipatuit and Monochesett
Sippican and Mattapeeset

It's interesting to note that in 1647, liberty was granted to Plymouth to make "use of the land of Sippican for herding and keeping of cattle and wintering them." That means that much of the land purchased by the original proprietors had simply been used for pasturage.

Nineteen years later in 1666, King Philip, Supreme Sachem of the Wampanoag Federations, gave permission for the Sippican lands to be sold. Those lands formed Old Rochester, and more was added when land in today's North Rochester, previously purchased from Native Americans, was added to the town.

Old Rochester covered a much larger area than today's Rochester, and now for the serendipitous part, I also found a hand-drawn map (shown here) that delineates the boundaries of Old Rochester. The abutting areas are Middleborough, Plymouth, Buzzards Bay, the Sippican and Mattapoissett harbors, and Tivertown, which was at some point folded into Freetown.

While the town today covers 32 square miles, it was much larger in the 1700s and the first half of the 1800s when it was known not just for its pine trees, bogs and fields, but also for its two harbors.
